Col Warren A. Polking, 578th, 1917-2000

Col Polking, the first commander of the 578th, made his final approach on May 23, survived by wife Dette. He was buried at Arlington National Cemetery on June 13.

He commanded the 578th from its beginning in 1943, taking it from a small cadre to a fully trained squadron. He led it in combat until June 1944 when he was rotated back to the States.

After his combat tour he served with the Training Command, and post-war he held many high-level posts in England, France, Japan, and at the Pentagon.

After retirement from the Air Force he spent some 15 years in Mexico. The last six years of his life were spent at San Antonio.

The following business was attended to:


2ADA/392nd Group Meeting

The meeting was presided over by J. Fred Thomas, vice-president. Citing personal considerations and increased responsibilities at home, he stated that he was no longer able to continue as vice-president. He gave a report about 2ADA activities, including a revision of the Roll of Honor to include those killed in the line of duty. He urged the 392nd to continue to be a viable part of the 2ADA.

Charles Dye was nominated for the post of 329nd vice-president to the 2ADA, and was elected by acclamation.

A motion, unanimously passed, was made to bring an overture to the 2ADA for inclusion of 3rd SAD (Watton) in the 2ADA.

Col Gilbert ended the meeting with an expression of gratitude for Fred Thomas' service, both as a president of 2ADA and also as the Group's vice-president for 2ADA.

DOWNED CREWMAN AND FRIENDS GIVE TO MEMORIAL FUND

Capt Jack Adams was the navigator on the Lamma crew in the 579th. His experiences in WWII and particularly with the 392nd were unique, as are the circumstances surrounding a recent \$1,000 gift to the 392BGMA memorial fund.

He was assigned after graduation from navigator school to anti-submarine patrol, first with B-25's and later B-24's. The patrol duty was from Langley Field; Gander, Newfoundland; and later with the RAF over the Bay of Biscay. This duty spanned from the summer of 1942 to the fall of 1943.

With the Battle of the Atlantic virtually won and a shortage of crews in the 8th, the Air Corps transferred the Lamma crew to the 392nd. Having accrued 1250 hours in anti-submarine patrol, Adams was allotted 17 missions credit. With the 25 mission tour in effect at that time, he had only 8 to go.

But fate intervened. On the 3rd, (the 392nd's 8th), the Lamma crew was shot down Nov. 13, 1943, on the mission to Bremen. The weather was terrible, the formations not tight, and the Luftwaffe fighters showed up in

The a/c was badly shot up and in a flat spin when the bail-out order was given and half the crew parachuted safely. KIA were 1/Lt Ralph E. Lamma, P; 1/Lt Duane E. Freeborn, B; S/Sgt George F. Heckendorn, RO; S/Sgt Frank A. Wind, WG; and S/Sgt Ralph Lanier, TG. POW were, in addition to Adams, 1/Lt Nicholas B. Robson, CP; T/Sgt Elmer J. Prudhomue, E; T/Sgt William F. Murphy, NG; and S/Sgt Charles E.O'Reilly,

Adams, after interrogation, was sent to Stalag Luft 1 at Barth, where he remained until May 1945, when he was liberated by the Russians.

Adams is a member of a club in his home town of Santa Barbara, CA., and it is their custom for members to address the club as a part of an evening social program. After hours of research and scratching his memory, Adams put together a talk, with slides, concerning his WWII experiences, particularly his enforced stay at Stalag Luft 1. He engaged some professional help and videotaped it. It was so well received that he sold copies of it with the purpose of donating the funds to the memorial fund. A copy of it is in the 392nd's archives.

Several friends, namely Lyle Shafer, Norman Clement, C. E. Bayless Griggs, and C. Dana White, added their funds to Adams' to total the \$1,000 gift.

In a letter to the 392nd, Jack Adams said, "I thank the good Lord each day for making his face shine on me on Nov. 13, 1943, when my life was spared as half of our crew perished on a Bremen raid. I will continue to support the Memorial Association as I have for the past 15 or 20 years in memory of the friends I lost."

My friend T/Sgt Howard "Buzz" Hoehn, an AM'who is a veteran of the Caribbean, North African, and Pacific theaters, recently told me this story; not about his service in those far-flung battlefields, but about an incident in his youth.

"My mother, bless her departed

soul, was a devoted church member in our central Illinois coal mining town. So when the minister asked if her 13 year old Howard would give the children's sermon, she volunteered my services.

'I went to the minister's office, where he kindly offered to write a small sermon for me to deliver, which he did and it came to 13 or 14 double-spaced pages of typescript.

'The day came for me to perform and I was called to the pulpit. On the way up, however, I dropped the typescript and when I retrieved it, the pages became mixed up.

' Feeling that I didn't have time to sort them out, I read them just as they appeared in the stack before me: pages 1,8, 3, 5, and so on.

'After church, many members came up to me and congratulated me for delivering such a fine sermon.

'From that moment on, I have been convinced that hardly anyone in church ever really listens to the sermon".

memorabilia, now being held at the 8AF Heritage Museum at Savannah, consists of some 10 loose-leaf notebooks with photos in glassine holders. These holders are not archival friendly, and there will be ultimate damage to the photos if the holders are not replaced.

Ben Jones, Litcham-born and an associate member, has volunteered not only to replace the holders, but to copy the photos for the website and to make a second copy to insure that a complete set is in the hands of the 392BGMA, regardless of the location of the originals. This is to be done for the cost of the materials, which is estimated to be about \$300 per notebook. One notebook, which was done on a trial basis, has already been completed. No decision was made as to the ultimate placement of the originals.

It was also decided to canvass the libararians of the four libraries near Wendling to make sure that each library is adequately stocked with 392nd material. The libraries are: 2ADA Memorial Library at Norwich, the community library at Dereham, and the two school libraries at Litcham high school and the Beeston elementary school.

Finally, the Board elected this slate of officers for the coming year: Cliff Peterson, President; Carrol Cheek, Vice-president, Memorial; David Greene, Secretary; Howard Ebersole, Recording Secretary; and Charles Dye, Treasurer. The office of CEO, held by Col Lawrence Gilbert, is a life-time appointment.

No official business was transacted at the annual Group dinner, presided over by Col Gilbert. There were introductions, story-telling, and the traditional singing of " We'll Meet Again" and "God Bless America"

87-year old Harry Kruse, spry as a cricket and deaf as a post, (he had left his hearing aids at home) topped the story-telling. Harry was a 578th AM who helped crew the "GI Jane" as well as other a/c.

Harry's story: Joe Smith, while traveling in England, met a family by the name of Dunn. conversation with the mother, she lamented that she had a son living in the U.S. but she heard from him only sporadically and by telephone. She did not know his address, only that he lived in a small white house in Connecticut.

Upon his return to the States, Smith was traveling with a bus tour and the tour entered Connecticut. At the first stop, Smith asked the

driver where the little white house was. Having been told that it was around in back, he proceeded there and met a man coming out of the house. Smith asked him, "Are you Dunn?" When the man said yes, Smith said, "Why don't you write to your mother?"

Tex was as down-to-earth as old slippers, a really humble man. Who can forget his renditions of "Kalamazoo", "Juke Box Saturday Night", and "Don't Sit Under The Apple Tree" with that great Miller band and the Modernaires.

He held a special place in our memories of our youth. He will be missed.



Ben Jones has undertaken the task of supplying the 392BGMA with the leather Crusader patches that started appearing on the Group's A-2 jackets in

Ben says: these patches are handpainted on genuine fine leather to meet the same specifications of WWII. As the war progressed various hand painted Group patches started appearing on A-2 jackets. As there was no standard size among the various Groups, Hq. USAAF authorized the use of a 5" circular leather patch on which the unit logo could be painted.

The Crusader is drawn on a USAAF approved 5" circular leather patch. Each patch is unique with no two being identical, as with mass produced copies. You can choose between a distressed look or a freshly painted look.

The logo is painted on the leather, then coated with a sealant that protects

it. Like any leather, it is suggested that it not get wet.

The cost is \$20 plus shipping and handling. Ben says also that there will be available soon polo shirts with the Crusader


