
392nd AT BOTH 8AF AND 2AD MEETINGS THE 392ND GATHERS IN TEXAS

Thirty six veterans, family, and friends joined with the 8AF Historical Society for a Group Reunion in Irving, Texas, on Oct. 25-29, 2001 at the Harvey Hotel. Hotel accommodations, food service, and hospitality were given high marks by consensus of the attendees.

The Hospitality Room, always the focal point of socializing, was also the popular showcase for video displays and web site material engineered by our Second Generation members: Jim Marsteller, Bob Books, Ben Jones, and Greg Hatton. The work, time, and effort of these computer gurus in preserving our Group history deserve high praise.

The Group dinner attendance included six active duty members of the Eighth Air Force, who were being honored in later ceremonies for meritorious achievement. Roger Freeman, the well known British historian and author of many books about the 8AF, was also an honored guest. In his remarks Roger made the surprise announcement that the B-24 being restored for display at the American Air Force Museum in Britain at Duxford will bear the markings of the 392nd and the name "Dugan". "Dugan" was the a/c flown in combat by 578th pilot Bob Vickers. Bob, as everyone knows, is the author of Liberators From Wendling, Remembrance of the Missing, and is a research historian par excellence of the combat history of the 392nd.

Roger Freeman gave an excellent review of the history of aerial warfare before an overflow crowd of 8AF veterans. His presentation, "Round The Clock", highlighted the team effort of the RAF Bomber Command and the 8AF in maintaining the bombing offensive day and night, fair weather or foul.

During the annual 392nd Group business meeting, Jim Marsteller, Second Generation, was elected to membership on the Board of Directors and Jim Goar was chosen to be 392nd vice-president for Second Air Division. In the subsequent meeting of the Board of Directors, Keith Roberts was named secretary and Jim Goar vice president for communications.

SECOND AIR DIVISION DEFIES ARAB TERRORISTS; FLIES TO ENGLAND FOR OPENING OF NEW MILLENNIUM LIBRARY

Arming themselves with plenty of prescription pills, over 500 aging warriors with their families emplaned for England on Nov. 1. There they joined their British friends at Norwich and spent a week celebrating the close ties established in 1942-45.

Evelyn Cohen on the U.S. side and David and Jean Hastings on the Brit side planned and executed an exercise of immense complexity. The attendees were housed in five separate hotels, fed at several venues, were transported to several sites within Norwich and to the cemetery at Cambridge. They were met and returned to two London airports at the beginning and end of the session. All this was performed under stringent security measures.

Paraphrasing the story that appeared in the Norwich Eastern Daily Press: "They may not be back but they will never be forgotten.

Around 300 old servicemen, many in their 80's, made the trip to our region for a week of remembrance, tribute, and pride.

Monday saw an emotional visit to the American cemetery at Madingly, Cambridge, and a tour of the Imperial War Museum at Duxford.

On Tuesday the 2nd Air Division received the freedom of the city of Norwich during a service at St. Andrews Hall. It was a unique occasion and the first time a foreign organization had been bestowed with such an honor.

Wednesday saw the climax of the trip with the official opening of the 2nd Air Division Memorial Library at the Forum, commemorating the 6700 who died flying from East Anglia from 1942 to 1945.

In the evening a banquet attended by around 800 people was hosted by the 2nd Air Division Association at the Sports Village in Norwich. During the evening the chairman of the Memorial Trust of the 2nd Air Division, Paul King, was presented with checks totaling \$200,000. Mr. King said, 'This is in order to augment the Endowment Fund of the Trust to provide additional library staff in the new memorial library.'

There has never been a week such as this and those who made the journey from the States know there will never be another.

But while there is inevitably a tinge of sadness and a few tears as the servicemen head home, they leave in the knowledge that their East Anglian friends and ensure their legacy will live on for generations to come."

On Thursday the 392nd delegation headed out for Wendling, there to find the Memorial in impeccable condition, manicured to perfection and with new flags flapping in the breeze. Tom and Jill Scotts' hard work and devotion was very evident.

Thursday was the only bad weather day of the week. And bad it was, a reminder of the damp, bone-chilling weather when we were there in 1943-45. There was even a short but sharp hail storm, striking during the service at the Memorial. But the unflappable Reverend Jonathon Boston epitomized the legendary Brit resolve by conducting the service without faltering, in spite of pea-sized hailstones pelting him on his bare head and covering his prayer book.

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EDITORIAL

I always feel the need to apologize when I usurp the space in this newsletter to vent my personal feelings. However, judging by the tenor of the e-mails from Cru aders that recently have been forwarded to me, I think that a substantial majority of the Crusader family will be in general agreement with these sentiments.

I can't help feeling a little cynical about the rise of patriotism and other fundamental American values since Sept. 11. Most Crusaders that I know have been wearing American flags in their lapels for years. Now I see former left leaning, military bashing TV commentators wearing them religiously.

But the thing that really caught my attention was a news item about how the Norman Rockwell collection on display at the Guggenheim Library in New York City is attracting large numbers of viewers. The family values conveyed in his paintings have been sneered at by some in the artistic community for years.

This editorial was written the day after Thanksgiving. Probably instead of being cynical I should be thankful, that however horrible the events of Sept. 11, the nation was shocked into a renewal of the values that in 1941-45 sent us to the colors.

At any rate, the Vietnam era ended Sept. 11, 2001. It is no longer cool to be a unpatriotic U. S. citizen.

Unknown voice (in a beautiful British accent): "Because you lost the bloody war!"



A simple week-end trip to visit Jackie and Guy Carnine left him in a hospital in Tennessee for a week. His trouble diagnosed as emphysema, he returned to Georgia pulling an oxygen cart. Better now, he says that he is gradually promoting himself to a carry-around bottle.

Ebe Ebersole, 578th pilot

Ebe has been fighting pain and deteriorating ability to walk for years. Finally he went through a long and difficult operation on his spine. A veteran of both WWII and Korea, he told Col Gilbert "It was

the toughest thing I've ever faced". Wife Jeanne reported that he's four months into a twelve month rehab period, and is gradually improving.

Charley Dye, Base Ammunition Officer

In early November, Charley underwent a procedure for new heart valves. It was touch and go for awhile, according to Helen, but now he's slowly recovering and is well enough to handle the Group's finances, much to the relief of Helen.

He's waiting for the medics to do something about his heart rhythm, which has been erratic.

Lou Stephens, 578th pilot

Lou had a little work done on his heart in the early Fall, which kept him and Deloris from attending the 2AD reunion in Norwich. His doctor, knowing that he had in his possession a snow blower, warned him not to cause himself to have a heart attack this winter as a result of cleaning off all his neighbors' driveways. Lou said, "I cleaned several driveways, but the snow blower ran out of gas before I did." Lou and the editor had some difficulty in communicating with each other about birthday congratulations, since their birthdays fall within a two week span. Lou said, "This electronic communication reminds me of the old Indian saying: Don't send smoke signals on a foggy day."

Bob needed some abdominal work done this Fall, and his five daughters rallied around, sending Sharon,

Leather Patches



Ben Jones has undertaken the task of supplying the 392BGMA with the leather Crusader patches that started appearing on the Group's A-2 jackets in 1944

Ben says: These patches are handpainted on genuine fine leather to meet the specifications of WWII. As the war progressed, various hand painted Group patches started appearing on A-2 jackets. As there was no standard size among the various Groups, Hq. USAAF authorized the use of a 5" circular leather patch on which the unit logo could be painted.

The Crusader is drawn on a USAAF-approved 5" circular leather patch. Each patch is unique with no two being identical, as with mass-produced copies. You can choose between a distressed look or a freshly painted look.

The logo is painted on the leather, then coated with a sealant that protects it. Like any leather, it is suggested that it not get wet.

The cost is \$20 plus shipping and handling.

Ben says also that there will soon be available polo shirts with the Crusader emblem.


