





## 392<sup>nd</sup> WILL RALLY TO SUSTAIN WENDLING MEMORIAL

HISTORY OF THE MEMORIAL



The material for this story was researched by Annette Tison The idea to leave a memorial at Wendling was conceived by Col Joseph Bush, the 392nd's Ground Executive Officer. Approval was granted by Hq. 8th Air Force, and it was the first memorial erected at any of the 8th Air Force bases.

The sum of \$2,364 was contributed by the officers and men of nearly all of the organizations on the base. The memorial plot, located at the junction of the Beeston-Wending roads was donated by Mr. Garner of Longham Hall.

A nine foot granite obelisk was procured, along with bronze tablets upon which would be named not only the 392nd Bomb Group with it four Squadrons, but also all the support organizations that also occupied the base.

The memorial was dedicated on Sunday, Sept. 2, 1945. With the 392nd returned to the US, Col Everett W. Stewart, CO of the 4th Fighter Group. officiated at the ceremonies. The RAF now occupied the airbase and they supplied the personnel for the Honor Guard.

By 1987 funds to maintain the memorial had run out. The landscaping had fallen into disarray, the concrete base of the obelisk was disintegrating, and sometimes water stood on the grounds. This situation was discussed at the

## JACK NEWTON **CONNECTS WITH** 392ND BGMA

At the reunion, we welcomed our newest member, John W. "Jack" Newton from South Natick, MA. He was just a young boy when his cousin, 1/Lt James S. Hurd, went off to military service in 1942.

In late June, Jack posted a query on www.b24.net asking for information about Hurd. Jack soon learned that he was copilot on 1/Lt Owen H. Filkel's crew. They were flying lead when their a/c, #42-95222, crashed shortly after take-off on Aug. 5, 1944, killing all aboard. The website gave eyewitness accounts of the accident as well as a photo of the wreckage.

Several of our researchers invited Jack to attend the reunion. He did, and the warm welcome he received far exceeded his expectations.

Within hours of his arrival, he was in our hospitality suite thumbing through the reference books there. In one, he found a note from bombardier 1/Lt James R. Tudor that identified him as a member of Filkel's crew. Tudor was not at the reunion, but Jack got his phone number from the 392nd BGMA Directory and was soon talking with

This was just one of several serendipitous events in Jack's quest to learn more about his cousin.

In 1998, he found a brief obituary from 1944 about Jim's death. Unfortunately, there were no family

members to tell him how Jim died. Without his Army Serial Number. he couldn't get help from government sources.

Then, in June 2007, a chance introduction to an 8th AF veteran led him to www.b24.net and its vast archive of 392<sup>nd</sup> BG information, and then to our reunion.

Jack is still amazed. "In the matter of just a few weeks, I went from knowing very little about my cousin, to reading reports of his missions and talking with a veteran who had served on the same crew with him for 23 missions and knew him very well."

Luck had played a part in Jack's quest once before. In 1953, he visited St. Paul's Cathedral in

London and came across the American Roll of Honor, which lists US service personnel who gave their lives in the defense of Great Britain. Each day a page of that book is turned, so that a different set of names is on display each day. "On the day I was there, the book was opened to the page with 1/Lt

392nd BGMA reunion in Tulsa, OK in June 1987, and it was decided to raise enough funds to refurbish the monument and establish a trust fund for its maintenance.

Carroll Cheek was named vice president for memorials, and he led the entire effort until its successful conclusion. In addition to his providing a significant challenge donation, he made several trips to Wendling to oversee the project. He induced the United States Battle Monuments Commission to furnish plans for the refurbished memorial.

Tom and Jill Scott, landowners near Beeston, donated land which doubled the size of the plot and allowed room for a parking lot. Tom, a substantial farm operator, furnished equipment, labor, and material.

The new memorial was rededicated as a part of the 392<sup>nd</sup> BGMA reunion in England in October 1989. The ceremony took place on Friday, Oct. 6, and Carroll Cheek acted as master of ceremonies and made the introductory address. The main speaker was Col Lawrence Gilbert, CEO of the 392ndBGMA and the Group's final commanding officer. He eulogized those who gave their lives while flying combat missions from this place and how this memorial is dedicated in their memory. His address ended in a standing ovation. To conclude the dedication, the thirty 392nd BG veterans formed a circle around the memorial and a wreath was laid by J. D. Long, Charles Dye, Myron Keilman, and Cecil Rothrock.

## A CRASHED B-24 LEADS A BELGIAN TO A U.S. WIFE

First-time reunion attendees Peter and Connie Loncke from Groveland, Illinois, joined us at Kalamazoo. It didn't take long to learn that their marriage is due in part to a 392<sup>nd</sup> ship that crashed in Belgium in 1945.

Peter grew up in Lommel, Belgium. In 1980, his uncle gave him a photo of him and his son sitting on the wing of a crashed B-24. Unfortunately, he couldn't remember when or where the picture was taken. In 1988, another man showed Peter more photos of that plane. This time, he could see the marking CI on the waist and the serial number on the tail.

Years of research followed. Peter discovered the a/c was the 392nd's Gashouse Gus (#41-29476), lost during Operation Varsity. (It was the low-level supply mission in support of American, British and Canadian paratroopers near the town of Wesel, Germany, on March 24, 1945. See the February 2007 issue of the 392BGMA NEWS for the story of this mission.) Through the efforts of Jim Goar, Jim Marsteller, and Ben Jones, he learned that the pilot that fateful day was 2/Lt Herchel Proctor. He contacted surviving crew members and exchanged information and photos with them.

Like ripples that spread from a stone tossed in a pond, Peter's interest in Operation Varsity grew. Having learned about Gashouse Gus and her crew, he now expanded his research efforts to include all the B-24s that went down during the Wesel mission.

The next B-24 crash site he

discovered was of another 392<sup>nd</sup> a/c, E for Easy (#42-50709), piloted by 2/Lt Jack Hummel and 2/Lt Jim Reynolds.

In early 2000, Peter solved the mystery of where a 44th BG ship, Kay Bar (#42-100314), had crashed with the entire crew killed. An article in that Group's newsletter told of his findings. The story was read by Joseph Crandell, whose brother Leonard was her pilot. He contacted Peter in Belgium and an exchange of phone calls, letters, photos, and videos followed.

In September 2001, Peter and Connie met for the first time. She had traveled to Europe with her parents, Joseph and Barbara Crandell, so that Peter could take them to Kay Bar's crash site in Germany. The Crandells first attended the unveiling of a 44th BG memorial in Belgium, which Peter was instrumental in establishing.

Then they went to Hamminkeln, Germany, for the dedication of a memorial plate in honor of all the American airmen killed during Varsity. It is on the outside wall of the town hall next to two memorial plates honoring British airborne troops killed on that mission.

The new memorial was also

Peter's idea, and he had enthusiastic support from the dozens of families and friends he had contacted during his research. While Connie watched, her father, mother, Peter, and the town mayor lifted an American flag to reveal the plate.

It lists the nine 2<sup>nd</sup> Air Division bomb groups who had participated in that mission. Underneath, in German and English, is the purpose of the plaque: "We build a bridge between our people to set aside the past and come together to honor these brave men who are now united in peace where there is no war."

It was an emotional trip for everyone, and especially for Peter and Connie. Their friendship quickly grew into love and they were married in October 2003.

Two years later, on the 60<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Wesel mission, Peter published a book, "The Liberators Who Never Returned." It was an account of all he had learned in his many years of careful research into Operation Varsity and the B24s that had crashed. He said the book would not have been written without the help and encouragement of his co-pilot Connie.

Peter has become an expert on Operation Varsity. But his best research find, he'll tell you, is Connie. And it all began with a photo of a 392<sup>nd</sup> BG plane.

## 392BGMA MEETING AT KALAMAZOO 8AFHS REUNION A HUGE SUCCESS

At the Kalamazoo meeting held July 17-21 the 392nd's hospitality room, always a fixture at 8AFHS and 2ADA reunions, took on renewed life under a committee composed of 2<sup>nd</sup> generation members.

Led by 392BGMA Director Ben Jones, they were: Loretta Bedus, Bob and Carol Books, Greg Hatton, Jim and Karen Marsteller, Bill McCutcheon, Dennis and Joanne Rogers, and Annette Tison. The hospitality room was always well stocked with libations and foodstuffs and was nearly always standing room only in the evenings.

The Annual Membership Meeting was held on July 20. In the absence of CEO Col Lawrence Gilbert (wedding in the family) and President Charles Dye (wife Helen down with a knee operation) Vice-president Jim Goar was voted acting chairman.

Reports heard and matters discussed and voted upon were:

Memorial at Wendling: (See page one story about finances and fund drive.) In accordance with previous actions, the Scott family will remain in charge of the Memorial.

Treasurer's report: Bill McCutcheon reported that funds on hand, in cash and in money market funds, amount to about \$19,000. This "net worth" of the Association has remained relatively stable for some years at this amount in spite of the passing of some of our first generation members. In order to stabilize this situation, annual dues were increased from \$15 to \$20.

Report from the Board of Directors: At the Board meeting held the previous day, the Directors appointed John Gilbert to be the 392nd's official representative at Wending. (See story, this issue for more information about John Gilbert.) They also appointed Wallace Blackburn, gunner on the 576th's Jack Ross crew, to replace Director Mary Rothrock who asked to be relieved. Report on the Web site, b24.net. Bob Books, web master, reported that the average Bomb Group web site gets between 2 and 3 thousand hits a month while ours reaches 40,000. Bob noted that it is a team effort and credit for its success goes to many 392nd researchers. He reported that a ground crew roster of about 2, 500 has been added to the site, and that there are currently posted identified photos of about 3,000 air echelon Crusaders. Bob also reported that 392nd researchers have been and will continue to work on a digitalized version of the Roll of Honor at St. Paul's Cathedral in London. The 8AFHS will fund this effort in the amount of \$5,000.00 and the fund is to be managed as a separate item in the 392nd treasury.

Report from the 2<sup>nd</sup> Air Division Association: Oak Mackey, wearing his hat as both President of 2ADA and our Vice-president for 2ADA affairs, said that currently there is a dust-up concerning the Fulbright Librarian at the Norwich Memorial Library. Seemingly the Fulbright commission has terminated the arrangement. Oak commented that the matter is a work in progress. Oak was thanked for his informative articles in the 2ADA JOURNAL.

**2008 Reunion:** Our By-Laws provide that the Annual Meetings of the 392BGMA be held at 8AFHS and 2ADA in alternating years. Accordingly, the 2008 reunion would be with the 2ADA. However, the 8AFHA meeting will be at the Mighty Eighth Museum in Savannah in 2008, which is a major reason for the 392<sup>nd</sup> to meet there. The matter was left to the Board of Directors, and at their meeting following the Membership Meeting Savannah was decided upon.

Election of Directors: Gil Bambauer, chairman of the nominations committee, presented this slate for the class of 2010: Carroll Cheek, Jim

## AIRMAN, ESCAPEE, TELLS OF HIS WWII EXPERIENCES

For the last 7 or 8 years, 576<sup>th</sup> Sqdn radio operator George W. Michel has been on a mission. He's been talking to people of all ages about World War II. Not the whole war, just his little part of it.

He wears his old uniform and can still get all of the buttons buttoned. He tells them what it was like to fly a mission, to get shot down, to be interned in Switzerland, and then to escape with the help of the French Resistance.

He talks about what it was like to see flak up ahead, hear the shells burst and flak fragments hit their plane, and to know you had no choice but to fly through it and hope they made it out to the other side.

He talks about being in a badly damaged plane and given a choice: bail out or trust the pilot to get you down alive, in one piece, and not in German hands.

His audiences range from first graders to college students to senior citizens. Nearly 1,500 people have heard his 2 ½ hour presentation by now. He's an interesting speaker

He always has a question-andanswer session. Some of the questions, like "How did you go to the bathroom?" are fun to answer. Others, like "Were you scared?" are much more difficult.

"One time," George reports, "I

was showing a first grade class some pieces of flak. I explained where flak comes from and how it tumbles and does not move like the bullet out of a gun. Then, one of the students looked up at me with the most sincere expression on his face and said, 'But, Mister, that could really hurt you.' That's when you know your message is coming through loud and clear."

there is one constant in George's presentations. "I always tell them, especially the kids, that Freedom Is Not Free. Then I ask their permission to tell them why. I ask them to look around and pick out four close friends and to imagine those friends having been killed. Then I tell them about four of my closest friends who entered the service when I did in 1943. I tell the students that my four friends were killed in WWII. I tell them how and where they died. I explain that the deaths of my friends helped give me the Freedom that I have today. And I suppose, deep down, I'm begging this young generation, please don't let it happen again."



## Chaplain's Corner

Dietrich Bohnhoeffer, the martyred German theologian of the WWII era, wrote a lovely poem during his imprisonment. "Who am I?" he asks, and offers a series of answers which people give concerning him. He finds each of them inadequate, and concludes, "Whoever I am, O Lord, Thou knowest." I suppose that is the answer for each of us: our real being is known only to God, and He does know us, and each by name, and in His good time He will tell us who we are.
