## PROPOSED BY-LAW CHANGE

A By-Law change was approved by the Board of Directors at their meeting June 4 at the Chicago meeting. By-Law changes must be published in the NEWS prior to the next meeting and will be presented to the membership for action at the Colorado Springs meeting with the 8AF Historical Society Oct. 14-18, 2003. The proposed change follows:(Additions are in italics, deletions are underlined)

A Trust or Agency may be established under the laws of the United Kingdom with the intent of perpetuity. The principal objective of such a Trust or Agency is to educate the public as to the heroic accomplishments of the members of the 392<sup>nd</sup> Bomb Group. Such educational purpose shall be fulfilled by a variety of means including the maintenance of the Wendling Memorial Monument and the funds designated for those purposes.

## HIS FAMILY

Until now, all the 392<sup>nd</sup> knew about Col Johnson was his experience with us in 1943-45 and that he lost his life in a plane crash in Utah sometime after WWII.

Now, thanks to the alertness of Tom Perry, we have been in contact with his family. Tom, one of our generation's representatives on our website, b-24.net, noticed a story about Col Johnson on the Hill AF Base newspaper's web site and brought it to the attention of the NEWS.

I queried Hill AF Base, who in turn put me in touch with the Johnson family. By a touch of good fortune, I had already planned a Western trip and was able to meet with Col Johnson's family in Payson, UT, his home town. Payson is a small agricultural city about 50 miles south of Salt Lake City.

Living in Payson and nearby Springville are Dr. Gordon Taylor and his sister Mrs. Geraldine Brimhall, nephew and niece of Col Johnson. Dr. Taylor is a retired dentist and is also a former mayor of Payson. He has been instrumental in establishing a memorial to Col Johnson in the city's cultural center.

On Father's Day, Dr. Taylor and Mrs. Brimhall hosted us and some

35 family members at the cultural center.

Col Johnson is known to his family as LaVar, his middle name. They shorten it to Var.

The fact that we know him as Lorin, his first name, is no mystery to me because I am familiar with the Army's practice of ignoring one's middle name. That is if one has a middle name. If there is none, then the Army supplies it: NMI.

Dr. Taylor and Mrs. Brimhall gave us Col Johnson's history before and after WWII and the names of the other surviving members of the family who were unable to be in Payson on Father's Day. They are: Dr. G. K. Johnson, brother, California. Mrs. Lorraine Spainhower, sister, Salt Lake City:

He died on July 3, 2003 at the age of 88 at Dallas, TX. He is survived by wife Joan.

three daughters, Mrs. Judy Doerflinger and Mrs. Mary Jo Jacobsen, Seattle, WA, and Becky Gaynor, Albuquerque, NM; and one son, Jeff Johnson, Bothell, WA.

Col Johnson died on Nov. 30, 1950 when his C-45 light transport plane crashed into a mountain in Utah. He was on a routine flight from Kirkland AF Base in Albuquerque, NM to Hill AF Base in Odgen, Utah. On board with him was S/Sgt Billy Nash, who also perished.

The scene of the crash, about 200 miles south and a little east of Salt Lake City, is one of the most mountainous and inaccessible areas in Utah. The wreckage was found only after a 10-day search, and the ground party reached it after traveling eight miles by vehicle, ten miles on horseback, and three miles afoot.

Lorin LaVar Johnson was born in Woodruff, UT, on Jan. 23, 1917. His parents moved to Payson, UT in 1919, and Johnson grew up there, graduating from Payson High School.

He attended Brigham Young University, during which time he was an enlisted member of a field artillery unit in the Utah National Guard.

He became a flying cadet in September 1939 and graduated from Kelly Field on June 21, 1940 as pilot. He was married to Margaret McCormick on the day of his graduation.

His first assignment was to March Field with the 19<sup>th</sup> Bomb Group. During that assignment he participated in the first mass flight of land based aircraft from San Francisco to Hickam Field, Hawaii.

After several other assignments, in February 1943 he was promoted to Major and took a B-17 Group to the South Pacific. He turned his Group over to the 7<sup>th</sup> AF and returned to the U.S.

Upon his return to the States, he joined the 392<sup>nd</sup> at Alamogordo as Air Executive. He was promoted to Lt Col on Sept. 21, 1943, short-

ly after the 392<sup>nd</sup> arrived in England and flew their first mission against Germany on Sept. 9.

He led the Group and Combat Wing as Command Pilot on several occasions, the most dramatic of which was the mission to Gotha on Feb. 24, 1944.

To quote from Col Bob Vickers' definitive history of the 392<sup>nd</sup>:

"This mission was one of the most vital strikes ever made in WWII against Germany. The 392<sup>nd</sup> led 6 of the 2<sup>nd</sup> Bomb Division's B-24 Groups to the correct target when the leading Combat Wing of 3 Groups made a critical navigation error and turned to an incorrect attack heading.

Post target recon showed the target, a facility which contributed almost 1/3 of Germany's twin-engine aircraft production, almost completely destroyed."

The 392<sup>nd</sup> was awarded the Distinguished Unit Citation for this action.

In March 1944 Lt Col Johnson became Chief of Staff of the 14<sup>th</sup> Combat Wing. He returned to the 392<sup>nd</sup> in June of 1944 to take command, having been promoted to Col. At 27, he was one of the youngest colonels in the 8AF in command of a Group.

He relinquished command of the 392<sup>nd</sup> to Col Gilbert as we re-deployed back to the States in June of 1945.

Post WWII, Col Johnson held the following assignments: Deputy base commander at Victorville AF Base; Deputy and Base commanders at Minter Field and Mather Field.

He returned to Brigham Young University and graduated from there in 1948.

He attended Command and Staff school at Fort Leavenworth in 1948, and completed a tour at the Pentagon in 1948-49.

He was Deputy Base commander at Kirtland at the time of his fatal crash.

## A VISIT WITH PAT McCARTHY

After the June 2ADA meeting in Chicago, we took off for Idaho for a visit with relatives. Our path took us through Missoula, MT, where we visited Pat McCarthy, legendary 578th pilot.

Pat is celebrated in the 392<sup>nd</sup> as the pilot who wiped out a borrowed P-38 over Wendling after an unfortunate contact with a power line at an altitude of about 20 feet.

But while that event forever marked him in 392<sup>nd</sup> lore, the most remarkable incident during his 8AF tour was his walk through occupied France shortly after D-Day. He bailed out of his mortally wounded a/c near Leon-Athies Air Field on June 23, 1944 and walked until he contacted Canadian troops near Caen. They passed him through to U. S. forces and he was air evacuated to London.

Back at Wendling, we noted him and his crew as MIA and went on about our business of mounting air attacks against Germany. After nearly 90 days, the base received a call from London and Col Polking, the 578<sup>th</sup> commander, sent J. D. Long there to identify this bedraggled evacuee from the Continent. Seeing Pat, an incredulous J. D. could only mutter, "S—, it's him."

Pat related this and other events in his life to me in a direct mode of conversation that exemplifies his rugged Montana heritage.

The bail-out over France and the P-38 crash were not the only incidents that prove Pat possesses a charmed life. Before all this happened he was in a head-on train collision near London that killed all the occupants of his compartment except him.


He was of course court-martialled for the loss of the P-38, but escaped with a fine of \$600. Pat said, "While that was a lot of money in those days, it beat having to pay \$107,000 for that P-38." Talk that I've picked up over the years about the court-martial indicates that his superiors testified that they couldn't spare such a warrior.

He went back to duty after the court-martial and did a total of 27 missions before the authorities decreed that because of his evadee status he should not fly over enemy territory again.

Back in the States about Christmas of 1945, he went through B-29 training and was poised to deploy to the Japan theater when the bomb dropped at Hiroshima and the war ended.

He finished his undergraduate degree at the University of Montana in Missoula and then earned his medical degree at the University of Utah. He practiced as an internist in Missoula until about 1990, when he retired from the medical profession and became a rancher.

He said to me, like the song that Willie Nelson sings, "Mothers don't let your babies grow up to be cowboys", he grew tired of such things as picking

up a railroad tie under each arm and dragging them a mile or so to fix a fence. Concluding that he could no longer afford to feed 250 head of cattle, he sold the expletive deleted ranch.

He lost his wife about three years ago and he's back in Missoula. His only daughter lives nearby.

When he left us at our motel, he remarked that as a teenager he had worked at that site when it was an onion farm. He went on to demonstrate what it was like in those Depression days. "I was paid 60 cents a day, and after a summer's work I had accumulated \$32. I went to the Mercantile to buy my winter school clothes and was so flush with the money that I bought a plaid jacket and a plaid pair of trousers. When I got home, my mother said, Don't you see anything wrong with that outfit?"

Pat's still lean and erect but walks with a cane because of two 14-year-old hip replacements that are wearing out.

He said as we parted, "Don't you sometimes think that all this has been a dream and it never happened?" Maybe so, but it was real enough back in those Wendling days.

Much has been said and written about "the right stuff". Dr. Clarke G. "Pat" McCarthy has it.



## Leather Patches



Ben Jones has undertaken the task of supplying the 392BGMA with the leather Crusader patches that started appearing on the Group's A-2 jackets in 1944.

Ben says: These patches are handpainted on genuine fine leather to meet the specifications of WWII. As the war progressed, various hand painted Group patches started appearing on A-2 jackets. As there was no standard size among the various Groups, Hq. USAAF authorized the use of a 5" circular leather patch on which the unit logo could be painted.

The Crusader is drawn on a USAAF-approved 5" circular leather patch. Each patch is unique with no two being identical, as with mass-produced copies. You can choose between a distressed look or a freshly painted look.

The logo is painted on the leather, then coated with a sealant that protects it. Like any leather, it is suggested that it not get wet.

The cost is \$20 plus shipping and handling.

Ben says also that there will soon be available polo shirts with the Crusader emblem.


