# 392 ND GEARING UP FOR 50th IN MAY, 1993

The 392nd Bombardment Group, (H), was formed at Hq. Second Air Force, Fort George Wright, Washington, by Special Order #14 on 26 January 1943.

The first combat mission was flown 9 Sept. 1943, an incredibly short time to have welded a sophisticated 4-engine bomber unit together, move it overseas and send it into action against Germany.

1993 marks the 50th anniversary of the Crusaders, and plans are going forward to make it a memorable event.

Scheduled for 20-25 May at Albuquerque, NM the gathering is being planned by Bob Vickers and Charley Dye. The Marriott hotel will be the headquarters.

# Reflections on Col. Rendle At Wendling - 1944

Here is another report about the legendary first commander of the 392nd, this one from Hank Yaughan, co-pilot in the 577th.

On a night following a period of time that the 392nd had suffered a heavy loss of crews, I was among others that assembled in a large hanger to hear an address from our leader, Col. Rendle.

As we gathered, the makeshift raised speaker platform was unoccupied. From the men there were none of the usual conversations, banter or laughter usually found at such a meeting; just a sense of quiet wonderment of why it was being held.

The more we stood, the quieter it became. The silence became so thick you could almost cut it with a knife.

Finally, upfront a man climbed the few steps and turned facing the assembled men. He was a large man, bareheaded, his black hair and facial features plainly showing his Indian descent. His carriage, demeanor and attire befitted the rank he carried.

Before speaking he seemed to look and search out the face of each man. When be spoke his strong booming voice carried the length and breadth of the building.

"Men of the 392nd, we have taken one hell of a beating lately."

(pause)

"We who are left must accept the duty and sacrifices are required of us."

(pause)

"NOBODY QUITS. NOBODY QUITS."

(pause)

"FOR NO REASON. FOR NO REASON."

He stopped for a few moments to let the impact of his words sink in. There was no cheering or applause from the gathering, just quiet acceptance.

As he commenced to speak again, his face assumed a more somber look. "I've got some really bad news from the folks back home." A grin spread over his face, and he went on to say, "They have informed me that we are using too much toilet paper over here."

The tension of the meeting broke and a huge ripple of laughter came forth.

Moving from the platform, Col. Rendle moved through the men shaking hands with all.

### AIR ANNIVERSARY

May 23, 1940: 320 Army aircraft participated in first simulated European combat operations.

The Friedrichshafen mission on 18 March 1944 was the 392nd's costliest.28 a/c were dispatched, 4 aborted, and 14 were MIA. Two landed at other English bases with dead and wounded aboard, and there were wounded on board the a/c that were able to return to Wendling.

Accounts of this fateful mission are in the literature of the 392nd, in Bob Vickers' THE LIBERATORS FROM WENDING, and in Myron Keilman's as reported in the 2nd Air Division Journal and later reprinted in Myron's WAR STORIES. Myron, the 579th ∞, was deputy lead commander and collaborators in his story of the mission are Vern Baumgart, lead pilot; Don Clover, 576th pilot; and Bob Berger, Clover's co-pilot.

Recently the mission folder for Friedrichshafen has come into possession of the 392nd BGMA NEWS, thanks to the efforts of Everette Marsteller and Jim Morris, nephews of S/Sgt. E. W. Morris, 579th and KIA on the Books crew. This information has resulted in the compilation of the MIA crew lists shown on this page.

The NEWS has combed the 392nd's membership directory and has interviewed several living survivors. The amazing statistic to come out is that of the 142 crewmen MIA at least 65 survived, and that we have 22 of them on our roster and know that 26 are still living.

There are still many blank spaces among the crew lists. If any reader can fill in other information, please get in touch with Jim Goar, co-editor of the NEWS.

### COUNTRY BOY COMBAT BOMBER PILOT: TAYS

Bob Tays' book tells the story of a rural Texas boy and his involvement as a bomber pilot in WW II.

Saying that he was a D and F student in high school, staying in only because his father asked him to do so while he was on the school board, Bob gives a glimpse of how it was for a young man in the late 30's.

After high school, he worked in a filling station for \$5 a week, and the hours were 8 a.m. to 10 p.m. and 6 a.m. to 6 p.m. on alternate days, with every other Sunday off

He was in his second year of college when Pearl Harbor occurred and he soon volunteered for the Army and found himself in the Air Corps aircraft mechanics' school.

He then became a cadet, earning his wings and going through transition training to become a 4-engine bomber pilot.

Taking his crew to England, he was first assigned to the 492nd at North Pickenham, but that unfortunate Group soon was disbanded and Bob and his crew came to Wendling and the 578th squadron.

Bob then tells the story of the combat bomber pilot: the missions, the leaves, the danger, the thrills, the despondency- all the things that made up a combat tour in the 8th Air Force.

.He stayed in the Reserves, retiring as Col. He had many assignments, but always in operations. He taught school for 35 years and is now retired.

The book does what the title says: tells the story of a Crusader pilot. It's a book fellow Crusaders will not want to put down until finished. The Memorial Association has sent copies to the libraries at Norwich, East Dereham, Litcham, and Beeston, and a copy is in Ernie Barber's 392nd archives.

The spring of 1944 was a busy one. Here is a special message from our Wing Commander, Gen. Leon Johnson:

RECORDS SHOW THE 392ND BOMB GROUP DISPATCHED 114 AIRCRAFT DURING 5 MISSIONS FROM MAY 21 TO MAY 25, WITH ONLY TWO EARLY RETURNS. THIS IS IN ITSELF AN OUTSTANDING ACCOMPLISHMENT AND IT IS MY DESIRE TO COMMEND YOUR UNIT, ESPECIALLY THE GROUND CREWS RESPONSIBLE.

### PROFILE




was discharged in 1946, but stayed in the reserves for several years.
