WELL-KNOWN DETROIT TV-RADIO ICON IS A CRUSADER

ERNIE BARBER: MEDIC SAYS TO HANG IT UP

Ernie has been a fixture in the Crusader hospitality rooms in charge of the Group's memorabilia since we began meeting. Now his doctors have told him to avoid long auto trips, which puts an end to that a service to the 392nd.

But Ernie's service and devotion to the 392nd has not ended. He's still the Group Archivist in charge of the Group's memorabilia, and is incredibly active on the Group's website, answering e-mail questions by the hundreds.

Ernie started by appearing at the reunions with his trusty pickup loaded with memorabilia, which he laboriously carted up to the hospitality room. Later, he teamed up with Teddy Egan, and the two of them were host and hostess, snacks

included, at the hospitality room. They traveled so extensively that Crusaders named them Bonnie and Clyde.

He also faithfully recorded the gatherings with his camcorder.

Ernie's Profile as it appeared in an earlier issue of the NEWS: M/Sgt Ernest Herbert Barber was a crew chief in the 578th, joining the 392nd at Biggs Field March 4, 1943. He received the Bronze Star for crewing B24H 42-7518 for 32 missions without a mechanical abort. He crewed seven combat planes with a total of 143 missions without a mechanical abort.

Barber retired in 1981 from the U. S. Postal Service, in maintenance. (No aborts on those mail trucks, either). A widower, he has three sons and four grandsons.

He lives at 5726 Thomson Hiway, Lincolnton, GA 30817-7418.

Personal notes from the editor:

I have known and admired Ernie Barber since Alamogordo days. While serving a brief stint as the 578th's assistant adjutant, I found that if the Squadron needed a noncom for a job that absolutely had to

2/LT (NOW COL) MARVIN E SCHLOSSBERG, 577TH PILOT A/K/A SONNY ELLIOT, WAS SHOT DOWN AT GOTHA FEB 24, 1944.

TO BE ENSHRINED IN THE MICHIGAN AVIATION HALL OF FAME IN OCTOBER, JOINING HOWARD "EBE" EBERSOLE IN THAT PRESTIGIOUS GROUP

Noted for possessing one of the quickest wits in the Detroit area, his reply to the NEWS' query about the name Sonny Elliot: "That's my maiden name." Actually it came from POW camp days, when he played a character named Mr. Elliot in a camp play.

The Gotha mission was Sonny's 14th, which in early 1944 made him a battle-hardened veteran of the grimmest days of the air war. The 392nd committed 36 air crews to this mission and took 73 casualties, the third heaviest losses of the war. But it earned the Group the Presidential Unit Citation for one of the most vital air strikes of the aerial war.

Home from the war in 1945, he set off for New York to make it there in the entertainment world. He came close, but never quite made it, and returned to Detroit and Wayne University.

A professor there told him about a new thing called television, and he auditioned at WWJ, the city's first TV station. Like all beginners, he did everything, including the weather report. One night he gave the temperature in Las Vegas as 55, and ad-libbed "that's 10 the hard way." From there it was straight up and he became for decades one of Detroit's best known media personalities.

Still busy, Sonny is known for his

love for animals and has authored a book entitled Eliot's Ark, a collection of fact and fiction on animals, both friends and foes of man. He also writes book reviews for the Detroit Free Press and an occasional magazine article.

For several years he was Marketing Services and Promotion Director for the Detroit News. He is married to Annette, an educator, and they reside in Farmington Hills.

be done right, M/Sgt Barber was our man.

While with him for many hours, some of it in his fishing boat, I heard some real down-home Georgia wisdom and self-reliance:

Upon driving by a flea market: "I don't go to them. I have one of my own in my house".

Stand-off tactic to widows in his church: "I don't do lawns".

Carries a set of spare parts with him and can repair his own dentures on the spot.

He has two pick-up trucks, one for Sunday and one for every day. Of the pickup trucks: "You'll think I'm a regular red-neck".

When asked by younger people about "The Greatest Generation", I am prone to say: WWII was won by the Ernie Barbers of this country. Plucked out of rural Georgia barely out of his teens, within a year and a haif he was in charge of a complicated B-24, the state of the art at the time in military aviation. His planes flew and flew and flew, in spite of damage from combat and incredible abuse from high altitude, overloaded, formation flying.

He once repaired a B-24 brought home from a domestic flight piloted by a bold 578th pilot by the name of Otis. It had damage to the trailing antenna and green stains on the propellers. Barber was, reluctantly, crewing the ship on the flight.

PROFILE

1/Lt (later Lt/Col) James R. Longenecker (goes by "Dick") was the navigator on the Wolak crew in the 576th. They joined the Group at Wendling about Nov. 1, 1944.

Remaining in the Active Reserves, he retired in August 1972 at Wright Patterson AFB as Reserve Mobilization Commander, 2750th Air Base Wing.

He completed his Civil Engineering education at Ohio State University in June, 1949. After engineering work in Chicago and Denver, his career was mostly with the Ohio Department of Transportation, with a stint as Mercer County Engineer, Celina, Ohio 1980-1983.

Still active, he is a consulting engineer in Columbus and Cincinnati, Ohio.

S/Sgt Sam Trusten was the tail gunner on the O. F. Levell crew in the 576th. They arrived at Wendling in February 1944 and because of lead crew status didn't complete 30 missions until April 1945.

After the war, he was a manufacturer's representative for shoe supplies in the New England area and operated a small chain of health and beauty aid stores in Massachusetts. After moving to Arizona, he was employed by the Department of Economic Security for the State of Arizona until retirement as purchasing manager in 1987.

His wife is Eve, and they have one daughter and one son, who was wounded in Vietnam while serving with the Marines. They have three grandchildren.

GREAT PHOTO OF A NAVY FIGHTER BREAKING THE SOUND BARRIER



Joe Westbrook, 578th Squadron Bombardier, sent the NEWS this extraordinary photo. The material accompanying the photo follows:

Through the viewfinder of his camera, Ensign John Gay could see the fighter plane drop from the sky heading toward the port side of the aircraft carrier Constellation. At 1,000 feet, the pilot drops the F/A-18C Hornet to increase his speed to 750 mph, vapor flickering off the curved surfaces of the plane. In the precise moment, a cloud in the shape of an egg forms around the Hornet 200 yards from the carrier, its engines rippling the Pacific Ocean just 75 feet below. Gay hears an explosion and snaps his camera shutter once.

"I clicked the same time I heard the boom, and I knew I had it," Gay said. What he had was a technically meticulous depiction of the sound barrier being broken July 7, 1999, somewhere on the Pacific between Hawaii and Japan.

Sports Illustrated, Brills Content and Life ran the photo. The photo recently took first prize in the science and technology division in the World Press 2000 contest, which drew more than 42,000 entries worldwide.

PROFILE

Capt David Orenbach was the navigator on the Bell crew in the 579th. They joined the Group at Wendling in March, 1944.

On their 25th mission, to Politz, they were hit by flak and diverted to Sweden after leaving the target. They were interned in Sweden and later returned to the U. S.

He graduated in March 1945 from the Air Corps statistical school at the Harvard Graduate School of Business and left the Service in December 1945.

He has been a Certified Public Accountant in New York state from 1945 to date.

He is married to Alma, and their summer address is 30 Lords Way, Manhasset Hills, NY 11040. Their winter address is 1602 Abaco Drive #4, Coconut Creek FI 33066.

They have two children and one grandchild.

PROFILE

T/Sgt Russell V. Logue was the radio operator on the Stoddard crew in the 577th and later in the 579th. They arrived at Wendling in December 1944.

He served one enlistment in the Reserves.

He completed his degree at Drake University, then held executive posts with the Thermogas Company in Des Moines, Shenandoah, and Ottumwa, IA. He retired in 1981 and now runs a show horse ranch.

His spouse is Marilyn J., and they live at 749 25th Ave., Norwalk, IA. They have two daughters.

PROFILE

Capt Wildrick Hart was a pilot in the 576th. He arrived at Wendling in June of 1944.

He was in the Reserves from 1952 to 1958.

He graduated from New York University in 1948 with a degree in mechanical engineering. He was employed by Kendall Refining Company (later a division of Witco Corporation). He work was in research for most of his professional career but at the time of his retirement in 1985 he was Divisional Vice-president for Manufacturing.

Genealogical research has occupied most of his post retirement time

His wife is Geraldine, and they have two sons and one daughter; and four grandchildren. Their address of 32 Berva Drive, Bradford, PA 16701.

PROFILE

1/Lt. Clarence Wickett was the bombardier on the Petty crew in the 577th. They arrived at Wendling June 24, 1944.

He entered the Service in October 1942 at Punxsutawney, PA. In his report to the NEWS, he made no mention of having seen a groundhog at the time.

He did report that he served in the Air Force Reserves.

He is married to Mary Jane, and they live at 114 Edward Rd., Saint Marys, PA 15857. They have four children and three grandchildren.

NEWS editor and Group Historian Jim Goar reports that he recently visited Florida residents Col and Mrs. Gilbert, Mrs. and Mrs. Carroll Cheek, and Bob Lane.

The trip included picking up Ernie Barber at Lincolnton, Georgia, and a visit to the Mighty Eighth Heritage Museum at Savannah. Goar and Barber met with Museum officials on Group history matters. Also, while there they pursued the Group's intention to place the 392nd Prayer in the chapel which is to be built on the Museum grounds.

At Winter Park, a committee composed of CEO Lawrence Gilbert, President Cliff Peterson, Ernie Barber, Jim Goar, and Teddy Egan sorted through some of the Group's memorabilia, disposing of it at various historical institutions, including the Mighty Eighth Heritage Museum and The Institute on WWII and the Human Experience at the department of History at Florida State University. So close that the tail gunner of the preceding plane became very, very, very nervous about it.

A visit to Carroll (392BGMA VP and 578th pilot) and Mabel Cheek in Clearwater revealed that Carroll had a serious bout with pneumonia this winter but has now recovered.

Goar also visited Bob Lane at Melbourne, where he found Bob, the 578th's Executive Officer, in good health. (See story, this issue, about Bob's grandson's visit to Wendling)

A side mission to Mac (578th's Communications Officer) and Mary MacTavish at Sanborn had to be aborted because of the accursed Florida traffic and the inability of the pilot to find the target.

Though-Associates-may-not-vote, they-may-attend-meetings and-other-392nd-Bomb-Group-activities-and-will-receive-the-news letter-or-journal-and-other-392nd-Bomb-Group-publications.

Following two (2) years of continuous membership, Associates will be given full membership and be entitled to vote, hold office and serve on Committees.

ARTICLE FIVE

VOTING

Paragraph A

At all meetings regular voting shall be via voice. Fer-the-eleet of-Directors,-voting-shall-be-by-secret, written-ballot,-by-plura: in-descending-order, There-shall-be-no-runoff-election-unless-a-t: exists-for-the-last-position-and-neither-nominee-requests-that-the other-nominee-be-elected.

ARTICLE SEVEN

Paragraph B BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Directors shall be chosen for a term of three (3) years on a staggered basis so that only one third of the positions on the Board will be open to reelection each year at the Annual Membership Meeting. ARTICLE SEVEN

BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Paragraph F

Two-regular-Board-Meetings-will-be-scheduled-each-year-The-first meeting-will-be-held-on-the-Friday-of-the-annual-reunion-The-second-regular-meeting-will-be-held-on-the-first-weekend--in-April-or-at-such-other-time-as-designated-by-the-Executive---Committee. One official Board Meeting will be scheduled each year this meeting will be held alternately in conjunction with the 8th Air Force Historical Society and the 2nd Air Division Association at their annual meeting. Special meetings may be called by the Executive Committee provided each Director is polled.

ARTICLE EIGHT

METHOD OF ELECTION OF DIRECTORS

Paragraph C

Nominations from the floor shall be called for at the Annual Membership Meeting but no more than five (5) nominations shall be accepted via this method. Such nominees may be voted for-by writing-in-their-name(s)-on-the-ballet-previded- as provided in Article V herein

ARTICLE NINE

OFFICERS

Paragraph F:

The Secretary shall keep the minutes and official records of the Seeiety- Association. The Secretary will also file certificates required by law and will give and serve notices to members of the Organization. The Secretary will sign formal instruments, along with the Chief Executive Officer and/or President, as required by law, and will execute duties incidental to the office of the Secretary.

ARTICLE TWELVE

COMMITTEES

Paragraph A

The Executive Committee shall include the elected officers of the Organization. The Executive Committee, chaired by the President Chief Executive Officer, shall be responsible for drafting meeting agenda, drafting and scheduling mail vote motions as required, and carrying out other managerial functions as directed by the Board of Directors.

Standing Committees shall be established by the Board of Directo as required. The President Chief Executive Officer may appoint members of Standing Committees to indefinite terms, subject to the desires of later Presidents and the Board of Directors.

Standing Committees will include but not necessarily be limited to the following:

NOTE: The term "Chief Executive Officer" should be inserted where appropriate throughout the By-Laws.

ARTICLE THIRTEEN

AMENDMENTS

Paragraph B

Amendments to the By-Laws shall be submitted by a member of the Board of Directors or by a member, in writing, and endorsed by five (5) regular members in good standing in order to permit publication in the newsletter or journal which would reach the membership sixty (60) days prior to the Annual Meeting or Special Meeting. An affirmative vote of a majority of those members present and voting shall be required for adoption of the proposed amendments.

576TH NAVIGATOR ON CREW THAT FLEW "STRAWBERRY BITCH" TO AF MUSEUM



Many Crusaders have visited the AF Museum at Dayton and have clambered through the B-24 on display there, the "Strawberry Bitch", wondering how they managed to board the thing, let alone fly and fight in it.

Capt (now L/Col) James ("Dick') Longenecker had the distinction of of being on the crew that flew the ship from Davis-Monthan AFB on its final flight. It arrived at Dayton for their annual air show in 1959 and became part of the permanent exhibit there. (See Profile, this issue)

Of further interest to 392nd Reunion goers is that Col Al Showers, war-time commander of the 467th BG, was pilot and flight commander. Col Showers is a steady attender at 8AF and 2AD gatherings.

392nd Bomb Group Leather Patches



Ben Jones has undertaken the task of supplying the 392BGMA with the leather Crusader patches that started appearing on the Group's A-2 jackets in 1944.

Ben says: these patches are handpainted on genuine fine leather to meet the same specifications of WWII. As the war progressed various hand painted Group patches started appearing on A-2 jackets. As there was no standard size among the various Groups, Hq. USAAF authorized the use of a 5" circular leather patch on which the unit logo could be painted.

The Crusader is drawn on a USAAF approved 5" circular leather patch. Each patch is unique with no two being identical, as with mass produced copies. You can choose between a distressed look or a freshly painted look.

The logo is painted on the leather, then coated with a sealant that protects it. Like any leather, it is suggested that it not get wet.

The cost is \$20 plus shipping and handling.

Ben says also that there will be available soon polo shirts with the Crusader emblem.



DENIS AND HILARY DUFFIELD said: "There was a good turn-out, some 100 villagers, at the Memorial on Remembrance Day. Visiting Wendling in 2000 were: Aldon H. Jensen with wife, daughter, son-in-law, and grandaughter; John Holzinger, navigator on the Bob Tays crew in the 578th (John has made three visits in 12 months) Peggy Coffman, widow of Glenn Coffman, flight engineer in the 576th; Tom Edgington, radio operator on the Jack Snyder crew; Russell Logue, radio operator on the Stoddard crew, 579th; and Gil Bambauer, equipment specialist in the 10th Station Complement, with three sons and two grandsons.

JOHN GILBERT said, "As a boy of seven 55 years ago I can remember the aircraft taking off and landing at Wendling just like it was yesterday".

LUC DEWFZ remarked, "On Christmas 1944 there was the blow of the Ardennes offensive, a terrible Christmas for the Belgian citizens and the Allied troops caught in the Battle of the Bulge. Among them were airmen of the 487th Bomb Group, who were on a maximum effort mission to stop the German offensive. They met enemy fighters over Belgium and six B-17's came down in a small area near the front lines. Luckily for the men who bailed out, it was still in American hands. Among those KIA was B/Gen Frederick Castle, now resting in peace in the Henri-Chapelle cemetery. In this sea of white caps on Belgian soil, the General's grave stands out only by a star and an inscription enhanced by gold: Medal of Honor.

Also heard from were LEONARD AND LAURA ALSFORD, London; and IAN BLACKAMORE and PETER WOOD, members of the Lincolnshire Aircraft Recovery Group.


