2ND GENERATION STUDIES CRUSADER HISTORY

J. FRED THOMAS GOES HOLLYWOOD

Here's what J. Fred had to say about it:

"I hadn't thought of Jane Russell in years and had no idea of what to expect, but things went great and it was a most enjoyable evening. It turned out that Tom (Tom Nelson, 93rd BG Armament Officer who had dated Jane in their teenage years) and I were the only veterans who attended. We each sat on either side of Jane, and unlike too many meetings we were able to carry on a conversation without interruptions.

'Someone had tipped the TV people, and NBC, CBS, and ABC had their reporters show up to

She had brought some "glossies" and I selected the picture where she was sitting in the hay in the picture "The Outlaw". When you read this you will know why this old man cried when she autographed it for me. She is a sweetheart and I nominate her the Pinup Girl of the 2AD".

TWO FAMILIES FIND THE RECORD OF RELATIVES WHO WERE LOST ON THE MISSION TO BERLIN APRIL 29, 1944

At Wendling, we seldom knew exactly what happened to crews that were reported MIA. Aircrew de-briefings did not furnish much information, especially if German fighter opposition was heavy and the battle spread all over the sky.

Occasionally, wonder of wonders, evadees would arrive back at the base, to be greeted with much relief by the Group. And POW reports filtered back, slowly. But many crews just disappeared. All we could do was put the losses aside and prepare for the next mission. That was the inevitability of fighting a war against a determined enemy.

After the war, Col Bob Vickers, 578th pilot, wrote two definitive histories of the 392nd. The first, "The Liberators From Wendling", was taken from U. S. official reports of the missions. The second, "The Men and Their Missions" was compiled from the Government's post-war investigations, labeled Missing Aircraft Crew Reports, or MACR's.

The families of 2/Lt Douglas Franke and Sgt John P. Bonnassiolle have found what happened on that day in the sky over Germany by building on these records, interviews with Crusader survivors, second generation researchers, and German researchers.

The Group's losses on this mission were the second heaviest of the war: 8 aircraft and 77 aircrew members.

Lt Franke

Lt. Franke was the navigator on the Wyatt crew. In "Liberators" all that was reported was "in ship #510 of the 579th Squadron, nothing is known further surrounding the loss of 2/Lt B. W. Wyatt's crew".

In "The Men and Their Missions", all that Col Vickers could glean from the MACR was, "No report exists from inflight eye-witnesses' accounts on the loss of this aircraft. Other records indicated this aircrew did fly this mission with formations of the 392nd's sister

Sgt Bonnassiolle

Sgt John Bonnassiolle was a waist gunner on the Bishop crew in the 578th. In "Liberators" it was reported "in ship #105 from the 578th, 2/Lt R. R. Bishop's crew was last seen after the first fighter attack at 1103, position 5240N-1020E, with the aircraft's right elevator shot up. No chutes were seen from this ship."

In "The Men and Their Missions", in addition to the above, Col Vickers said that there were no more additional reports on the loss of this aircrew and ship in the MACR.

Group, the 44th, to the Berlin target complex. However, little else was known about the crew's fate". Vickers went on the give grave registrations of 5 of the crew.

This very sparse information did not daunt Robert H. Franke and his daughter Annette Tison. Mr. Franke is the brother of Lt. Douglas Franke. The 392nd has file correspondence with Mr. Franke in 1991 and 1993 which indicates that he was searching for information at that time.

Annette became a member of the 392BGMA and with the help of Crusaders and second generation members the search for information culminated in a visit to the crash scene and interviews with eye witnesses.

Here follows Annette's story of her uncle's fatal mission and its aftermath, taken from material that she furnished the NEWS.

The breakthrough on the hunt for information came when the Franke family made contact with Markus Graw, a 10 year veteran of the German Air Force who lives near the village of Dinklage, about 230

miles west of Berlin. Mr. Graw had been researching war-time crashes in the area and he found the name of Lt. Franke in a cemetery nearby. A query was made to b24.net, and within days the late Cliff Peterson and Ernie Barber had put him in touch with Robert Franke.

Much correspondence ensued and a picture of the final minutes of a/c #510, "El Lobo", came to life.

The a/c was seen in the target area by Capt Robert Copp, a 577th pilot, and this was the last time it was identified by any American.

An eyewitness, who was 13 at the time, remembered that he heard gunfire coming from above the clouds and then a smoking plane emerged from the clouds and headed towards the woods where it finally crashed.

Another eyewitness remembers that as the plane crossed overhead a crewman jumped out without a parachute, sure proof that things were desperate inside the plane.

Apparently, just before the plane hit, another man bailed out. He was found dead, dangling from his partially opened chute that had been caught in a tree. Annette believes that this man was her uncle, Lt Douglas Franke.

The a/c still had its bomb load aboard and German army personnel later detonated them. It is speculated that some kind of an equipment failure kept the crew from releasing their bombs over the target.

Robert Franke, having gone through some years of searching and now having found all the answers, had the feeling that it would be fitting to have a monument erected at the crash site. The problem of placing an American monument in a German location was solved when the monument bore the inscription that it was dedicated not only to the memory of the American crew but also to the Germans in the area, civilian and military, who lost their lives in 1939-1945.

On April 29, 2004, a dedication ceremony was held at the monument. Present was a ceremonial U.S. Air Force detachment headed by B/Gen Vernon Findley who was representing Gen Fogelsong, commander of USAF in Europe. Over one hundred people were present, including local government officials, officiating clergymen, and German Air Force officers, both active and retired.

Paulette Gooch is the sister of Sgt. Bonnassiolle and was a young child when he was lost.

She started her search for the details of her brother's death on the Internet and found his name at the U. S. Military cemetery in the Netherlands. She posted his name, a/c number, and unit on the b-24.net web site and soon received an avalanche of responses. She heard from Annette Tison; Bud Guillot, a Crusader who witnessed the crash of the Bishop a/c; Hal Province, Daniel Stockton, and Greg Hatton.

Then she heard from Jim Marsteller, who put her in touch with Enrico-Rene Schwartz in Germany. Enrico's seven-person team, named Missing Allied Air Crew Research Team, work to find Allied airmen who are still

missing in action, with the assistance of the Military Cemetery staff.

The search was concentrated on a farm owned by the Gudehus family. The present and sixth-generation owner, Willy Gudehus, was seven years old on the day of the crash and he vividly remembers the dog fight in the air overhead. The German fighter planes attacked and finally the large B-24 bomber spiraled down to a horse pasture below.

Only a minute separated that crash and the crash of the 576th's Kamenitsa crew. Three of that crew were KIA, and one of the survivors, Bud Guillot, told Pauline that he witnessed the Bishop crew's crash. He wasn't sure until 2003 which plane he had seen.

The MAACRT crew worked at the crash site diligently but didn't find anything definitely identifying the aircraft. One Sunday as Enrico was returning home from a business trip to Bremen he felt the impulse to stop at Meitze and try once more. He began sifting dirt and noted an object that might be part of a gunner's jacket. When he examined it further he saw a strip of leather with the name Bonnassiolle on it. Later in the day he found engine identification numbers and then there was no doubt that he had located the crash of the Bishop plane, #42-110105.

In October of 2003 Pauline and her son visited the crash site, there to be welcomed by the Gudehus family and the local townspeople. While there they located a piece of the cowling from the Kamenitsa plane, which she brought home and mailed to Bud Guillot.


Also, we received belated news of the civilian accomplishments of Jack Kaplan, who died Jan. 24, 2004.

Carroll Cheek and Jim Marsteller were re-elected to the Board of Directors. Also elected were Mary Peterson and Tom Perry, all serving a 3-year term.

Don't miss the symposium on the Kassel mission on Saturday, Oct. 9 1-4 at the hotel. The mission, flown on September 27, 1944, was a disaster for the 445th. They strayed from the bomber stream and lost 25 of their 26 a/c. This was the largest loss of any 2AD Group for any one mission. The 376th Sqdn. of the 361st FG accounted for 18 enemy a/c and probably saved the 445th BG from total annihilation.

The 392nd encountered no fighters on this mission but the flak was moderate and accurate. The 577th's Lt R. A. Petty crew in a/c #867 was forced to land at Antwerp with engine problems. The crew was returned by C-47 on the 29th of September.



Below is a scene from the Operations Room of the 577th Squadron. Pictured left to right are (then) Major Lawrence Gilbert, Group Operations Officer; B/Gen James P. Hodges, CG 2nd Air Division; and Major Clinton Schoolmaster, commander of the 577th. And in the corner out of the way of all that brass is Sgt Herman Canfield, Squadron Operations Clerk.



Major Schoolmaster was lost shortly after this picture was taken. He was transferred to the 95th Combat Wing and was there only a few days when he went down when flying a P-47 monitoring bomber formations. Neither wreckage or his body were ever found.

Mrs. Janet Englemann, his widow, has furnished the NEWS this passage from his diary:

"Thurs., Feb. 17, 1944. Not much happened today, thank God. Very nasty weather; it's been trying to snow all day. Drizzle, then a little snow, then




