CREWMAN SPOTS HIS SHIP IN A BOOK



Sharp-eyed Crusaders still can recognise the 392nd's Group markings when they see them in books and magazines.

Bill Barrett, a 577th combat crewman, picked up a Time-Life book in a used book store and saw immediately that a B-24J that was depicted in it carried the 392nd's markings. He remembered that he had flown his first and third missions in it.

The book, "Air War in Europe", by Ronald H. Bailey, was published in 1981. The illustration of the B-24 was by the English painter, John Batchelor.

Mr. Batchelor has graciously given the NEWS permission to use the painting, and has furnished a transparency so that the reproduction will be as good as we can make it.

The artist worked from a photo, and the markings are correct. According to the Group's semi-official a/c inventory compiled by the late Quintin Wedgeworth, a/c #42-94898 was marked DC N+ and was named Marion. Later, Wedgeworth states, it was renamed Terri Ann. It flew 26 sorties and was returned to the States in June, 1945.

The painting shows the a/c in olive drab paint. Barrett cannot remember for sure whether it was aluminum or O.D. but it was probably aluminum at that stage of the war. ("That stage" being determined by the fact that it flew only 26 sorties before the war ended.)

Most a/c were given feminine names, and "Marion" in the US is the masculine spelling of the name. However, John Batchelor tells us that Marion is the feminine spelling in the U.K. and that he cannot remember ever hearing of the name being used as masculine in England. So Batchelor guesses' that "Marion" was the name of some crewman's English girl friend. Does the fact that the a/c's name was changed to Terri Ann before it was returned to the States have any significance?

F/Lt. Richards was a Welshman and passed away in Wales some 5 or 6 years ago, it was reported to the NEWS by his nephew, Peter Gorridge of Norwich. Postwar, he was a bank manager in Kent.

1948 NEWSLETTERS DISCOVERED

Volume nos 1 and 2 for March and April 1948 of a 392nd newsletter published in Philadelphia have been found, thanks to Bob Lane's extensive collection of memorabilia.

Although the editor did not identify himself, he could only have been the late Clair Paul Burtner, Group Armamant Officer, and a phone call to his widow, Peg, confirmed this. Crusaders will be glad to know that she is alive and well in Potomac, Maryland.

Highlighting the stories in the two publications is a letter from Col. Irvine Rendle, the Group's first commander. He wrote that his present duty was A-5 (A-5? Us WWII types understand staff assignments only 1 through 4) of Hq. 15th AF, Colorado Springs, CO. In a typical Rendle statement, he said "If war breaks out again, I'll send for Crusaders; and if I don't, you send for me."

Another story asked for the current whereabouts of Col. Warren Polking, the 578th's first CO. It reported a rumor that Polking was in the RAF. (See the Nov. 1992 issue of the NEWS about Polking's post-war connections with the RAF)

Also described was a memorable gathering of the 392nd at the bar of the Bellevue Stratford in Philadelphia, led by such stalwart imbibers as Walter Joachiam, the 578th squadron's bombardier.

The newsletter called itself Target Report, and used "Buttermilk", the Group's call sign, as a rallying cry. Burtner urged all Crusaders to call "Buttermilk" and report their position so that a viable veterans group could be formed. Now, nearly 50 years later, the 392ndBGMA can thank men like Burt for their vision.

PEARL HARBOR DAY SLIPS INTO OBLIVION

Dec. 7, 1992 went by with scarcely a mention in the media about the bombing of Pearl Harbor which occurred on that day in 1941, setting off WW II and forever changing the lives of most of us.

We all can recite exactly where we were and what we were doing when the news broke on the radio.

The late Pat Burns, radio operator in the 578th who passed away last Fall, was close to the event.

He was one of a civilian crew that had just completed work for the Navy on Midway Island, and they left Honolulu on the evening of Dec. 6 bound for the US on board the troopship USS Henderson.

The Henderson altered course after receiving the news of the attack. Life was tense on board ship; they did not know then that the Japanese fleet had

They finally arrived at Vancouver and were escorted to San Francisco by a Navy

After a short time at home Pat enlisted in the Air Corps, and eventually flew 33 combat missions with the 392nd. * * * *

Readers of the October 1992 issue of the National Geographic Magazine caught a glimpse of the 392nd when they saw pictured there Mrs. Ouida Miller, widow of S/Sgt. Samson Miller, who was a member of the 579th's Wesley Schafer crew.

Samson Miller died in 1989 after a career in the Bureau of Indian Affairs. He was vice-president of the Mescalero Apache Tribal Council. (See Feb. 1992 issue of 392BGMA NEWS)

T/Sgt. John T. Carroll was radio operator on the Gann crew in the 579th, arriving at Wendling in March 1944.

On the mission to St. Lo on July 25, 1944 in support of a pending offensive by the U.S. First Army, the Group sustained flak damage and Carroll was wounded by what was thought to be flak. Some 33 years later the old wound which was in the posterior area was operated and the offending metal when removed was found to be a nut and bolt from the a/c. Needless to say, John feels that he has

been screwed all these years.

Carroll was rotated home because of the wound, and after recovery was reassigned to the CBI theater flying in C46's for the ATC. In 1945, just prior to Japan's surrender, his a/c lost power over a remote area near the Burma Road and John bailed out. He was injured but was cared for by Chinese villagers and eventually returned to U.S. control.

So John has the unique record of having served to two theaters of war during WWII and sustaining injury in both instances.

Post war, he worked for the U. S. Postal Service.

He lives with wife Margaret at 17004 O'Connor, Allen Park, MI 48101. They have four children and 9 grandchildren.

RUMINATIONS

It is said that wisdom comes with old age. I'm not sure that's true in my case, but at least I have some perspectives now that I didn't have as a young soldier at Wendling.

Some of them are in fact the result of the accumulated experiences of the passing years; but in this particular vein they developed from many conversations with Crusaders, both at conventions and in the course of pursuing stories for the NEWS.

So let's talk about heroism. There is of course no doubt that the heroes of the 392nd were the combat crews. It was they who suffered and sometimes succumbed in the brutal environment of the heavy bomber doing battle not only against the enemy but also the weather and all the attendant risks of flying in a machine with what is now considered to be primitive equipment.

It seems to me that the aerial gunners should be especially singled out for a certain brand of heroism. Most of them were in their teens or barely out of them; on take-off they weren't kept busy by the rigorous business of getting the aircraft off the ground as were the rest of the crew. All they could do was sweat it out, praying that the lumbering, shuddering monster would finally take

wing and leave the runway.

Another group to be cited are our senior officers: squadron commanders and above. Again, youth was the norm with them: most of them were in their middle twenties. But nevertheless they had the awesome responsibility for the conduct of their entire command. Col. Warren Polking, the first commander of the 578th, has told me that of course he was frightened when in combat. But he was terrified of what could happen if he or one of his command screwed up and he would have to answer to all those generals at higher headquarters. And Col. Joe Bush, the Ground Executive Officer, has related to me that, sleepless, he would get up in the middle of the night and tour the base to be sure that all was

And last but not least, the ground personnel who maintained and serviced the aircraft should be mentioned. They worked through the night, sometimes in foul weather with little or no protection from the elements. They had only flashlights to work with, but the labor to be done was highly technical, requiring intense effort. There were thousands of things that had to be right so that a four-engine bomber would be properly armed and able to fly at high altitudes with a heavy load to a target that was difficult to find and often well defended.

And truck drivers? Well, if not heroes at least one was a victim. Cpl. Farrell, 579th, was the only ground KIA in the 392nd. He died when his truck was strafed by a lone enemy intruder in the last months of the conflict.

They managed to salvage about 75% of the P-38, including both engines and the 20mm. cannon and the machine guns. The Recovery Group helps maintain a museum at the former RAF base at East Kirkby and they have a 392nd display there.

Lt. Col. (Ret) Richard Hoffman was a S/Sgt. radio operator-ball turret gunner in the 579th. He was original crew in that squadron, joining the 392nd at Tucson in February 1943.

He was shot down on the Group's 7th mission on Nov. 5, 1943, and earned the Purple Heart as a result of a shattered

ankle sustained that day.

After repatriation from POW status, he was discharged in 1945. In 1948 he reenlisted as T/Sgt. and received a direct commission as 2/Lt. shortly thereafter. Most of his career was spent as an Intelligence Officer, primarily in fighter groups in the US and in Europe, Japan, and Southeast Asia. He also saw duty as liason to the CIA.

He retired in 1974 and as a civilian has sold sailboat racing equipment and was a counsellor with the National

Alliance of Businessmen.

He has drafted a book about his experiences as a POW at Stalag 17 and that group's remarkable march across Austria just prior to Germany's capitulation.

He is married to Ruth, and they live at 134 S. San Mateo Ave., Ventura, CA 93004. They have two children and two

FROM THE KEILMAN WWII NOTEBOOK

Col. Myron Keilman, the commander of the 579th, has compiled accounts of events in 392nd history that he has named "Lest We Forget". Following is his recital of an operation, with a citation from the Commanding General:

On 5 February, 1944, the German airfield at Tours, France was struck by fourteen airplanes of the 392nd.

In spite of clouds partially obscuring the aiming point, 156 500-pound bombs struck the target area. Ten enemy fighters and light flak were encountered. All airplanes returned to Wendling safely. Here is the message received from General Hodges, Commander of the 2nd Bombardment Division:


"Strike photographs of yesterday's mission shows that the pattern of the 392nd Group covered the aiming point, notwithstanding the fact that the target area was badly obscured by clouds. The skill of the lead pilot-bombardier team is worthy of the highest commendation and justifies the care and effort put forth by Rendle and his Group Bombardier on his lead crews. Please extend my congratulations and appreciation to Captain Graper and Captain Weiland for the splendid job they did."
