DRIVE REACHES OUT FOR CRUSADERS

SEARCHING FOR THOSE WHO SERVED IN THE 392ND

Art and Teddy Egan have headed a committee that has been ferreting out former members of the 392nd Bomb Group, and they have found over 300 names that have not yet been reached by the Memorial Ass'n.

In addition, committee members John Conrad and Cliff Peterson, vice-presidents respectively for the 2nd Air Division Ass'n. and the 8th Air Force Historial Society, have come up with over 100 Crusaders who are members of those two organizations but not members of the 392nd BGMA.

This edition of the Newsletter, along with a personal invitation to join from President Lawrence Gilbert, is being sent to these prospective members.

The mailing list that the Memorial Ass'n. has been using over the years contains about 800 names, so with the 400 found by the membership committee, our potential strength is 1200.

On the downside of this number, however, is that of the 800 on the original mailing list, only about 570 are paid-up members. So about 250 non-payers will not get this edition of the newsletter. Instead, they will receive a letter from Col. Gilbert urging them to become paid-up members and join the rest of us in carrying forward the memory of the 392nd.

The address label will tell you if your dues are paid. If LM or a number appears after your name, you're a Life Member or paid up through the year shown.

392 MEMORIALIZES 1943-5 STAY IN ENGLAND

The 392nd BGMA has done and continues to do many things to keep alive the history of its WW II contribution and to honor its fallen comrades.

The Memorial obelisk at Wendling has been completely refurbished and funded for perpetual care. It was rededicated in 1989 and a visit to it by a 392 veteran is nearly always a religious experience. It stands in the peaceful Norfork countryside, reminding both English and American visitors of the sacrifice made by the 392nd's 747 honored dead.

The Second Air Division Memorial Library in Norwich has received many individual contributions from 392 BGMA members, and the Association recently made a \$5000 gift for the Librarian Fund.

The 2AD Library has established a branch library in East Dereham, and the 392 BGMA has recently arranged for small American libraries at the Beeston elementary school and the Litcham high school. Wendy Carter is the 392nd's on-the-spot representative for library affairs.

Now a new thrust is being developed. The Beeston elementary school and the Litcham high school are being twinned with American schools, and a planned educational and cultural exchange is being worked out.

Heading the US side of the operation are Robbie and wife Toni Robinson. The fact that Toni is English by birth makes the language barrier easier to overcome.

Twinned with the Beeston school is the Park Maitland school, located between Winter Park and Maitland, Florida. Mrs. Kitty Drew is at the Park Maitland school and her counterpart at Beeston is Mrs. M. Street.

COCKER SPANIEL HAS CAREER IN WW II AAF

GOES WITH MASTER THROUGH TRAINING, THIRTY-MISSION COMBAT TOUR, JOINS HIM BACK IN THE STATES

S/Sgt. Manny Rego had a dog. Not just any dog, but a canine that went the whole route with him through training, 30 combat missions, and then joined him at home after he was rotated back to the States.

Rego, a 579th gunner on the Darnell crew, was training at Mountain Home, Idaho, when his first sergeant gave him the puppy. Rego named him Sgt. Jackie, and outfitted him with all the military regalia: S/Sgt. stripes, wings, and dog tags.

When the Darnell crew completed training, they took off for Europe via the southern route, and took Sgt. Jackie along. Rego kept Sgt. Jackie with him at Wendling while flying 30 missions. After the crew finished their tour, it was disbanded and Rego became an instructor at Wendling for three months.

When it became time to be shipped back to the States by ocean transport, the authorities balked at Sgt. Jackie's going along, but Rego perservered and enlisted the aid of the Red Cross who arranged for Sgt. Jackie's quarantine, shots, and transport to Rego's family home.

God knows how many first sergeants, inspectors, and squadron commanders looked the other way while Sgt. Jackie was carving out a career for himself in the Army Air Forces.



But members of the 392nd Bomb Group fought, bled, and died for their country in World War II for a cause that all of us thought was just. Surely this gives us the right to comment.



BY-LAWS AMENDMENTS TO BE PROPOSED

Two proposed amendments to the By-laws will be submitted to the membership when the 392 BGMA meets July 5 at Dearborn, Michigan, during the 2AD convention.

Both are in regard to the same article, and concern the terms of the Directors. Presently they are elected for a threeyear term, and can serve only two consecutive terms.

One amendment, presented by Charles Dye, removes all limits to the number of terms that a Director may serve. The other, offered by Carroll Cheek, would remove the limitation for only one person, Lawrence G. Gilbert, the serving president.

100% CREW MEMBERSHIP CONTEST



Dear 392nd Bomb Group Member:

The story in this Newsletter tells of our search for all former members of the 392nd at Wendling who are not members of the 392nd Bomb Group Memorial Association. The Membership Committee discovered your name on rosters and member lists of other organizations, e.g., 8th Air Force Historial Society, 2nd Air Division Ass'n., Prisoners of War, etc.

This is a special invitation to you to join the 392nd BGMA and renew the friendships we formed nearly 50 years ago. The Newsletter is the catalyst and medium for exchanging wartime stories that have almost faded from memory. Our regular reunions are held in conjunction with the 8th AFHS and the 2nd AD in alternate years, although there is a mini-reunion every time these organizations meet. Every third year we schedule a "stand alone" reunion. Orlando, Florida was the site of our most recent and successful one in 1990.

The 392nd BGMA was formed in 1985 as a non-profit veterans organization. The growing membership raised funds to provide a major reconstruction of our WWII memorial at Wendling. Formal rededication of the proud and impressive memorial was held in 1989 honoring the 747 of our people killed in action. Current projects include the creation of separate sections in the libraries of the two public schools adjacent to the base; books, photo albums and memorabilia preserve the wartime history of the base and the American air contribution to the war effort. A related program which the British call "twinning" is underway linking these schools with sister schools in the U. S. to foster personal and cultural relationships.

I earnestly hope you will join our organization and share in these and other worthy endeavors; most important, while we still have time let's rediscover those long lost friends of a half century ago.

A membership application form is on the reverse side. If the annual dues will create a hardship, just check the waiver block, and you will receive the Newsletter.
