PILOT FINISHES COMBAT TOUR; "RETIRES" TO FLY AS PILOT IN SCOTLAND-SWEDEN AIRLINE

Nearly everyone in the 392 BGMA knows that the Guy Carnine crew was the first crew that finished in the 392nd. Here is his story of what happened to him after that. Guy tells the NEWS that he has recently moved to 47 Emerald Hill, Franklin, NC 28734.

By Guy Carnine, 578th Col Bernt Balchen, USAC, was a world-famous Norwegian Artic explorer.

Col Balchen set up an airline to operate between Leuchars, Scotland, and Stockholm, Sweden. The purpose of this airline was to return to England our B-17 and B-24 crews who had landed in Sweden due to battle damage or insufficient fuel to get back to England. Sweden interned the crews in order to maintain their neutrality.

Our airliners were B-24s that had been stripped of turrets and armament, and were solid color with no markings except a U. S. Department of Commerce number on the tail.

When my crew completed their missions on March 5, 1944, there was a moratorium on returning crews to the States. My navigator, Vic Mastron, and my radio operator, Boyce Barbee, were given the opportunity to volunteer for the

very secret Swedish operation.
Only those three crew members were needed

The moratorium as lifted soon after we volunteered, but by then we were committed to the airline.

We were given passports and fitted out with civilian clothing in London and soon we were in Scotland, ready to be an airline crew.

It was necessary for us to fly over Norway when flying to and from Sweden. During the summertime period in that part of the world it never got dark at our operating altitude of 12,000-14,000 feet. We never flew when fair weather was expected, but sometimes the weather man was wrong and we would fly across Norway in the clear. The Germans had JU88's in Norway, and it was always a mystery to us why they didn't attack us.

Sometimes we carried Norwegians to England. Norway was at war with Germany, and many Norwegians chose to escape to England and train there to fight Germany. Col Balchen planned to extend the operation to Helsinki, Finland, but on the initial flight Russian warships in the harbor shot down the a/c. Mistake or not, this ended the attempt to connect with Helsinki.

I asked Col Balchen if I could be relieved and sent back to the States, since I never would have been involved in the operation if there had not been a temporary moratorium on returning crews to the States when I finished my tour. I had been transferred to the 448th while I was on temporary duty with the airline and Col Balchen gave me permission to ask the CO of the 448th for deployment back to the States, and he

agreed

Col Balchen passed away several years ago.

Vic Mastron was transferred to Stockholm as the briefing officer for the operation. Vic passed away in October 1991.

Boyce Barbee continued flying the airline missions until the operation was discontinued near the end of the war in Europe. Boyce is enjoying life in North Carolina.

392 BGMA BOARD MEETS AT ORLANDO

PROCEEDINGS OF THE MEETING ON FEBRUARY 23 AT THE STAND ALONE

The Board of Directors at their meeting at Orlando on Feb. 23 made the following determinations:

- 1. The two resolutions set forth on the right were ordered published so that the membership body can vote on them at the next membership meeting.
- 2. After a study that has extended over a period of months, it was decided that a 1/3 scale replica of the Wendling Memorial will be established in the memorial garden at the Mighty Eighth Heritage Museum at Savannah. Funds are available for this, but donations for the effort are sought from the members to replenish those funds.
- 3. The next regular meeting of the 392BGMA will be in conjunction with the 8 AF Historical Society at Minneapolis Sept. 9-14. This is in conformance with the association's policy of alternating the annual membership meetings between 8AF and 2AD.
- 4. The Wendling Memorial Trust, in order to comply with British law, must use some of its income for educational purposes. Accordingly, funds were donated to the 2AD Memorial Library at Norwich, and to the Wendling Area School Fund. The Wendling area includes schools at Litcham and Beeston.
- 5. The 392BGMA's memorabilia will be placed at the Mighty Eighth Heritage Museum sometime this summer, when Ernie Barber can get to it. The placement will be subject to the association's retaining ownership of the material and its right to make temporary withdrawals for reunion use.

PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO BY-LAWS OF

392ND BOMB GROUP MEMORIAL ASSOCIATION, INC.

In accordance with Article Ten of the By-Laws of the 392nd Bomb Group Memorial Association, Inc., notice is hereby given of proposed amendments to the By-Laws of the organization. Pursuant to the Articles of Incorporation and/or the By-Laws, the affirmative vote of the majority of the members present at the next annual or special meeting of the organization is required. The following amendments are proposed:

ARTICLE TWO PURPOSE

Addition of paragraph C which reads as follows:

C. A Trust may be established under the laws of the United Kingdom. The principal objective of such a Trust is to educate the public as to the heroic accomplishments of the members of the 392nd Bomb Group. Such educational purpose shall be fulfilled by a variety of means including maintenance of the Wendling Memorial Monument.

ARTICLE NINE OFFICERS

The text of Article Nine shall be amended to read as follows:

- A. The Officers of this organization shall be: Chairman of the Board,
 President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer. Any one Director
 may serve in more than one office at the discretion of the Board of
 Directors. Only the last Commander of the 392nd Bomb Group may serve
 as the Chairman of the Board.
- B. Except for the office of the Chairman of the Board, whose tenure shall be for life, these Officers shall be members of the Board of Directors. They shall be elected to serve for a period of one year by the new Board of Directors.
- C. The Chairman of the Board and the President shall provide overall direction and leadership for the conduct of the business of this organization, subject to the control of the Board of Directors. The President, along with the Secretary, shall sign all formal instruments required by law and/or by the Board of Directors.



PROFILE

1/Lt Malcolm A. Thompson was a bombardier in the 576th, flying with the Smyth, Ford, and Jones crews. He arrived at Wendling in October 1943. Post-war, he was an instructor at Mare Island Naval Shipyard, retiring in 1981. His spouse is Rose, and they live at 236 Westridge Ave., Daly City, CA 94015. They have two children and one grandchild.

PROFILE

Sgt Joseph H. Cronin was an AM in the 578th. He was early cadre, joining the 392nd at Biggs Field after AM training at Ford's Willow Run plant.

He flew back to the U.S. after the war ended in Europe. (See story, this issue, "Starts Engine With Rope").

His civilian career was with Massachusetts Electric

He is married to Dorothy, and they have 6 children. They live at 149 Castle Hille Ave., Great Barrington, MA 01230.

PROFILE

S/Sgt Joe B. Maloy was the ball turret gunner on the Fred C. Shere crew in the 577th. He joined the Group in March 1944 and was shot down on the Berlin raid April 29. He was POW at Stalag

He earned the M. S. E. degree from the University of Alabama in 1950. He was associated with several paper manufacturing companies, retiring as manager of personnel and public relations for Kimberly-Clark.

After retirement, he has taught at the University of Florida, University of Alabama, and Augusta College.

He still runs 40 (that's forty) miles a day, and competes in 10K and 10 mile

His wife is Ida, and their residence is 337 Walnut Grove Drive, Peachtree City, GA 30269. They have one son and one granddaughter.

STARTS ENGINE WITH ROPE- IS TICKET HOME

Sgt Joe Cronin is a "charter member" of the 392nd, joining the Group at Biggs Field in early 1943.

He was an AM in the 578th, and one morning before a mission the starter on a plane's #3 engine was out, and they couldn't start the engine.

Capt Ray Berthiaume, 578th's engineering officer, had Joe and crew chief S/Sgt Clyde Davis wrap a rope around the propeller hub and hook it to a jeep. With Berthiaume at the jeep and Davis in the plane, the engine was started and the a/c flew the mission.

Cronin was on his way home in a B-24 in June 1945, when, in Iceland, a motor wouldn't start. The crew and passengers were resigned to a forced stay in Iceland awaiting a new starter motor, when Cronin proposed rigging the rope and jeep again. The engine started and the B-24 soon took off for the U.S.

And now, as the radio guy says, 'For the Rest of the Story.' Cronin was relating this incident to the assembled Group at the reunion in Orlando last February, when out of the audience came the pilot and navigator of the homeward bound B-24, Bob Vickers and Keith Roberts. It was a joyous reunion.

FROM THE KEILMAN WWII NOTEBOOK

Col Myron Keilman, the commander of the 579th, has compiled accounts of events in 392nd history that he has named "Lest We Forget". Following are his notes regarding the tenure of General Hodges as commander of the Second Air Division:

General Hodges was our B-24 bomber division commander from August 1943 until 29 July, 1944. The B-24 groups were built up from two to fourteen. 414 field orders were issued. Upon departing for his new assignment at US Army Air Forces in the Pentagon he sent this message:

TO THE OFFICERS AND MEN OF THE 2ND AIR DIVISION: IT HAS BEEN A GREAT PRIVILEGE TO HAVE SERVED WITH YOU FOR SUCH A LONG TIME. I AM SORRY TO GO, BUT I LEAVE WITH IN-TENSE PRIDE IN OUR YOUR ACCOMPLISHMENTS. FIGHTING SPIRIT, AND YOUR CAPABILITIES. YOU ARE AT THE PEAK OF YOUR STRENGTH; WELL ORGANIZED, WELL TRAINED, AND WELL LED. I LEAVE YOU WITH CONFIDENCE, KNOWING THAT YOU WILL STRIKE BLOW FOR BLOW WITH THE FORTS UNTIL THE HUN WAR MACHINE IS DESTROYED. GOOD LUCK AND GOOD BOMBING

Jack Novey was a B-17 gunner in the 96th BG at Snetterton Heath. He arrived there in June 1943 and flew his 25 missions during the really tough, high loss rate period.

Crusaders will relate to his story as he tells of his training in the States and the missions he flew.

Combat crewmen who survived the terrible odds often ask themselves the question: why did I survive when many others didn't? One answer could be that it was the inscrutable will of God. Novey asked that question from a hard-bitten 8AF chaplain, who give him the same answer, but couched in GI language: "How the hell should I know?"
