MEMORIAL PROJECT UPDATE from Gil Gilbert and Carroll Cheek

Wendling Obelisk

It is hard to put into words, the deep feelings you have when you stand in front of the 392nd BG memorial obelisk at Beeston. A moment of silence and the memories come flooding back. This simple, but beautiful memorial reminds us of a very special time in our lives. The fact that first, second and even third generation family members from the surrounding villages were there remembering with us, made it even more touching. [The obelisk, like the rest of us, is beginning to show her age. The drainage tile under the monument has given way to the weight of the granite and the drainage is no longer effective. There are times during the year when water actually stands around the base of the memorial. wooden gate has been replaced several times over the years, but needs to be replaced with a permanent metal gate. Jerry and I stopped by the day before the memorial services and found our dear English friend, Roy Parker, painting the old gate (in the rain) so it would look nice for the services.]

The love and respect as displayed by our English friends was overwhelming. Signs in the windows "Welcome Home Yanks" and "Thanks for Coming Back" were heart rending. The Tea they had for us was held in a barn. Old crocks were filled with fresh cut flowers. Beeston Parish Council Chairman Jill Scott gave a beautiful, short speech in

which she said England would have lost the war had we not joined the fight and that they would be eternally grateful. The fact that they fought the war alone for four or five years before we arrived was never mentioned.

I think it was best summed up by Ned Twining who commented "This is love in its purest and most simple form." I couldn't reply. I was too choked up.

Return to Wendling

The Gathering of The Crusaders took place at London's Heathrow Airport. Flights from the West Coast, Chicago, New York and Miami all arrived within an hour and a half of each other. We were met by two tour buses who whisked us via Dual Carriage Way (that's divided highway), to the beautiful Dukes Head Hotel in Kings Lynn.

We were greeted at a buffet that evening by the Mayor and Mayor-ess of Kings Lynn. We presented them with a copy of "Liberators from Wendling" for the Library. The manager of the Dukes Head gave us, some history on the hotel. It seems that Queen Victoria spent a night there. He asked who was occupying Room 12, as that was where the Queen stayed. Who else but Emily and J. D. Long. Now the room is really famous (according to J. D.).

The next morning the buses headed for the Queen's home at Sandringham. There is no truth to the rumor that they are raising funds for a memorial to the Queen's pet swan who paid the supreme price during the war. After a tour of this beautiful place the buses traveled on to Norwich and a visit to the 2nd Air Division's Memorial Room at the Library.

After a good nights sleep we boarded the buses for the Imperial War Museum at Duxford. Lunch was served at the Officers Club. After the museum it was on to visit the famous Ely Cathedral and back to the Dukes Head.

On Saturday we went for a memorable day at Wendling and Beeston. We stopped at the memorial obelisk for a short memorial service. It was misting rain but the services were simple, but beautiful. A wreath was laid by J. D. Long and Bill Richards. Following the services we had a tour of the base. The short runways have been pretty well chopped up. Portions of them are used as roadways. The main runway is covered with turkey brooders. They raise one half million turkeys there. Most of the remaining perimeter has been reduced in width to about one third its original size. There are very few buildings remaining. The bomb dump has been purchased by a naturalist group and is being transformed into a nature preserve. There is a bumper crop of partridges in the area.

After the town, it was back to Beeston. The villagers hosted a tea in a local barn. The turn out of our English friends was great. We were honored by the presence of members of the Beeston Parish Council. We were certainly made to feel at home. After the tea we split up with one bus going to the Plow Shear in Beeston and the other to the Rose Cottage at Wendling for lunch and more visiting. That evening we had a farewell banquet at the Dukes Head. We had a few comments from various crusaders and a lot of laughs. We were honored by the presence of two crusader widows, Nirissa Shaw and Jean Clendenning. Art and Teddy Egan also brought their son Bert. Several of the crusaders had local guests. We were most pleased to have Dennis and Hillary Duffield, Wendy Carter, Secretary of the Beeston Parish Council and her husband Peter, also as our guests. A highlight of the evening was when Ker Farley's war bride, Katheryn, said she was the only war bride to have a B-24 full of soldiers flown to her wedding. She also confessed to spending our last night at Wendfling on the base with her husband Ken. She closed by saying that

we were all Americans by virtue

of fate but that she was an American by choice.

On Sunday morning it was farewell to Kings Lynn and on to Cambridge for lunch at the beautiful University Arms with our old friend Roger Freeman. After lunch it was on to the American Cemetary at Maddingly. Gil Bambauer and Howard Ebersole laid a wreath during the 392nd Memorial Services. The graves of all sixty plus crusaders who are still buried there were marked with American flags. It was interesting to note that the only memorial plaque on the administration building was to a 392nd (577 Bomb Sqdn.) crew who crashed their plane rather than bailing out and chancing a crash in one of two villages. It was presented by the people of those two villages.

The last two days were spent in London doing the normal sight-seeing and still visiting with old friends. The "Return to Wendling" was most successful and we are looking forward to going back again. Our hats are off to Pat and Keith Roberts for putting it all together.

Louis A. Stephens was a copilot on his first tour, joining the 578th a couple of months after the Group arrived in the ETO.

While back in the States between tours, Lou did his best to bounce his landing gear wheels on the parade ground at West Point, barely missing the roof of the Commandant's quarters resulting in a thrill both to the Commandant and Lt. Stephens. Lt. Stephens thrill lasted longer.

On the second tour, this time flying as pilot, on the 10th or 11th mission, to Mainz, the aircraft took a direct hit and blew up. Stephens and one other crewman were blown clear, and because he was wearing a back-pack, he was able to parachute safely to the ground, although badly burned.

Upon arrival at POW camp, he met John Buschman, in whose bunk at Wendling he had been sleeping since John went down.

He worked for the Air Force as a civil servant after the war, and in the 50's was in Mainz on Government business. There was still a lot of bomb damage around the rail station, but Lou thought it politic not to point out to his German hosts that he personally might have been responsible for one or two of the bomb craters.

Lou and wife Delores had two sons, one deceased, and have three grandchildren. They live at 301 Rumson Drive, Englewood, Ohio, 45322. Lou is retired, but does consulting work and raises a few calves on his farm.
