EGAN CREW GETS SQUADRON CO'S COMMENDATION

The 577th's Bob Egan crew was the first in the squadron to finish their tour.

A picture of the crew appeared in the December 2001 of the 8AF NEWS, and it attracted the attention of 392BGMA associate member Mrs. Janet Englemann, who was married to Maj Clinton Schoolmaster, the 577th's commander. Maj Schoolmaster was lost soon after the Egan crew finished while monitoring a mission formation.

The picture triggered something in Mrs. Englemann's memory and she referred to Maj. Schoolmaster's letters to her from England. This is what she found in a letter dated March 31, 1944:


"The boys went over France today-just a little one- it was a good mission for one of my crews; they finished their tour, first of the 577th. They sure were happy, too. So was I, and I lost a good crew, but I don't mind losing them like that".

Bob reports that the only other members of the crew still living are Olson Stogner, WG, Mississippi; and Billy Kennedy, TG, Texas.

The restoration took thousands of man-hours, four years of painstaking work, the financial support of the Ford Motor Company, and the donations of thousands of the Duxford Museum's supporters.

To make room for the Liberator in the museum, the reconfiguration of the exhibits must be completed. This entails an enormous amount of expensive work, including dismantling and rebuilding the glass front wall of the museum.

With that in mind, the 392nd has been asked to contribute to the effort. The fact that the B-24 will carry the markings of the 392nd could possibly encourage Crusaders to join the undertaking. Arrangements have been made to funnel contributions through the 392BGMA treasurer, who will then forward them to the Museum. Already the sum of \$4,945.00 has been reported.

T/Sgt Harold E. Dohm, "Dutchy" to his crew, was with the Lishka crew in the 578th. He joined the 392nd at Tucson, soon after we were formed. He found the Memorial Association through our web

He reports that he was the first in the Group to receive the Purple Heart, being wounded on the diversion mission of Oct. 4, 1943. We lost three crews that day, including Maj Donald Appert, CO of the 579th.

Before retiring he was in the "hot lead" business, heading up Dohm Enterprises, agent for hot metal printing equipment manufacturers. Before the age of computers, most typesetting was done on machines that set the type in lead slugs. Using a laborious system, the type was then transfered to the press.

He is married to Lillian, and their summer address is 115 SE Rogue River Highway #109, Grants Pass, OR 97527. In the winter they live at 39-511 Hidden Water Pl, Palm Desert, CA 92260.

The 392nd was in the forefront of the flood of newly formed and trained Bomb Groups that were deployed to England and the 8AF. The War Department in its wisdom determined that the Groups' squadrons were officered by very young men, mostly in their early twenties. So somewhat older and wiser heads were furnished by assigning more experienced officers to the squadrons as Squadron Executive Officers.

The 577th's was Maj Willard "Penny" Pennington. He received early military training in the CMTC (The Citizens Military Training Corps, from the alphabet-ridden days of the Great Depression) at an army post on Sullivan's Island near Charleston, SC. Penny says that this is where he became acquainted with crusty old Regular Army sergeants and the manual of arms.

commission as 2/Lt in the ROTC. He was called up in 1941 and this gave him the seniority required for the post of Squadron Executive Officer.

Penny is the only one living of the four original Squadron Executive Officers. Bob Lane, the 578th's, was promoted to that post after the lamented leave of the original Squadron Executive.

After the war Penny held various executive positions, mostly in sales, in Scott Paper Company.

He lives with wife Ruth in Houston, where I visited him recently. As I backed out of his driveway and turned to wave goodbye, I beheld a tall, erect, elderly gentleman rendering the military salute. It is a vision so poignantly etched in my memory that it will probably remain there for the rest of my

Ben Jones has undertaken the task of supplying the 392BGMA with the leather Crusader patches that started appearing on the Group's A-2 jackets in 1944.

Ben says: These patches are handpainted on genuine fine leather to meet the specifications of WWII. As the war progressed, various hand painted Group patches started appearing on A-2 jackets. As there was no standard size among the various Groups, Hq. USAAF authorized the use of a 5" circular leather patch on which the unit logo could be painted.

The Crusader is drawn on a USAAF-approved 5" circular leather patch. Each patch is unique with no two being identical, as with mass-produced copies. You can choose between a distressed look or a freshly painted look.

The logo is painted on the leather, then coated with a sealant that protects it. Like any leather, it is suggested that it not get wet.

The cost is \$20 plus shipping and handling.


