

CHANGING OF THE GUARD

Two NEWS Mainstays Announce Retirement

Today marks a milestone in the transformation of the 392nd Bomb Group into a truly Memorial Association.

Edited since 1989 by Jim Goar, the Group's newsletter is now being produced by second generation Annette Tison.

In a letter to the membership last January, Goar cited the closing of his home-town paper's production facility, which made it impossible to produce the newsletter in the familiar newspaper format. He also quoted the Bible injunction about there being a time for all things.



Jim joined the 392nd at Alamogordo shortly before the Group left for overseas; he was a brand-new 2/Lt fresh out of OCS but with a year's experience as an NCO. He saw duty as the 578th Sqdn Supply Officer and later as Group Transportation Officer.

Goar said, "Annette is a second generation legacy member, niece of 2/Lt Douglas Franke, 579th, KIA April 29, 1944 on a Berlin raid. She's retired military (Commander, USNR). She's secretary of the 392nd's corporate entity and a member of its Board of Directors. And above all, she's smart as a whip and a bundle of energy."

Annette was characterized by one of our senior members as "being around Annette and watching her work is like waiting for the signal to fire the rocket. She is a dynamo."

We are a proud outfit. We arrived in the ETO in the summer of 1943, only the fourth B-24 Group in the theater. The

Second Air Division could put up only a little more than 100 a/c against a very determined foe.

But we persevered in spite of horrendous casualties. By the summer of 1944 ten more B-24 Groups had arrived and with them the long-range P-51 fighter. Casualties eased and soon the 8th AF achieved air superiority over the Continent, making possible the invasion on June 6, 1944.

Under Annette's direction, the NEWS will continue to report the contributions of the 392nd to Victory in Europe.

Dr. George Barger, the 392nd's Chaplain who succeeded Catholic Father McDonough and Protestant Don Clark, joins Goar in retirement. He told the NEWS that he didn't desire a long story about it, so like the rest of us, Dr. Barger stands on his record: a successful tour as a bombardier/navigator in the 577th and since May 1995 the Group's Chaplain.

Personal note from Jim Goar: Many thanks to all who called, wrote, and e-mailed their sentiments to me. It has been a heartfelt experience.

392nd WRECK FOUND IN NORTH SEA

The wreckage of B-24H #42-7477, The Drip, was recently found in the North Sea about 650 feet off the coast of Holland. It crashed on 5 Nov 1943, one of three 392nd BG planes shot down while returning from a mission to Munster.

Killed in action were pilot 1/Lt Wallace W. D'Aoust, copilot 2/Lt James W. Marshall, navigator 2/Lt George T. Winzenburg, bombardier 2/Lt Mart T. Etheridge, and radio operator T/Sgt Russell E. Dahlen. Gunner S/Sgt Christ D. O'Neill was badly wounded and died in a German hospital the next day. Engineer T/Sgt Thomas Anderson and

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FROM THE EDITOR

With Jim Goar's recent resignation as chief editor of the NEWS, I thought it appropriate to give a brief history of this newsletter. The first issue, published in February 1986 under Gil Bambauer's direction, was 4 pages. The next issue had grown to 8 pages. By the third issue, the importance of the News was recognized when the masthead listed William H. Richards as Vice President--Newsletter.

Jim Goar's by-line first appeared in the May 1987 issue where he wrote member profiles.

After Bill Richards' death in June 1989, Birdie Schmidt Larrick became editor. Jim continued to write profiles but also assumed responsibility for production. In the next issue, he commented, "My word processor is old (like me) and sometimes balky (like me). But a new one is coming in a few months, and we can probably get a little better with succeeding issues." Jim was true to his word.

In the November 1989 issue, Jim and Birdie were listed as Editors. Jim's name has appeared on the masthead of every issue since. Birdie served until August 1999; Jim was then assisted by co-editors Mary Beth Barnard (Dec 1999-May 2004) and Mary Peterson (August 2004-August 2005). I've been co-editor since November 2005.

For almost 21 years, Jim Goar has written about the 392nd Bomb Group's missions, its personnel, its reunions, births and deaths. He has helped re-unite Crusaders with crewmates they hadn't seen in decades. He has published photos of people, planes, targets, and fun events previously recorded only in the participants' memories. He has helped 2nd-generation members learn about what their loved ones did in service to our country and the 392nd BG.

Jim has recorded our history. His newspaper has been the one constant shared by every member of the 392nd BGMA. I am honored to follow in his footsteps and excited about this new venture. Please let me know what you like (or don't like) about this new format and what kind of stories you want to see more (or less) of. Tell me if the type is too small for you to read.

In the meantime, I'm glad Jim isn't leaving the News altogether; his by-line will continue to appear in these pages. My first official act as Editor, then, is to acknowledge Jim's long and devoted service to the 392nd Bomb Group and to wish him and Annabelle blue skies.

www.b24.net Update. As promised in the November 2007 News, comprehensive information about the trolley missions, including the plane load lists and many photos, has now been posted. Go to the Missions section and click on the calendar for 7-13 May 1945. Several of the photos were taken by participants; most were taken by Cpl Harvey DeVoe, a Group photo technician, during his trip on 12 May 1945. He used a K-24 camera specially mounted in the nose of a

B-24 and the resulting photos are exceptionally clear.

Another new item is *The Way It Was, Reminiscences about the ARC Aeroclub at Wendling* by Birdie Schmidt Larrick. As program director of the American Red Cross Aeroclub, Birdie came in contact with just about everyone on the base. Her memoirs, supplemented by personal and archival photos, provide a picture of life at the 392nd that is not otherwise documented.

If you don't have a computer, your local library surely does. Any librarian will be happy to help you connect!

2008 Reunions. This issue has registration information for the 8th Air Force Historical Society (AFHS) reunion in Savannah, Georgia, from 3-8 August. The forms may also be downloaded at http://www.b24.net/reunion/. Since Savannah is home to the Mighty 8th Air Force Museum, several large Bomb and Fighter Groups who normally have stand alone reunions are expected to attend. As a result, hotel and reunion registration will fill up much earlier than usual. No transportation will be provided between hotels if you're forced to stay elsewhere. If you even *think* you will be attending, call the hotel at 1-800-285-0398 and make your reservations NOW!! The room can be cancelled up to 48 hours prior to check-in with no penalty and full refund. An important detail: The principal attendee must be a member of the 8th AFHS. The registration form has a section where you can join. The 392nd BGMA has reserved a 700 sq ft suite for Tuesday through Thursday for our 392nd get-togethers, memorabilia, beverages and snacks. As voted upon at the last reunion, the General Membership and Board of Directors meetings for the 392nd BGMA for 2008 will be held during this reunion.

gunners S/Sgt John F. Jereb, S/Sgt Ralph H. Sutton, and Sgt Alex D. Blanc became POWs.

Dutch divers Patrick Sloot and Andre Ruissen found the wreckage, which was covered with sand, in about 20 feet of water. They unearthed two propellers, a machine gun, a wing, one of the bomb bays (with bombs still inside), one landing gear, and many smaller pieces. The plane was positively identified by the serial number on the machine gun.

They notified the Dutch government so that the location can be named a war grave. They also met with a representative of the US Joint POW/MIA Accounting Command (JPAC). That office is tasked with recovering and identifying missing US service members. JPAC is now working with local authorities to establish a plan for further investigation and recovery at the site.

The Dutch Navy has started removing the bombs from the wreckage. Additional investigation of the crash site will be done this spring.

In July 1945, Sgt Blanc wrote to 2/Lt Winzenburg's parents and described what had happened. They were briefed

at 2 a.m. and took off at 9 a.m. They were in good spirits because Winzenburg had fallen out of the truck taking them to their plane.

At 12:45 p.m., the ship reached the target and was hit by an 88mm shell that exploded under the nose. One engine was lost.

Leaving the target, they were hit by another shell. With both outboard engines on fire, the a/c left the formation. When they were down to 15,000 feet, German fighters attacked.

Five men were able to bail out; the others went down with the ship. The bodies of 1/Lt D'Aoust and 2/Lt Etheridge were never recovered. Their names are listed on the Wall of the Missing at the Netherlands American Cemetery.

Within months of arriving at Wendling, the 392nd BG began a program of inter-squadron athletics. Football, basketball, and baseball or softball were played in turn.

The basketball season was broken into two parts, with the winners of each half playing for the championship. The tone was set in early 1944 when the 465th Sub Depot team chose the name Cletracs. As unit historian 1/Lt George L. Griffith put it, "We had in mind that a cletrac will run over most obstacles." With "fast passing and a will to win," the team did not lose a game in the inaugural basketball season. In the second half of the season, the Cletracs outscored their opponents by 165 points, a sign of their dominance on the hardwood.

The Cletracs were determined to repeat as champions in 1945. They even dressed for success. 1/Lt Griffith wrote, "New green and striped cricket jerseys were bought from a sporting goods store in Norwich; khaki-colored GI shorts were shortened in the legs and a red strip put around the bottom and up the side and a leather emblem sewed on the front."

The team did not lose a game in the first half of the season, defeating teams from the Ground Officers, 1217th Quartermasters, 10th Station Complement Squadron, S-1, Medics, and the four Bomb Squadrons.

It was a different ball game in the second part of the season. Having lost earlier to the 465th by only five points, the 10th SCS team was convinced they could beat the 465th. As 10th SCS sports reporter Pfc Irving Kagan wrote in the unit history, they were out for "revenge and glory" in the second half.

1/Lt Griffith wrote that the Cletracs had their "first defeat in the ETO" at the hands of the 10th SCS, losing by 9 points. They "came back fighting mad" and won their next two games, only to lose again to the 10th by 8 points. With bragging rights on the line, the 392nd had its own version of college basketball's "March Madness."

Griffith records that "keen interest was evident by the large attendance of rooting section for the final game." In this grudge match, the Cletracs defeated their arch-rivals by seven points.

Pfc Kagan was philosophical about the championship. In the January 1945 history, he wrote that if his team didn't beat the Cletracs in basketball, "they'll challenge them to a game of darts." That sports event was not included in the history of either unit.

1/Lt Griffith was coach and business manager of the 1945 championship team, whose members were S/Sgts Thomas Dingwall, Wayne Joyce, Zigmund Kaminski, Alfred Cygnarowicz, Leonard Killough, Curtis Dragoo, Philip Zalinger, and Sgt Ray Poshadlo.

REUNION HIGHLIGHTS

LOW COUNTRY / ISLE OF HOPE; Monday, August 4

This is the tour to take if the true feel of Savannah is what you would like to experience during your stay in the Low Country. Enjoy the "romantic flavor of restful elegance" on this excursion. Enjoy a stop at Wormsloe Plantation, which was established in 1737 by Noble Jones, one of the first British colonists in the area. The surviving ruins of the original house are one of the only remaining examples of fortified houses once common throughout coastal Georgia. Lunch will be at the Johnny Harris restaurant, where you will enjoy a fine southern seafood lunch. After lunch, reboard bus for a drive down the azalea and palm tree shrouded Victory Drive. The foliage along this drive was planted in loving memory of Savannah's brave WWII warriors. The drive will continue on to Thunderbolt, a thriving shrimping community with shrimp boats docked along the Skidway River. Note: This tour is limited to a minimum of 50 people and maximum of 100 people. 10:30am board bus, 3:30pm back at hotel. Cost of \$53/Person includes bus, guide, admission, and lunch.

OLD FORT JACKSON; Monday, August 4

Old Fort Jackson is the oldest standing brick fort in Georgia. You will be swept back in time as you enter this historic structure. Upon arrival, you will be greeted by uniformed soldiers of the Civil War. You will receive all proper military honors, accompanied by fife and drum music. Enter the fort's parade ground and explore the fort's museum and casemates. With vintage aircraft, artifacts, photographs, the thrilling "Mission Experience" and personal stories—this Museum has it all! Of course, an extra special day is planned today. Special seminars, book signings, and a Memorial Service are on the schedule for all to enjoy. More information will be available at the museum. A deli sandwich - box lunch is included as well. Never seeing combat as a pilot because of his youth and because of an extreme shortage of rocket fuel, he obtained an engineering degree after the war and then emigrated to the United States. He became a citizen and worked as a construction engineer from the early 50's until retirement. He makes his home in Denham Springs, LA. OUTSTANDING WORK BY THE 465TH SUB DEPOT

On 20 Dec 1943, 2/Lt John B. Peyton and crew were aboard #42-7510, El Lobo, on a mission to Bremen. About 45 minutes before bombs away, its tail turret and starboard rudder were suddenly severed from the rest of the plane. Eyewitness S/Sgt Charles A. Piper in the Higgins crew thought the plane had been caught in a slip stream. When the a/c abruptly lost speed, it was over-run by the ship directly behind it, whose propellers cut through the back section of the plane.

Tail gunner S/Sgt Donald D. Pippitt fell to his death.

The plane finished the mission, staying in formation the whole time. Four Me-109s managed to add further damage before they were chased away by the P-47 escort.

2/Lt Peyton said, "The right rudder and elevator were completely out. One rudder and about 4 and a half feet of control surface on the left elevator remained. The trim tabs did not respond to controls, and there was a slight tendency to skid on turns. The most noticeable difference after El Lobo lost her tail was the way the nose went down. We had more visibility from the cockpit than we had ever had before..."





Even in the dark and fuzzy photo at top, the damage to El Lobo is obvious. The bottom photo (from the National Archives) clearly shows the challenges facing the men in the 465th Sub Depot as they worked to return El Lobo to action.

Engineer S/Sgt Orville L. Smith commented, "The Liberator is a very stable bomber. The oxygen and electrical supply, and all mechanism except the interphone worked surprisingly well. And another thing, the control cables were not jammed by the accident. It was lucky the doors into the tail section had been closed. Otherwise the suction would have probably pulled the waist gunners right out of the aircraft too."

After El Lobo landed, the men in the 465th Sub Depot went to work. This account of their repair work is from the unit history, written by Adjutant 1/Lt George L. Griffith:

"Ship No. 42-7510, known to the boys as El Lobo, was admitted to the "Engineering Hospital" on 21 December 1943. El Lobo's tail section was chewed off by an unidentified friend during a mission. Old Jerry punched holes through the bomb bay doors, nose doors, left wing tip and the leading edge of the outer left wing panel. With a very small portion of right rudder remaining, El Lobo staggered home. By a narrow margin, she was pronounced repairable.


A complete tail section was salvaged from a plane, less fortunate, that had been classified as "salvage". The Sheet Metal Department was called upon to furnish personnel to temporarily perform duty as "salvage masters" in order to expedite the procurement of the needed tail section. The new tail section was cut off just forward of the horizontal stabilizers, thereby necessitating the trimming of El Lobo's fuselage to meet the specifications of its new tail section. By splicing skin and stringers, Sub Depot personnel were able to attach El Lobo's new tail section.

A new tail turret was obtained to be installed in the place of the one "chewed out" over Germany, and after this particular unit of work was completed, electrical and hydraulic installations were made. The "trimming" suffered by El Lobo was also responsible for the installation of new horizontal and vertical stabilizers. Commendable work by the Sheet Metal Shop erased all outer appearances of the best Jerry could offer.

Two weeks of work by the Sub Depot resulted in El Lobo's appearance on the starting line waiting to carry another load of Allied devastation to be dropped on the Fortress of Europe."

Proof of the 465th Sub Depot's proficiency is that El Lobo flew its next mission on 21 Jan 1944 as lead ship in the 579th Sqdn. The a/c survived the Gotha mission on 24 Feb 1944 and the infamous Friedrichshafen mission on 18 Mar 1944, among many others, before being shot down on the Berlin mission of 29 April 1944.
