Since our last report in February, final detailed plans and specifications have been received from the American Battle Monuments Commission and are in the hands of our General Contractor, Tom Scott of Beeston. Permission to proceed has been granted by the District Council, Dereham, and the County Engineer, Norfolk Co. Aggregate material for land preparation has arrived and earth moving equipment is at work on-site. Target date for completion is August 31, 1989.

Our attention is now focusing on the dedication ceremony October 7, 1989 and a program designed to be an appropriate memoriam to those we 1eft behind. Participation will include representatives of the U. S. Embassy, British civil government and Members of Parliament, USAF and Royal Air Force units, and numerous dignitaries from the Norfolk area. hope for a large contingent of 392 BGMA members to be present for this near-final roll call at Station 118. The service and the entire trip's itinerary planned by our own Keith and Patty Roberts is certain to be profoundly rewarding and a never-to-be forgotten experience.

Albert mourns loss of wife

A WELL-KNOWN name to Gazette readers was mourning the death of his much-loved wife this week, after she finally lost her battle against a painful stomach disease.

Albert Kimble (64) of Ram Gorse, a regular contributor to the Gazette's letters pages for over 30 years, spoke to us about the immense sadness he felt about the loss of his former nurse wife Grace (60), who died at Harlow's Princess Alexandra Hospital on Thursday.

Grace and Albert, who were married for 15 years, met after Albert lost his first wife Rosemary. Grace was a source at Middlesex's Hounslow Hospital, where she worked in the casualty and maternity departments.

She became a mother to his two sons Barry (40) and Colin (36), and consequently grandmother to five grand-children.

"Her main hobby was being involved with the Second Air Division Historical Society of American Airforce. It was her pride and joy, and the d go to meetings and send letters overseas," said Albert.

"She went into hospital on the Tuesday and died on Thursday. It was a terrible 48 hours, and brought back memories of the death of my first wife," former Harlow ambulance driver Albert told the Gazette.

Mrs Kimble was buried on Tuesday at Harlow Parndon Wood cemetery.

The 1825th arrived at Wendling about the same time as did the 392nd, and Charley was with the Service Group until both Groups came home.

After the war Charley stayed in the Reserves, and retired as Lt. Col. Among other assignments, he was Armament Officer, Adjutant, and Squadron Commander.

In civilian life, he was connected with the trucking industry, and was an instructor at the University of Wisconsin. He is currently self employed as a transportation consultant.

He is presently serving as Treasurer of the 392nd's Memorial Association.

Charley and wife Helen live at Saddle Ridge #832, Portage, Wisconsin 53901; and have three daughters and four grandsons and four granddaughters.

Joe Whittaker was the 392nd's contribution to the 2nd Air Division. On the original orders for the formation of the 392nd, Joe was 578th Squadron benbadier, the 392nd Group Bombadier, then went to 2AD as their Bombadier. He retired as Lt. Col. in 1957.

Finding a use for his knowledge of explosives in civilian life, Joe was with American Cyanamid, Explosives Division; and as a Director of Mincorp, a coal mining company, and retired as president of an explosives distributing firm.

Joe delivered the address at the 392nd's dedication of the Group memorial at Wright Field, and his eyesight was so bad that his notes were printed in quarter-inch letters. Now, thanks to a miraculous operation, his eyesight is normal and he bagged a buck last winter.

His father-in-law, Warren C. Hollenback, 96 years old and in excellent health, flew in WW I.
