# 392ND LOSES COL GILBERT, BIRDIE

Col Lawrence G. Gilbert, our last Group commander and CEO of the Memorial Association, passed away March 19 at Winter Park, FL. Birdie Larrick, American Red Cross and Director of the Aero Club at Wendling, died April 29 at Columbus, OH.

The Colonel's firm hand but relaxed personality and Birdie's bright personna were central at our reunions. His sense of humor and Birdie's gift of comradery will always be remembered by Crusaders.

#### Col Gilbert

Col Gilbert was a native of Angola, IN. He studied aeronautical engineering, 1938-1940, at Tri-State College in Angola where he learned to fly. He entered Air Corps cadet training in February 1941 at San Antonio, TX, and on graduation was assigned to a B-18 Bomb Group in Orlando, FL. Pearl Harbor put the Group on anti-sub operations, patrolling from North Carolina to Key West.

In early 1942 he was transferred to the 34th Bomb Group at Pendleton, OR, instructing B-17 crews. Maj Curtis LeMay (the eventual commander of the 20th AF in the Pacific) was Group Operations Officer and 1/Lt Irvine Rendle was his squadron commander. In February 1943, Gilbert became Rendle's Operations Officer when they formed the 392nd at Tucson.

After training with the Group at El Paso and Alamogordo, he flew to England in July 1943 with an advance party for indoctrination and to prepare the base at Wendling for the arrival of the Group. In the Group's operations over Europe, he served as Operations Officer, Deputy Group Commander,

and Group Commander. He flew 26 missions, including two with B-17 units prior to the arrival of the 392nd. He returned with the Group to the US on the Queen Mary in June 1945.

From 1945 until retirement in 1961 he served in

various command and staff assignments in the Military Air Transport Service, including six months with the Berlin Air Lift and a two year tour in the Philippines.

He became CEO of the Memorial Association upon its formation. He was preparing to be at Cincinnati to lead the Association's reunion activities there.

Col Gilbert married Marjorie E. Hardy of Hudson, IN, in 1945, routing an entrenched suitor by a lightning-like enveloping maneuver. Marjie survives, with daughter Anne Brooks, son Larry, Jr., and four grandchildren and four greatgrandchildren.

#### **Birdie Larrick**

Birdie Larrick, maiden name Schmidt, graduated from Ohio State University in 1941, the daughter of a prominent member of the faculty there.

The summer of 1943 found her a member of the American



Red Cross, stationed at Wendling and Director of the Aero Club. She managed the club with such success as to earn the praise of the Group commander, Col Lorin Johnson. Probably of more importance was her immense popularity with the troops: officer and enlisted, ground and air. One 576th crew named their B-24 after her, the Birdie Schmidt, ARC (#42-50387).

After the invasion and hearing the boom of the guns on the Continent, she decided that she would like to see the war See BIRDIE on page 3

Follow-Ups to the March 2009 issue. In regard to the cover story on the Feran and Dalton crews, Howard E. Bjork wrote, "Just a little note pertaining to Lt John Feran—I joined his crew as Bombardier in July of '42. I flew with him until March 2, 1944, when I took a chunk of flak, returning from Frankfurt. Johnny [Feran] and "Red" Cummings (navigator) came and paid me a visit at the hospital. Then a few days later Barney Houser (top turret/engineer) and Stan Prazak (tail gunner) came and told me the crew had gone down. T/Sgt Barney Houser survived the war and paid me a visit with his wife Billie when I was at Valley Forge General Hospital." Bjork is now 88. He joined the USAF in May 1946 as a T/Sgt and retired in 1978 as a WO1. He served on the flight line as a crew chief and flight chief of B-29s, B-36s, and B-52s. Bjork spent over a year in the hospital recovering from the flak injury that ultimately saved his life.

**Yard Work**. How's this for a little extra incentive to keep the grass neatly trimmed at Station 118... From the Daily Bulletin for 23 May 1944: "Action will be taken by all organizations and sections of this station to cut long grass and clear areas containing underbrush in order to facilitate search for enemy anti-personnel bombs in the event of enemy air attack. Scythes are available at Station Utilities."

A Wedding Story. Since June is frequently the start of the wedding season, I am reminded of a story I found in Jim Goar's files. He wrote, "One of the experiences overseas that I remember most fondly concerns the wedding of 578th Sqdn Executive Officer Maj Robert E. Lane and Army flight nurse 1/Lt Marilyn Haglund on 11 May 1945. The wedding was over, and some sixteen or twenty of the squadron officers were lined up outside the church, forming a guard of honor for the couple to pass through. We were rigidly at attention, spit-and-polish, white-gloved hands holding our rifles at Present Arms when out of the sky came a tremendous roar and the area was showered with rice. Marilyn's CO had obtained an A-20 attack bomber, which was designed for low-level attacks and which makes one hell of a racket, and had perfectly timed and executed his run on the target, the little old village church at Beeston. I can hear it now."

# **President's Message**

At Wendling, it was the Luftwaffe, flak, and weather that caused our losses and our grief. Now, it's nothing more or less than the mortality tables.

Those of us who were in our middle twenties or later are now in their late 80's or 90's. This includes all our senior officers and non-coms. This also includes many of the original cadre and the early joiners at Tucson. The air crews that joined us after D-Day in 1944 are generally in a younger slot.

So as each day goes by the mortality tables take their toll, and those of us still standing mourn their passing.

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Even the most experienced of newsmen sometimes commits an error. My boss when I was in the newspaper business was a grizzled veteran of the newsroom, and he had an expression for it. "Doctors bury their mistakes, and the lawyer's mistake is tomorrow's business. But when a reporter makes a mistake, it's there in cold print for all to see and comment upon."

Yes, I did it. I prematurely announced the passing of John Rumancik, tail gunner on the MacFarlane crew in the 576th, in the last issue of the NEWS. My apologies to the former postmaster of Crucible, PA.

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Those who attend the 8AFHS reunion at Cincinnati next Aug. 18-23 and make the trip to the AF Museum at Wright Field should also take the time to visit our memorial tree there. It was dedicated on Sept. 14, 1985, the result of meticulous execution by Bob Lane, 578th Executive Officer.

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Blanche Keilman, the widow of Col Myron Keilman, the legendary commander of the 579th, called me the other day. Only 93, her voice resonated with the same vital timbre as always. She's comfortable in a retirement home in California, address and phone number upon request.

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I spoke to Neely Young back in March. 578th pilot, ship was the Pallas Athene, the GI Jane. Neely's crew was one of our first replacements, arriving in November of 1943.

I've been fortunate to get to know Neely pretty well. He's, well, a complex character. First and above all, he's a trademark Virginia Gentleman with the requisite soft slow drawl and the perfect manners to match.

Neely marched to a drummer that sometimes only he could hear, and the drumbeat wasn't always U. S. Army Air Corps. This sometimes led to certain strained relations with Major Polking, his squadron commander.

He once detailed to me an incident that occurred during his cadet days. The pilot trainees were in some kind of a ground school studying the aircraft engine. His instructor, noting his inattention, called him on it. He said, "Do you suppose that while we are in flight the engine gives trouble, I'm going to crawl out on the wing and work on it?" They gave him his wings, notwithstanding.

Crew members still alive are Ray Teater, assistant engineer, John Rickey, tail gunner, and John Goodwin, co-pilot.

up close and personal. She wangled a job as a Red Cross GI entertainment crew, two Red Cross women with a GI six-by-six equipped with a portable stage and a donut facility. I taught her how to drive a 6x6 and she was good at it.

Post-war, she was both an actress and a teacher. She was on the New York stage in 1946 and 1947, and she taught English and reading in Florida for 11 years. She was married to George A. Larrick, whom she lost after 35 years of marriage.


It was shortly after she was widowed in Florida that we found her, and not long after that we formed the Memorial Association and she became a vital part of it.

Always willing to face a challenge and never afraid to venture into strange territory, she went to China in 1986-88 where she taught English as a second language.

Back in hometown Columbus, OH, she became a member of a group of seasoned actresses and actors, the Grandparents Living Theater. They performed mostly in central Ohio, but they also had a European tour.

Foremost among the company's repertoire was "Once I Was Young, But Now I'm Wonderful," depicting oldsters experiencing the aging process. Birdie took the troupe to the reunion at Colorado Springs in 2003, playing the title role with brother John in the supporting cast. The audience resonated with Birdie's deft performance and the applause was deafening.

Birdie is survived by sons Don and Jay, brother John and sister Joy.



**Sighted bridge, destroyed same.** On 3 Aug 1944, two squadrons bombed this target of opportunity—a bridge across the channel waterway near Goes, Holland. A total of 264 500-pound general purpose bombs completely destroyed the bridge. The circles in the strike photo indicate 500, 1000, and 2000 feet from the Mean Point of Impact.

#### SERVICE OF REMEMBRANCE IN ENGLAND

Residents of the Margate community in Kent, England, gathered on 27 Apr 2009 to remember the crews of two B-24s that had crashed nearby 65 years earlier. One was 2/Lt Jacob Weinheimer's from the 578th; the other was from the 446th BG.

27 Apr 1944 was the first time the 392nd flew two missions in one day. That morning, 18 crews bombed targets near Abbeville, France. Three hours after they landed, 26 a/c, including Weinheimer's, took off for Chalon-Sur-Marne, France. His plane was hit by flak on the return trip and severely damaged; 17 other a/c also suffered flak damage.

Thinking the crew was going to abandon ship, radio operator T/Sgt Parke Kent bailed out; he was captured near St. Omer.

The pilots kept the plane in the air until it finally crashed on the shore near Westgate-on-Sea. Among the first on the scene was Mr. Smythe. At the ceremony, he related how the rescuers had worked feverishly to get everyone out of the wreckage. His voice cracking with emotion, Smythe told the audience of over 100 people that the pilot then said to him, "Thank you for saving my boys."

Five of the crewmen were dead, victims of the flak or crash. None of the survivors ever flew again with the 392nd.

Copilot 2/Lt George C. Marshall was later awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross for his efforts to save the ship and crew.

The Margate town council hopes to make the remembrance service an annual event. It is particularly mindful of the need to educate local school children about this part of their heritage.

To help make next year's ceremony even more special, anyone with information about the crew or their crash is urged to contact one of the editors.

#### From the Histories

465th Sub Depot, May 1944. The Sheet Metal Dept. has been busy making covers to patch up the hole made by the removal of the Ball Turrets. The Paint Shop has done a commendable job in changing the Group Designation on the outboard rudders of each aircraft from the "Circle D" to the horizontal stripe.

*576th Sqdn*, *July 1944*. The worst part of PFF bombing is that the crews don't know how they did, and not knowing contributes greatly to after-the-mission fatigue.

208th Finance Det., July 1944. Total number of troops paid: 3,688. Total due to soldiers in all forms: \$512,004.61.

1825th Ordnance Co., July 1944. During this period 1,367 tons of bombs were unloaded from convoys. During the same period 840 tons were put out for bombing missions. The unloading process involves uncrating, knocking off bands, and stacking; putting out a mission involves assisting the squadrons in loading their trailers and very often restacking the bombs when a mission is scrubbed. Add to this inspection of fuses, linking and inspection of .50 caliber ammunition, storage and issue of pyrotechnics, maintaining a stock of practice bombs, and it is evident that the 19 men who comprise the Ammunition Section are doing a big job.

10th Station Complement Sqdn, July 1944. In order to become "the most military unit on the base," personnel in the 10th practiced close order drill at least six hours a week. During these drill periods, the favorite saying of the men is that "we are training to go overseas and march down Fifth Avenue in New York."

653rd Air Materiel Sqdn, May 1945: On the 31st, we were paid in good old American greenbacks. All British currency was converted to U.S. currency. We were all happy.


