OBITUARY Bill Richards

Bill Richards, former vice-president, newsletter, died in Tulsa June 30, after a long and valiant bout with cancer. He was 64.

One of the founders of the Memorial Association, he labored long and hard with the newsletter to reach every former member of the 392nd. He and wife Jerry hosted the memorable first stand-alone reunion in Tulsa in 1987, with 228 attending, the largest 392nd gathering to that date.

He was one of the early members of the Group, joining it at Biggs Field in April 1943. He married Jerry at Alamogordo just before we went overseas. He was a Sergeant in 578th tech supply, and Ray Berthiaume, his engineering officer; and Bob Lane, his squadron executive officer, remember his service as efficient and dedicated to keeping the squadron's aircraft combat ready.

In civilian life, Bill was in the oil business in Tulsa, becoming president of Whitney Supply Company, retiring in 1988.

Bob Vickers, representing the Memorial Association, gave the eulogy at Bill's memorial service July 3 at Tulsa. Vickers' closing words were "Bill Richards was a fine, warm, and caring man; and we are gifted indeed to have had him pass our way in love and friendship, never to be forgotten."

Also present and representing the

Association were Gil Bambauer and Keith Roberts.

Survivors are Jerry and sons Bill, Redondo Beach, CA; Gregg, Bella Vista, AR; and John of Tulsa; daughters Susan Rodebush and Sally Holder; and 8 grandchildren.



FEATHERED PROP ALMOST ABORTS B-24 MISSION TO FORT WORTH

Delectable Doris, the B-24J flown at the Fort Worth celebration, almost didn't keep her date.

Flown by Dave Tallichet, noted WWII aircraft fancier, she was en route from Riverside, California, when, in mountainous terrain, no. 3 engine suddenly feathered without warning.

A precautionary landing was made at Palm Springs and the bad news telephoned to Bob Vickers that the Fort Worth visit would have to be scrubbed. Vickers, no the stranger to B-24's flight characteristics, advised Tallichet disconnect the #3 prop feathering circuit, give the engine and prop a good ground check and get back into the air.

A little later Tallichet phoned to say the aircraft was flyable and that they were on their way.

PROFILE

The 392nd has its legendary fliers, but the legend of legends is Lt. (now Dr.) C. G. "Pat" McCarthy.

Joining the 578th at Wendling in November 1943, he flew his first mission on Christmas Eve, which seemed to him to be a hell of a note.

Pat had been brought up across the street from the famous Col. Hubert Zemke, commander of the 56th and later the 479th Fighter Group. Pat visited his friend Col. Zemke, borrowed his P-47, and buzzed Wendling, picking a flight path along the road past the combat officers mess. The record doesn't show if there was any disciplinary action for this.

Then in the Spring of '44, coming back from a mission, Pat and his crew had to bail out over occupied France. Pat and four of the crew, after 90 days, made it back to the allied lines, which at that time were just a few miles inside the coast.

From these friendly precincts, he came back to Wendling, and allowed as how he ought to go see his friend, Col. Zemke, borrow his plane, and wring it out a little - over Wendling. Only this time, the Zempke outfit had changed over to P-38's.

So following his former flight path down the street, past the combat officers mess at about 10 feet, he suddenly encountered a telephone wire that had been strung across the street while he was "away" on the Continent.

He hit the wire, and only had enough time to get the P-38 high enough for him to hit the silk.

This all happened about noon, and there were many people heading for the mess. After pulling themselves up off the ground, they saw the nose-up and the eject. Many Crusaders alive today were eyewitnesses.

Higher headquarters were so anxious to get him court-martialed that they forgot that he had been behind enemy lines, and he flew 37 missions before someone realized that he could be shot if he happened to go down behind enemy lines again.

So back to the States he went, in time for Christmas 1944. In 1945, he was again in a combat crew, this time B-29,

and was ready to head for the Pacific when Japan surrendered.

Putting the same energy into his education that he had put into flying Col. Zemke's P-38, he gathered a B.S., a Master's, and an M. D.; and became a teaching fellow at Boston City Hospital. Then he returned to his roots, the West, and joined a group practice, in Internal Medicene, retiring in 1987.

He and wife now live at 211 Beverly, Missoula, Montana (and like all good doctors, the zip code he gave was undecipherable). They have one daughter. (Author's note: Pat didn't do all this single-seat flying without a wingman. His name was Otis, ands about a year after the war he crashed into a hillside while hunting coyotes.)

Lt. Col. (then Capt.) Kenneth Q. "Paddy" Paddock was Group Navigator, joining the 392nd at Biggs Field in Feb. 1943.

Post-war, his tours of duty included Air Transport Command; ROTC instructor at Purdue university; and SAC. Among overseas assignments were Cairo and Tripoli. Retiring from the AF in 1961, Paddy then busied himself as a high school math and science teacher in Somersworth, N. H. Wanderlust struck again, and he became Grounds Superintendent at the University of Alaska at Anchorage, leaving there in 1982.

Now he and wife Bridget live at Spruce Head, Maine, P. O. Box 167, 04859. They have four daughters and four grandchildren.

Stanley C. Zybort, in 1944 a S/Sgt. and flight engineer, is always the last one to have his name called. But on Aug. 6, 1944 he heard his named called loud and clear when he parachuted from his damaged aircraft over southern Germany.

His leg was injured so badly that it was amputated by a German doctor while Stan was a POW. He was repatriated in 1945, coming home on the Gripsolm.

He worked for the Department of Defense for 25 years, retiring in 1977.

At the Group meeting at Ft. Worth, Stan was elected a Director of the Memorial Association.
