VISIT TO 392ND MEMORIAL AT AF MUSEUM, DAYTON

On the grounds of the USAF Museum at Dayton are many memorials to WWII units. Most have a tree and a memorial stone, and the 392nd is represented.

M/Sgt Allen Holtman, USAF (ret), is an associate member of the 392nd, having been too young to have served during WWII.

He recently visited the Dayton museum and placed flowers on the 392nd monument. He said just as he was placing the flowers, the museum opened and the public address system played the Air Force song. It was a memorable moment for him.

He lives near St. Louis, and regularly visits the graves of 392^{nd} men who are buried at the National Cemetery at Jefferson Barracks.

He reported recently that the AF casualty who was once the Vietnam Unknown Soldier but was later identified, was disinterred from the Arlington National Cemetery and is now buried close to 392nd graves at Jefferson Barracks.

EARLY CASUALTIES GO UNKNOWN, UNREMEMBERED

The 392nd lost two men before the first mission was flown.

T/Sgts Walter F. Murphy and Hyman Schwartz, 579th AM's, were sent to Burtonwood, our base supply depot, to crew a new B-24 being ferried to us. The plane crashed on take-off at Burtonwood, and the two crewmen died.

In the hurly-burly of getting organized on our new base and the passage of over 50 years, the incident has been scarcely recorded or remembered.

But Cpl Joe Lewin, a 579th AM, remembers. In a letter to the NEWS, he told about the event and the pall it cast upon the line crews of the 579th.

In Bob Vickers' book Remembrance Of The Missing, there is an entry showing that T/Sgt Murphy died August 30, 1943 and is interred at the Cambridge Cemetery in England. No other information was available to Bob Vickers.

The NEWS has made inquiries about it, seeking further information, but with no success. The passage of time and the death of Crusaders who might have had some memory of it has defeated us.

NOSE ART IN THE 392ND

In the years 1943-45, many young American men found themselves on an airfield in England, flying 4-engine bombers over Europe. They endured intense cold and other discomforts of high-altitude flight in a flimsy, drafty airplane. Also, they encountered many German artillerymen and fighter pilots who intended to kill them.

And, being red-blooded American men, they decorated their aircraft with paintings of scantily-clad women. This was known as nose art.

But higher headquarters, being sensitive to visiting Congressmen and the like, decreed that said scantily-clad women be just that, clad. If you will look closely at the sample of nose art pictured above, you will note that a brassiere has been added, for modesty's sake.

Pleasant Surprise, # 42-51268, was a 578th a/c, lost on Jan. 1, 1945 in Belgium. The crew was Kaiser, pilot; Casstevens, Hoffman, Martin, Brown, Krutys, Kilroy, McGregor, and Wilkerson. According to Bob Vickers' account, the a/c was damaged by AA fire and the crew had to abandon their ship. Some parachuted, some rode it down to a crash landing. Only one was slightly injured. The NEWS has attempted to reach the crew members, but with no success.

AERIAL PHOTOS, CONTINUED



Recently, T/Sgt Paul Wright has sent to the NEWS a striking collection of aerial photos. Wright was a photo interpreter in S-2 at Group Headquarters, from start to finish with the 392nd. These photos found their way into his foot-locker.

Some of the photos appeared in the May 1998 issue of the NEWS, and we plan to make a regular feature of these very interesting photos. Possibly the Smithsonian has a better collection, but these are uniquely ours. If any reader finds a personal connection with any of them, we would like to hear of it.

The NEWS is grateful, not only to Paul Wright, but also to Bob Vickers, whose two books, <u>The Liberators From Wendling</u> and <u>Remembrance Of The Missing</u>, are the definitive histories of the 392nd. It is from these books that we find the stories behind the photos.

The strike photo above was taken on mission #148 on 8 August 1944. The target was a French airfield. Following is Bob Vickers' account: "Air crews were briefed for this target in France at 0530-0630 hours. The 579th Squadron was assigned the lead with Capt Good the Lead Bombardier. All 24 crews briefed took off beginning at 1030 hours after fog had delayed launch time. All aircraft went over the target, releasing 288 500# Gps. The leading 579th hit the MPI precisely while the second squadron over dropped wide of the aiming point. (Editor's note: the bomb bursts portray this.) No fighters were encountered and flak was meager. Four of the planes received some flak damage. All landed back at the base about 1600 hours."



In this dramatic picture, taken on the Hamm mission 22 April 1944, the figure of a man can just be discerned. He has evidently exited his a/c and the chute has not yet deployed. The man could be a crewman from another Group, or he could be one of the 578th's Everhart crew. The Everhart a/c had 12 men on board that day, one of whom was an observer from another Group. The a/c was hit by fire from enemy a/c attack near Hamm and was badly damaged. The crew began exiting in the Hamm area, and the last left the a/c shortly before it blew up over Holland. All 12 survived and 11 were POW. The navigator, 1/Lt Harold Kornman, evaded.



This unusual photo was taken from a 44BG a/c, which was a part of the 14th Combat Wing along with the 392nd. The entire wing was attacking this target, a "No-ball" mission against a German missile launching site. The term "No-ball" came from our not carrying ball turrets on these missions. The date was 2 February 1944.

It is difficult to understand why the Germans launched this missile during our attack, because they were not ground-to-air missiles. Maybe Hans got so nervous with all those 2000-pound bombs exploding around him that he hit the launch button before he dived for a bomb shelter.

392ND WILL HAVE OWN HOSPITALITY ROOM AT 8AF MEET

Cliff Peterson was a 578th pilot, a shot-down, Purple Heart, POW, survivor of the Friedrichshafen mission.

But those are not Cliff's only credentials. He's president of the 392BGMA, and a past president of the 8AF Historical Society. As such, he brings much expertise to annual meetings. Using that expertise, he has arranged for the 392nd to have its very own hospitality room at the 8AF meeting this Oct. 13-19.

Cliff has other credentials; he once was in a movie. In "Strategic Air Command", he was one of the officers in a staff car who greeted star Jimmy Stewart when he arrived on the base after being recalled to duty. "I didn't have a speaking part", says Cliff, "but I slammed that car door hard enough for it to be heard on the sound track".

Col Lawrence Gilbert, CEO of the 392BGMA, has announced that there will be a 392 BGMA Board of Directors meeting at the 8AF convention. It is scheduled for 9 A.M. on Friday, Oct. 16. Immediately following, at 10 A. M., there will be a Membership meeting.

AIRPORT SHUTTLE

Two services are available for transportation from the Philadelphia International Airport—Both have identical fees, currently \$137person one way. Sky Shuttle and Rapid Rover have desky located in the Baggage Claim area of the airport. Just go to the desk and request transportation to the Hilton at Cherry Hill—Both shuttle services offer 24 hour service.

On the Lauta mission of Jan. 16, 1945, 3 aircrews were forced to bail out and 2 crash landed on the Continent due to enemy AA fire or fuel shortage.

The Clower crew crash landed near Luneville, with no casualties.

After the war, Tomaszewski started a machine shop, which he operated until his retirement.


His wife is deceased, and he has three children and four grandchildren. He lives at 438 S. Main St., Raynham, MA 02767.

PROFILE

Cpl Joe Lewin, an AM in the 579th, has a little different story to tell about his service in England. Most ground Crusaders joined at Tucson, Biggs Field, or Alamogordo. They went to England on the Queen Mary in July 1943, stayed at Wendling until June 1945, and came home again on the Queen Mary. After furloughs, they reassembled at Charleston, and were there when the Bomb dropped and soon after that were mustered out. Not all followed this course; some were transferred to the Infantry and fought with them on the Continent.

But this wasn't exactly the way it happened with Joe Lewin. He joined the 392nd at Biggs Field, went over on the Queen Mary, and was at Wendling with the 579th until about D-Day. Then he was transferred to the 492nd at North Pickenham, and shortly after that he went to the 490th, a B-17 Group at Eye. He arrived back in the States in October 1945, and was mustered out.

While in England he married an Irish lass who was working in Eng-

land, and she joined him in 1946.

In 1951 he graduated from Cooper Union Institute as a mechanical engineer, and had a career with the Oak Ridge National Laboratory, retiring in 1985.

In 1977 he earned his private pilot's license.

He was born in Russia, and even though he left there with his parents at the age of five, he was able to revive the ability to speak the language, and became an interpreter for the U. S. Government. He traveled extensively in Europe, spending three years in Geneva, Switzerland. Most of his work had to do with the nuclear disarmament negotiations going on then between the U. S. and Russia.

He told the NEWS that one of the great thrills of his life occurred in Norwich in 1995 during the 50th anniversary of D-Day celebrations. He rounded a street corner and suddenly came face-to-face with the

late Col Myron Keilman, his former Squadron Commander. He recognized the colonel and involuntarily came to a military salute. It says something for his respect and admiration for Col Keilman for that to happen after 50 years' civilian life.

His wife is the former Mellan O'Rorke, and they live at 32508 W. Golf Court, Leesburg, FL 34748. They have five children and grand-children, and one and a fraction great-grandchildren.

PROFILE

S/Sgt Clyde Davis was a crew chief in the 578th. He was an early joiner, meeting up with the 392nd at Biggs Field in April, 1943.

He was married in 1945, and started work for B&M, a food processing company. He retired from the same company in 1983, as plant manager.

His wife is Virginia, and they live at 21 Marion Ave., Norway, ME 04268. They have three children and five grandchildren.

PROFILE

S/Sgt Irwin F. Thompson was the ball turret gunner on the Scheltons crew in the 577th. He arrived at Wendling Jan. 2, 1944.

After he finished his tour, he was an instructor at Lowry Field, CO. During this period he married Marcella.

After discharge, he returned to his job at Pontiac Motors. He retired after 41 years, as assistant superintendent of product engineering.

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

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
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THE 392nd MEMORIAL AT WENDLING
