# 392ND REVISITS NORFOLK FOR 8AF'S 50TH



#### CAF'S DIAMOND LIL FLIES TO ENGLAND TO JOIN IN CELEBRATION

The Confederate Air Force's B-24D Diamond Lil made the long flight to Norfolk to join in the celebration of the 8AF's 50th anniversary of its arrival in England.

Originally scheduled to arrive at Norwich June 8, she was held up in Iceland with engine trouble and was on the last leg of the flight when she passed over King's Lynn on June 10.

Her crew was alerted to the fact that the 392nd was at King's Lynn, and they and their escort of RAF fighters graciously circled and made a low-level pass over the city. It was an emotional experience for the Crusaders gathered in the market square in front of the Duke's Head.

#### **BOOK REVIEWS**

"THE FRIENDLY INVASION", by Roger Freeman.

Written and published to coincide with the 50th anniversary of the arrival of the 8AF in England, this volume is a fit companion to Roger's three other books which together present the definitive account of the US Eighth Air Force in England during World War II.

In his fluent, lucid manner, Roger takes the reader through the encounters between the Yanks and the Brits from the 8AF's arrival in early 1942 to its abrupt exodus in 1945.

Roger used one term that to the best of my knowledge has not entered the vocabulary of the 392nd: He refers to the trucks that picked up the girls in town to bring them to the base for dances as "Passion Waggons". (British spelling)

Full of authentic anecdotes and lavishly illustrated, this book should find its way to the library shelves of all Crusaders.

"CREW UMBRIAGO", by Daniel P. Carroll.

Written by the tail gunner of a B-17 crew attached to the 15th AF in Italy, this narrative nevertheless will be familiar to any 392nd aircrew. It takes the crew through training, organization, deployment overseas, and then through the tough 33-mission tour.

Many Groups in the AAF had an "Umbriago". The 392nd had two: #42-51121, a 579th a/c that crashed Nov. 16, 1944 on the Continent; and #42-50337, "Umbriago II". The latter was a 578th a/c being flown by the Majesky crew of the 577th on Dec. 31, 1944 on a mission to Euskirchen, Germany, when they were attacked by German fighters and crash landed in Belgium with wounded aboard.

The word was made famous during those times by the comedian Jimmy Durante, who slapped his forehead and uttered "Umbriago" whenever something went wrong. In Italian, it means "drunkard".

The author, as well as the 392nd BGMA NEWS, would like to hear from any one who crewed "Umbriago" or "Umbriago II".

The author didn't say much about it, because his account was of the war years. But the radio operator on the crew was Norman Lear, who post war is a distinguised movie and TV producer with many movie and TV hits to his credit, including the pioneering blockbuster "All In the Family".



# 578th's "DUGAN" TO REPRESENT GROUP

Keith Hill, the English artist, was commissioned to paint a representative a/c from each of the 60 8AF Groups, and #44-50493, "Dugan", was chosen to represent the 392nd. Each original painting will go on permanent display in the American Air Museum at Duxford, England, and copy #8 of each of the prints will be displayed at the Experimental Aircraft Assocation's museum at Oshkosh, WI. A display of the prints is also planned for the 8AF Memorial Museum.

"Dugan" was assigned to the 578th, and the Bob Vickers crew flew 17 of her 28 missions. According to Bob, Dugan was the name of an old Irish brewmaster in Vickers' home town, Fort Wayne, IN., and he drew a test sample from the vat every day at precisely 11:30 a.m. From that there grew a saying that went around the local German beer halls that went "If it's ok with Dugan, it's ok with me". The crew picked up on it, and "Dugan", with a four-leaf clover added for good luck, became the name of their a/c.

The 578th's operations book, now in the hands of Bob Lane, is incomplete in that missions after March 31, 1945 are missing. But the records available show that her

first mission was on March 14 to Gutersloh, Germany, with the Bilz crew flying her. She flew 10 missions in the last two weeks of March, with the Vickers crew flying three of them. Other pilots were Ansbro, Garcia, Ebersole, Rose, and Hotchkiss. Vickers recalls that two of her missions were to Berlin.

Not much is known about "Dugan's" ground maintenance personnel, because records are very sketchy on this point. However, we do know that the late Ray Berthiaume, the 578th's engineering officer, was in general charge of her maintenance. Ernie Barber, a 578th crew chief and the 392BGMA's archivist, recalls that John Coltran was her crew chief and Tom Alexander, a member of the 578th's engineering section, remembers that Frank Odierno was on Coltran's crew. Bob Vickers reports that Eugene W. Hockmuth was another member of the crew. Neither Coltran, Hochmuth or Odierno are in the 392BGMA directory, and there is no knowledge of their present whereabouts.

"Dugan" was returned to the States in June 1945 by the Henning crew.

\* \* \* \*

An important, yet porgnant, document has come into the hands of the 392nd BGMA. It is the list of 392nd personnel who are buried in 10 different cemetries in England and on the Continent.

The list was obtained from Mr. Bob Burch of Los Angeles, who has compiled it with the help of Col. Ryan of the US Battle Monuments Commission.

The list is in the hands of the NEWS and Ernie Barber, the Group archivist, and will be on display at any 392nd Group meeting. The NEWS would be glad to send a copy to anyone interested, or would search through it for any name or names specified.

#### \* \* \* \* PROFILE

Capt. Charles F. Taylor was the assistant engineering officer in the 576th and 578th squadrons, joining the Group at Alamogordo. On May 7, 1944, he transferred to the 596th Sqdn., 467th Bomb Group, as squadron engineering officer.

He graduated from the school of pharmacy, University of Oklahoma in 1947 and opened Taylor Drugs in 1952 at Perryton, TX. He is still active in the business.

He possesses a complete file of war-time Yank magazine and with that a complete collection of the Sad Sack cartoons. His collection is the source of the Sad Sack cartoons frequently used in the NEWS.

He and wife Billie have a daughter and two grandchildren. They live at 510 SW 15th, Perryton, TX 79070. \* \* \* \*

1/Lt. William J. Riddleberger III was a co-pilot in the 578th Squadron, joining the Group at Wendling in 1944.

Like many of us, Bill was an enlisted man before being commissioned. He was a crew chief on BT-13 trainers at Moffett Feild, CA before becoming a cadet and earning his pilot's

He was co-pilot on the Paul Barton crew and after Barton was killed Lou Stephens became the pilot of the crew. On the mission to Mainz on 9 Sept. 1944, the Stephens a/c had just taken the lead position because the lead a/c had a malfunction when they sustained a direct tlak hit. The plane exploded and Riddleberger and Stephens were blown clear, being the only survivors. They became POW's. (See Lou Stephens profile in the Aug. 1988 392BGMA NEWS)

Liberated in April 1945, Bill was returned to the States and spent a year in the hospital at Valley Forge being treated for the burns suffered in the explosion. While there he met and married Kathryn.

After the war, Bill was manager of the Lewiston Ice and Storage company, but the factory was bought out in 1977 by the government after a disastrous flood and he retired.

They have a daughter and son and five grandsons. They live at 543 Lindbergh Way, Lewiston, PA 17044.


















392nd Revisits (continued from page 1)

The group formed up at Heathrow airport on June 7 when busses from Southampton carrying the QE2 detachment met the incoming flights from various cities in the US.

Six days were spent in King's Lynn, Norwich, Cambridge, and London, with many tacking on extended days to tour Britain and the Continent.

The Mayor of King's Lynn, Mike Tilbury, welcomed the group at the historic town hall.

The old base at Wendling was visited, and a contingent stopped by Litcham High School where they mingled with Principal Peter Hart, his staff and students. Round tables were set up and the veterans recalled the days of 1943-45 for the students.

Norwich was on the itinerary, with part of the group taking the traditional boat trip on the Wensum river and part visiting the 2AD Memorial Library.

A service was held at the Wendling memorial under the leadership of Rev. Philip Rushton and a wreath was laid. The prayer, said at the Memorial and later at the Cambridge cemetery, was composed by the 392-nd's Very Rev. Robert C. Martin, Episcopal priest and a 576th pilot.

Almighty God, Who has blessed us with the will and courage to do our duty, we praise You for our comrades whose death kept freedom living. We praise You also for giving us the years we have lived since their departure. We pray that You will strengthen and sustain our devotion to truth and justice, so that we may be faithful beneficiaries of their sacrifice. Continue Your mercy to our comrades: keep them in Your care; and bring us all at last into Your presence there to rejoice eternally. Amen.

After the memorial service, there was a reception hosted by the Beeston residents and then lunch was served at the Ploughshare, a watering hole often visited by Crusaders in 43-45. A dinner was held at the Duke's Head, and it was during this time that the Diamond Lil flyover occurred.

This full day was attended by Glenn Frankel, London bureau of the Washington Post, and he filed a story about the 392nd that was printed in the Post and read by many Crusaders who live on the East Coast.

The tour was wound up by a visit to the cemetery at Cambridge and the military museum at Duxford, where Roger Freeman addressed the crowd.

Later, Diamond Lil overflew many of the 2AD bases, and saluted Wendling about four days after the 392nd had left. However, one Crusader was still there to take the salute in the person of Harold Hutchcroft, who had stayed behind to visit English friends. A group of faithful villagers were also there to witness the sight.

The British member of the crew was was former RAF David Hastings, an officer of the 2AD Memorial Trust and a long-time acquaintance of many Crusaders.

Diamond Lil, one of the three B-24's in flying condition in the US, has a curious history. She was one of the early ones, No. 18 according to 392nd historian Bob Vickers. She was originally scheduled for delivery to RAF 120 Squadron at Reykjavik, Iceland, but a landing accident prevented it. If she had made it to the RAF, she would have been one of the early fighters, doing anti-sub patrol. B-24's have long legs, as many Crusaders can testify from personal experience.

She was never delivered to the Government, and was later repaired and outfitted by the manufacturer with a cabin and used by the company for passenger and courier work.

She was acquired by the CAF after the war. The CAF was originally a group of US World War II flyers based at Harlingen, Texas who were dedicated to the preservation of US WWII aircraft. The CAF became a nation-wide organization composed not only of WWII flyers but all aviation enthusiasts. It is now based at Midland, Texas.

All members have the rank of colonel, and its mythical commander is Col. Jethro Culpepper, whose general order at all CAF functions is "Don't do nothin' dumb".

Their book argues that although strategic bombing did not in itself bring Germany to its knees, the efforts of the bombers and the fighters of the AAF in Europe greatly hastened the end of the war by destroying the enemy's ability to produce war materiel.

And more importantly they state that the AAF, by driving the Luftwaffe from the skies over Europe, was vitally instrumental to the success of the invasion and the subsequent land campaigns.

The two authors are somewhat controversial. Some readers objected to the authors' presentation of General Eaker's transfer from England to Italy. Also, Mr. McFarland aroused the ire of the 95th Bomb Group and its anthologist, Ian Hawkins, for McFarland's criticism of Hawkins' book about the 95th.


