THE DUTCH PEOPLE REMEMBER AND HONOR US

MORE ABOUT COL BERNT BALCHEN, ARCTIC EXPLORER

In the May 1997 issue the NEWS carried a story about Col Balchen's "Swedish Air Line" which carried passengers to and from Sweden and the U. K. Guy Carnine, 578th pilot, with his crewmen Vic Mastron and Boyce Barbee were part of that operation after they completed their missions.

Now comes Earl Zimmerman, 389th, who authored a story that ran in the 389th newsletter and furnished more information about the famous Col Balchen. We reproduce it below, with Earl's permission and the permission of the 389^{th's} newsletter editor, Gene Hartley.

Col Bernt Balchen was America's greatest Arctic expert of modern times.

Born in Norway in 1899, he served as a cavalryman in the Finnish Army against the Russians in WWI. He became a pilot in the Norwegian Naval Air Force in 1921 where he acquired his initial Arctic flying experience. He was a pilot on the Amundsen-Ellsworth Relief Expedition to Spitzbergen in 1925. The next year he was a member of the Amundsen-Ellsworth-Nobile Arctic Expedition. In 1927, he was a pilot on Admiral Byrd's famous flight across the Atlantic. In 1928, he flew to Gren-

nly Island north of Newfoundland to rescue the crew of the German airplane "Bremen" which had crash landed after flying the Atlantic. During 1928-30, Balchen was chief pilot on Byrd's Atlantic expedition and on November 29, 1929, he piloted the first plane to fly across the South Pole. He was made a U. S. citizen by Act of Congress in 1931.

During the 30's, Balchen continued to participate in Arctic and Atlantic flight operations. With the start of WWII in 1939, he began ferrying operations to England and Singapore for the British. In 1941, prior to the Pearl Harbor attack, he joined the AAF and at the request of General "Hap" Arnold and on personal orders from the General went to Greenland where he supervised the construction of, and later commanded, the famous U. S. air base Bluie West 8.

While in Greenland, he led many spectacular rescue missions which saved the lives of numerous U. S. flyers whose planes had gone down on the ice cap.

In 1943, Balchen was made chief of the Allied Transport Command for Norway, Sweden, Denmark, Finland, and the USSR, with a secret base in Scotland. During that time, his planes flew 4,399 people from neutral Sweden to Great Britain across enemy occupied territory. He also oversaw highly secret aerial missions into

MANY DUTCHMEN "ADOPT" A GRAVE IN A U. S. CEMETERY AND TEND IT

Again we are treated to a neat piece of research by 2nd generation member Annette Tison. She has been in contact with Mr. Adriaans and he is now a welcome Associate member of the 392BGMA.

Almost every month, Peter Adriaans drives the 34 miles from his home in Beegden, Holland, to the Netherlands American Cemetery in Margraten. He reason is simple: to visit the grave of S/Sgt Amos E. Doty of the 579th Sqdn. His reason is profound: to be a visible reminder that the Dutch have not forgotten what S/Sgt Doty did to help liberate their country in WWII.

Mr. Adriaans has been coming to the Cemetery for years to enjoy a quiet walk amidst its peaceful, yet impressive, grounds. During his visit there on Memorial Day 2004, he was asked if he wished to adopt a grave. It didn't take long for Peter and his wife Ton to fill out the paperwork, and a few weeks later he received an official certificate of adoption for S/Sgt Doty's grave. In accepting this responsibility, Mr. Adriaans made a commitment to visit Amos' grave often, but particularly on special days such as Memorial Day and Christmas.

Mr. Adriaans soon found www.b24.net, our great website, and learned that S/Sgt Doty was the engineer/top turret gunner on

2/Lt Charles Felsenthal's crew. On 19 May 1944, they were part of a bombing mission against Waggum Airfield just outside Brunswick, Germany. As the 392nd neared the target, they were met by about 150 enemy fighters who flew through the formation, six and seven planes in line abreast, first attacking from the nose and then reversing direction to attack from the tail. The relentless assault continued for almost 45 minutes. Severe flak over the target was also encountered. Resulting losses from the 392nd included 2/Lt Felsenthal's crew (10 KIA), 2/Lt Robert Lang's crew (10 KIA) and 2/Lt Donald

Norway to re-supply underground resistance forces in their operations against the Nazi invader.

Balchen was recalled to active duty with the USAF in 1948 and assigned to command the 10th Rescue Squadron in Alaska. The next year, he made the first non-stop flight from Alaska over the Polar to Europe. He was transferred to HQ USAF in 1951 to participate in building northern defenses and in surveying sites for the Ballistic Early Warning System. He was instrumental in the development of Thule Air Base in Greenland and in blazing airborne trails to assist both commercial and military aviation in the Arctic region. After retiring from the USAF in 1956, Balchen continued to serve as a consultant on special assignments for aviation and energy industries until his death in 1973.

Prell's crew (8 KIA, 2 POW).

S/Sgy Doty was initially buried in the town of Veltheim, Germany, but was later interred in the Netherlands American Cemetery.

When asked why he wanted to adopt a grave, Mr. Adriaans replied, "For me, WWII is something never to forget, although I was not born at that time. I think my parents, who are still living (father 86 and mother 82) gave me something which makes me aware that this must never happen again. I also teach my children (son 24 and daughter 21) never to forget what all these soldiers did to help us end that terrible war."

That lesson is also being learned by Dutch school children. Mr. Adrianns noted that students at the lower school in Margarten (ages 7 to 11) recently put on a program called "All Names" where the names of everyone buried or memorialized in the Netherlands

American Cemetery were spoken against a musical background. Among the more than 10,000 names read were those of 31 crewmen from the 392nd who are buried there and 53 more who are listed on their Tablets of the Missing.

Especially significant about the adoption process is that the programs are private efforts organized by local citizens; they are not sponsored by the American Battle Monuments Commission (AMBC) which administers the cemeteries. According to the ABMC, the adoption groups are located generally in the countries of The Netherlands and Belgium.

Almost 43 percent of all Crusaders buried or memorialized overseas are in the Netherlands and Belgium. Thanks to the efforts of Mr. Adriaans and people like him, we are assured our comrades are remembered and honored in the lands they fought to liberate.



M/Sgt Hoyt Barfield




A/C #42-95037, 579th, 1/Lt R. L. Miller, pilot. The mission on June 29, 1944 was to Magdeburg. AA fire was accurate and intense. This a/c crash landed at Horsham St. Faith, home of the 458th. The remaining members of the crew were: 2/Lt J. A. Connor, CP; 2/Lt W. J. Hesson, N; 2/Lt R. W. Baker, B; T/Sgt C. W. Freeman, E (KIA); T/Sgt R. E. Carlstrand, R; S/Sgt R. R. DeFrates, G; S/Sgt G. G. Fritz, G; S/Sgt D. L. McEwan, G; and S/Sgt P. J. Wolfe, G.



A/C#42-100346, 577th. Pilot and crew unknown. The mission was Gotha, Feb. 24, 1944. The 392nd was under fighter attack for 1 ½ hours on the way to the target. 7 crews were lost and 2 crewmen from the 578th were KIA. The 392nd was awarded the Presidential Unit Citation for this mission.



A/C#42-99990, 579th, Lt. W. P. Sewell, pilot. The raid on Aug. 2, 1944 was against a tactical target, a bridge over the Somme near Amiens. Flak was moderate but accurate. This a/c was forced to crash land near Manston, fatally injuring 2 crewmen.



A/C #27510, 579th, Dec. 21, 1943. In one of the most bizarre incidents of the war, a spinning propeller that had become detached from another a/c neatly sliced off the tail turret. Since a quick attachable parachute could not be worn in a turret, Sgt. Pippit fell to earth with the turret.



A/C #41-29135, 579th, Dec. 20, 1943. For the fourth time in just nine missions, the 392nd went to Bremen. Bombing was by PFF and results were good. Heavy AA defenses and enemy a/c were experienced, resulting in one a/c lost and 15 damaged, mostly from flak. #135 crash landed and only one crewman was killed in the crash, S/Sgt T. E. Johnson. Other aircrew aboard were: 1/Lt C. C. Holloman; 1/Lt W. C. Everhart, P; 2/Lt F. J. Sassaman, CP; Capt J. E. Slowik, N; 2/Lt J. F. Chatten, B; T/Sgt C. C. Northcutt, E; T/Sgt J. W. Beard, R; S/Sgt R. G. Fowler, G; and S/Sgt A. W. Sweatt, G.

Michael Sassaman, the son of co-pilot 2/Lt F. J. Sassaman has been in touch with the NEWS and has furnished more information about the incident taken from his father's notes, as follows:

"There was heavy flak over the target and the ship was badly damaged. It was a struggle to keep her in the air and they were not sure that they would make it back to Wendling. This was confirmed about a mile from the field. The engines gave out and nothing that Weyth or Frank could do would keep her up any longer. The lone casualty was S/Sgt Johnson, who had been in the bomb bay trying to lower the landing gear manually when the ship dropped into a field and he was killed instantly. He was the "unknown" KIA in Robert Vickers' book "Remembrances of the Missing." Sgt Johnson was buried in the American cemetery near London but after the war his mother requested his remains be returned to the U.S. to be reburied near his home Kansas".

PURPLE HEART BOUGHT ON E-BAY

Robert S. Martyr is a Brit living in Essex and is a serious student of the 8AF's involvement in WWII. He was appalled to find a Purple Heart listed for sale on E-bay and purchased it in partnership with an American friend.

The two are determined that a medal of such importance not be traded again. They intend to present it to the Second Air Division Memorial Society's Memorial Library at Norwich.

Mr. Martyr has been in touch with Ben Jones, 392BGMA second generation Board member. They have determined that the medal was awarded to S/Sgt Albert Hoover, a member of the 576th's Filkel crew. The entire crew was killed on Aug. 5, 1944 when the a/c crashed near Gressenhall, not far from Wendling.

According to Bob Vickers' book, "Remembrance of the Missing", Lt. Filkel's crew and aircraft were scheduled as the lead plane of the lead block of the 392nd on this mission to Brunswick. For reasons never known, on climb out to the assembly area in foggy weather the ship crashed at 0900 hours, killing all aboard.

Plans are being made for an adequate presentation to the Library, which is scheduled for some time after May 1. Ben Jones hopes that a Crusader can be a part of the presentation ceremony. Any Crusader who will be in the vicinity of Norwich about that time and who would be willing to participate please get in touch with the Editor or Ben Jones.

GOT A PIECE OF FLAK? GEORGE MICHEL NEEDS IT

George was the radio operator on the Robertson crew in the 576th. On July 11, 1944 on a mission to Munich they encountered enough flak damage to keep them from returning to base, so they headed for Switzerland. They landed on a Swiss glider field, just over the border and safety.

In January 1945, he and four others escaped internment in a wild and wooly ride across Lake Geneva in an open boat, covered with ice. They made their way through France and back to England with the help of the French underground and the U. S. Carpetbaggers, a cloak-and-dagger outfit organized for such work.


And tell him how you came by it. The school kids will be interested.




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THE 392nd MEMORIAL AT WENDLING
