Col. Myron H. Keilman

Col. Myron H. Heilman commanded the 579th Squadron from October 1943 to October 1945. He joined the Group May 15, 1943.

After the 392nd was deactivated, he served in various commands in Korea, Japan, Hawaii, Saudi Arabia, and in the continental U. S. He retired in 1970 from the Sacramento Logistics Center.

Col. Keilman has written several accounts of World War II action which have been published in the 2nd Air Division Assn. Journal. He and Blanche Harmon Keilman have two sons and a grandson. They live at 6616 Buckhorn Drive, Sacramento, CA 95842, and have a "summer home" in a "cabin at the end of the road in the heart of the Montana Rocky Mountains".

S/Sgt. Bill McGinley

S/Sgt. Bill McGinley, gunner and aircraft mechanic, joined the 579th on October 15, 1943, and was shot down over Belgium on his ninth mission on January 29, 1944. He was reported K.I.A. (his mother never believed it), but parachuted to safety and the Brussels underground sheltered him until the advancing allied forces liberated him in September 1944.

Bill McGinley worked as an insurance salesman in Little Rock, and is now retired on a small farm at R#1, Box 534, Mabelvale, Arkansas 72103. He and his wife, Bonnie, have two children.

Col. Warren A. Polking, Jr.

Col. Warren A. Polking, Jr. was the 578th's first commander. He finished his 25 missions in 1944 and was rotated home. He was in the original 392nd cadre, joining in January 1943.

After service with the 392nd, Col. Polking held various staff and command positions in the U.S., Europe and Japan. He had tours at the U.S. Embassy in Paris, with the RAF and with the Joint Chiefs of Staff.

Col. Polking spent 15 years in business in Mexico after military service, and is now retired. He entered service December 22, 1939 at Ft. Crook, Nebraska.

He and Dette Hagan were married in 1951. They now live at 17073B Bernardo Center Drive, San Diego, CA 92128.

T/Sgt. Tom Horn

T/Sgt. Tom Horn was Group Armament Inspector, joining the 392nd early in its life at El Paso in March 1943.

Going back to his beloved Blue Grass State in 1945, Tom has been farmer, tobacco buyer and popcorn specialist.

He lives with wife, Ann, at 1189 Britmart Road, Elkton, KY 42220, and they have one child and three grandchildren.



392nd Stories -- by Myron Keilman

Charlie Neundorf led one of the 392nd Squadrons on the Arnheim low level supply mission in support of General Montgomery's attempted "break through". One of the planes, flown by a Lt. Sewell, was lost. About a week after the mission, Charlie was on his way to the mess hall on his bike and passed a fellow walking along with a big white bandage on his head. He glanced at him and rode on, but then realized that the fellow looked like Lt. Sewell. He did a quick 180 and met the man. Sure enough, it was Lt. Sewell.

What had happened was that Lt. Sewell flown his plane too high in the formation and it was hit by ground fire and damaged so that it was necessary to climb to a thousand feet, bail the crew out, and then crash land the plane. While crash landing, his subconscious told him he had to quickly run away from the plane to prevent his capture by the Germans. This he did. While running madly, he felt something flapping against the side of his He reached up to find out what it was and found it was his scalp hanging loose and flapping in the breeze. Luckily, he was taken by a Belgian family to a hospital where the scalp was sewn back on his head. He was then returned to the Allied army which returned him to the 392nd Bomb Group.

Then, there is another "Unlucky Harry White" story. It seems Harry flew another mission where he was shot up so badly he couldn't drop his bombs. He managed to get the plane and bombs back to the 392nd at Wendling. He landed on the short runway, ran off the end, but managed to keep the plane moving so as not to get stuck, and taxied back to the parking area. He was promptly "chewed out" by an anonymous squadron CO. Harry says that, to this day, he doesn't know why.

Then there was the pilot that 35 years after completing his tour of combat learned there was a climb-out pattern to fly and a formation assembly procedure. It seems that the lieutenant would take off, climb straight ahead until he broke through the clouds, then join up with whatever formation he caught up with. Sometimes it was the 392nd!

Then there was the ball turret gunner that at breakfast before every mission procured a couple of empty cans. his first mission, as the formation crossed the English Channel and before the climb to bombing altitude, the pilot ordered all gunners to test fire their guns. While the ball gunner was checking out his guns, the pilots, navigator and bombardier took advantage of the occasion to use the relief tubes to empty their bladders. In doing so, they sprayed the ball turret to the extent that the visibility from within This made the turret and the was zero. gunner absolutely useless for the duration of the mission. Thus, to avoid episodes of this kind in the future, the sergeant issued an empty can for the flight deck and to the bombardier before every mission
