LONG AWAITED ANTHOLOGY GOES TO PRINTER

Compiled by the noted British anthologist Ian Hawkins and edited by the 392nd's own M/Sgt Bill Braddock, radio operator on the 578th's crew number 1, the book is aptly named 20TH CENTURY CRUSADERS.

There will be many photographs and maps and charts from Ernie Barber's collection of memorabilia.

A long search for a publisher ended when Turner Publishing was chosen. They produced the highly successful Second Air Divison history, and specialize in military histories.

"This book should be in the hands of every Crusader child and grandchild", declared Col Lawence Gilbert, CEO of 392 BGMA and former Group commander. "We will soon all be gone, and our families deserve to know first-hand from our own mouths our contributions

to the long and hard-fought struggle in the ETO in 1943-45," he continued.

"In order to have a successful publication, it is vital that some 1000 books be produced. To reach this goal, each Crusader needs to distribute several copies to his family," Col Gilbert said. It is expected that the book will be

"WALL OF VALOR" AT MIGHTY 8AF MUSEUM

Following are the words of Judge Ben Smith, 303 BG, chairman of the Memorial Gardens Committee at the Mighty 8AF Museum:

"There is a way that Crusaders can share in the building of the magnificent memorial at Savannah.

"As a part of the museum we are building a sanctuary called the Memorial Gardens. A place to pray, a place to reflect, a place to pay tribute to those we loved and lost.

"In the gardens will be the 'Wall Of Valor', much like the impressive wall in the American Cemetery at Cambridge, England. To enhance the serene setting, a long reflecting pool will traverse the center of the gardens alongside the memorial wall. The wall will be an ongoing effort and will continue to expand throughout the gardens.


"Each 8AF veteran may make a donation to the Memorial Gardens. For a minimum donation of \$100, his gift will be recognized on the 'Wall Of Valor'. His name, with rank and unit number,

will be incised on the handsome stone tablet by a master stone carver. These panels will be 4 x 12 inches. The names will be installed on the wall in the order the gifts are received. No matter what the rank or service of the 8AF veteran, he will be accorded equal status on the 'Wall Of Valor'. Those making donations may in like manner honor bomber crews, fighter pilots and crews, ground crews, or service units.

"The wall will be in numbered sections with a master directory for easy identification of your own memorial.

"A memorial committee is on staff to help you with your choice of memorials. They are also available to aid those 8AF veterans that want to be a part of the memorial wall but sincerely feel they cannot make a donation.

"If you make a donation of \$100, your gift recognition memorial will include 24 letters which will suffice for most inscriptions. If additional space is needed for your inscription add at least \$1 per letter to your gift. Please call toll

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COL NED HUMPHREYS

Col E. C. "Ned" Humphreys, Jr., USAF (Ret) died April 22, 1996 at Daphne, AL.

Col Humphreys was a navigatorbombardier in WWII, and continued his career in the Air Force after the war.

Upon retirement, he founded Bombardiers, Inc., an organization devoted to collecting, recording, and preserving the heritage and tradition of the military profession of bombardiering.

He set himself the task of locating every WWII bombardier, and published a newsletter concerning bombardiers.

Bombardiers, Inc. will be shut down in accordance with Ned's pre-set procedures.

He is survived by his wife, Marcia, Spanish Town, AL., 3 sons, a sister, a brother, and 4 grandchildren.

Services with military honors were held May 8 at Arlington National Cemetery.

Ned will be sadly missed by his friends in the 392nd. His passing is yet another reminder of the finiteness of the mighty USAAF.

JOE WHITTAKER TAKES A WIFE




Mr. and Mrs. Joe Whittaker, shown with the B-24 "All American"

NAVIGATOR FINDS KOREA TO BE NOT THE SAME AS THE ETO

The role of the navigator on a B-24 bomber in the ETO in WWII was no picnic. Although bombing was generally done in daylight at high altitude, the long steady run from the IP to the target made the bombers sitting ducks for enemy flak and fighters.

1/Lt (later Lt Col) Bill Petree found things a little different in 1952 when he found himself to be navigator on a B-26 in Korea. Missions were flown by single aircraft at night, at tree-top level, and sometimes in hilly terrain.

On the eighth of his 50 missions, the B-26 was bombing and strafing enemy columns attempting to move at night. On its final run, the a/c was hit by ground fire, and Petree was wounded by a shell which exploded in the cockpit, severely damaging the a/c and knocking out the pilot's communication equipment.

In spite of his wounds, Petree navigated the plane to a friendly position, where the 3-man crew bailed out.

They contacted South Koreans who fought off the attacking North Koreans. After 2 1/2 days of hiding, traveling by night, and fighting, they reached an area where a chopper could pick them up.

For this action Petree was awarded the Silver Star.

GLENN MILLER MYSTERY WOMAN IDENTIFIED

This photo, taken at the Glenn Miller concert at Wendling on Aug. 25, 1944, has been in Ernie Barber's collection for some time, but the lady lieutenant in the picture was not named.

Now, thanks to Mary Beth Barnard, archivist at the Mighty 8AF Heritage Museum at Savannah, she has been identified. She is the former Lt Nancy Luce, a cryptographic officer at 14th Combat Wing. She was in charge of the cryptography at all three 14 CW bases, and on account of that a frequent visitor to Wendling. Now Mrs. Hugh Van Epps, she is the wife of a retired Navy flier, living in Pensacola, FL.

Nancy related to the NEWS that she was in the audience that day, and Glenn Miller asked her to come forward to draw names in a War Bond promotion.

The announcer in the picture is Capt Emmett Fore, 392 Special Services Officer. Between Capt Fore and Lt Luce can be seen (the NEWS thinks) the face of the late Johnny Desmond, the famous singer.

RUDE WELCOME TO ETO: SHOT DOWN BEFORE 1ST MISSION

Arnold Dovey, 579th navigator, has the dubious distinction of being shot down before ever being assigned to a combat mission.

It happened on May 8, 1944. Dovey, not yet assigned to the 392nd, was with a group of Mickey navigators on a training mission out of the 44th BG. The only gunners aboard were the flight engineer and the radio operator; the rest of the crew was the pilot and co-pilot, with no bombardier.

Dovey recounts that it was about noon, and they were at about 23,000 feet, doing their thing with the Mickey equipment. No one expected enemy action, and no look-outs had been posted.

Suddenly they were under fire, taking hits in the tail. The a/c went out of control, and the bail-out was sounded. The pilot did not survive the jump, and the radio operator was killed, but the rest of the occupants of the plane reached the ground safely. They landed near Acle, between Great Yarmouth and Norwich.

Dovey left the a/c by the bomb bay, but was injured by the premature opening of his chute. He spent about a month the the hospital, recovering.

He went to duty with the 44th, but was transferred to the 392nd on July 29, 1944, and flew with the Cassell lead crew in the 579th. He finished his tour on March 23, 1945.

WORD FROM ROGER FREEMAN ON "YMCA FLYING SERVICE"

MIGHTY EIGHTH AF HERITAGE MUSEUM OPENS

"The largest gathering of 8AF veterans ever," mused Sherman Small, 8AF Historical Society director, when some 4,000 former 8AF members and their families attended the opening of the new Museum at Savannah, GA., on May 13, 1996.

Featuring a 100,000 volume capacity library, huge archives, memorial gardens, an art gallery, meeting and study rooms, a gift shop, and a snack bar, as well as a huge exhibit area, the 90,000 square foot Museum is located at the intersection of Interstate 95 and US Highway 80 (Exit 18) in the town of Pooler, Ga.

Crusaders attending the opening noted that much construction work on the outside remains to be done, and there is unfinished work in the Museum itself. However, the main exhibits were in place and were outstanding in character.

The most popular and moving exhibit was the Mission Experience Theatre. Visitors get a mission briefing in a Nissan hut constructed from an original WWII hut brought over from England. Then the visitors move into the Mission Experience Theatre where they "fly" a lifelike WWII mission recreated through the use of film, sound and huge screens. Realistic? A blast of air hits the faces of the audience when the bomb bay doors open.

The Museum promises to be a fitting memorial to the more than 350,000 people who served in the 8AF during WWII, as well as the remainder of the more than one million men and women have served in it from its birth in Savannah in 1942 to the present day.




