147 HAD FINISHED TOURS BEFORE D-DAY

CARNINE CREW CELEBRATES



The 578th's Guy Carnine crew was the first full crew to finish, on March 5, 1944. The crew roster was: G. Carnine, P; V. Mastron, N; N. Hopson, E; B. Barbee, R; ;M. Norby, G; G. Knies, G; N. Kender, G; and L. Oskroski, G.

Higher headquarters in its wisdom declined to release crewmen who had finished their tours and allow them to return to the US. They were held pending the results of the impending invasion of Europe.

Consequently, the Carnine crew was "unemployed". An opportunity for a secret mission arose, and Carnine, Mastron, and Barbee became a 3-man crew manning a B-24 in a clandestine airline under the direction of the famous Norwe-

gian arctic explorer and pilot, Col Bernt Balchen.

They transported Norwegian nationals from the UK to Sweden, and brought back US aircrews who had diverted to Sweden. Their a/c was unarmed, and they sneaked in and out of the Scandanavian area, which was Nazi occupied, under cover of darkness and weather.

Only three members of the crew are still alive: Guy Carnine, Fairfield Glades, TN; Boyce Barbee, Reidsville, NC; and Nick Hobson, Franklin, GA.

John Conrad was a mickey navigator in the 579th and is a 2-term past president of the 2AD Association. While serving as the 392^{nd's} vice-president for 2AD affairs, he painstakingly compiled the accompanying list (He has 23 pages of documentation). He has since that time made corrections and additions.

John gleaned his information from surviving squadron commanders Myron Keilman, 579th; Charles Lowell, 576th; Olin Levell, Jr., 576th; from Willard Pennington, 577th executive officer; and Arthur H. Jensen, 578th NCO in charge of personal equipment.

MORE ABOUT EARLY FINISHERS: DETRICK CREW

The Detrick crew came to the 392nd as replacements in about October of 1943. They had been on anti-submarine duty and were awarded mission credit in varying amounts. Consequently, their navigator, H. P. Hall, was actually the first crewman to finish his tour as an individual.

The rest of the Detrick crew fell in behind the Carnine crew and finished 10th, 11th, and 14-17.

The NEWS had been unable to locate H. P. Hall. The last address available to us was Austell, GA, a suburb of Atlanta.

Two living members of the crew have been located; George Bacon, tail turret gunner; and William F. Dill, flight engineer. They finished 11th and 14th in John Conrad's list.

Bacon lives in Rehoboth, MA. George was featured in a 392BG NEWS article in August, 1995. He was pictured in a news article about the gunnery school that he was attending near Las Vegas in 1943.

Dill lives in Nocogoches, TX. He is a Baptist minister there. (See Profile, this issue).

"OFF WE GO INTO THE WILD BLUE YONDER"

Here's a brief history of that song that still stirs the hearts of Crusaders.

In 1938, the Army Air Corps started searching for their own official anthem and formed a committee for that purpose. Two Army Air Corps wives with famous names, Marilla McDill and Madeline Tinker, headed up the committee.

Liberty Magazine entered the matter, offering a \$1,000 prize for the winning composer.

In June 1939, shortly before the announced close of the contest, word came that Robert Crawford had presented a song. Crawford said that he had written the song during a two-hour flight in his private plane from New York to his

home in Connecticut.

The song received enthusiastic support from the committee and they forwarded it to Chief of the Air Corps Gen Hap Arnold, who almost immediately gave it his approval.

CARNINE, PILOT OF 1ST CREW TO FINISH, IS A PERIPATETIC

Boyce Barbee, Carnine's radio operator at Wendling, says, "Guy seems to move every time the rent comes due". The part about the rent is of course not true, but Guy has demonstrated that he is not one to let grass grow under his feet.

Soon after he finished his combat tour, he was flying secret missions to Sweden (see Page One story, this issue), which illustrates the grass not growing statement.

He enlisted as a private in the Army Engineers in 1935 and retired as Major, AF, in 1958. His Air Force career began when he transferred to the Army Air Corps soon after enlistment. He won his pilot's wings in 1943.

He returned to the US in 1944

after the clandestine Swedish air line duty, and entered a/c maintenance officer's school at Chanute Field, where he met Cliff Edwards, the pilot of the 578th's number one crew of the squadron's original 12. During his career in the Air Force, he was stationed with Cliff five times.

392nd Bomb Group Leather Patches



Ben Jones has undertaken the task of supplying the 392BGMA with the leather Crusader patches that started appearing on the Group's A-2 jackets in 1944.

Ben says: These patches are handpainted on genuine fine leather to meet the specifications of WWII. As the war progressed, various hand painted Group patches started appearing on A-2 jackets. As there was no standard size among the various Groups, Hq. USAAF authorized the use of a 5" circular leather patch on which the unit logo could be painted.

The Crusader is drawn on a USAAF-approved 5" circular leather patch. Each patch is unique with no two being identical, as with mass-produced copies. You can choose between a distressed look or a freshly painted look.

The logo is painted on the leather, then coated with a sealant that protects it. Like any leather, it is suggested that it not get wet.

The cost is \$20 plus shipping and handling.

Ben says also that there will soon be available polo shirts with the Crusader emblem.


