Wendling Memorial Restoration Project

The Wendling memorial project is off and running. We are happy to report that we have received \$26,000 in cash contributions, and pledges for another \$10,000. The Battle Monuments Commission in Paris is solidly behind our effort. They have done all the preliminary engineering for us at no cost.

The Beeston Parish Council is doing everything within its power to be of help. We must remember, they have taken care of our memorial for 40 years. They have a deep interest in all this.

We also want it finished during our lifetime. The Grim Reaper is taking his toll of our group. There will be no one to finish it when we are gone. This is to preserve the memory of those 788 young men of the 392nd who didn't come home and all those who served. We need to raise another \$34,000 by the end of November. This will permit us to start the first phase of the restoration. We are on somewhat of a deadline with the Battle Monuments Commission to get started the first of the year. We need your contribution now. Remember that the tax rate is higher in 1987 than it will be in 1988. This is a great time to give, and we need your support.

BOND SALESMEN WITH WINGS By Capt. Don McCammond Former Member of The Christian Science Monitor News Staff

For a change, nearly all the Squadron's staff officers were in the BOQ, the RAF barracks we called Bachelor Officers' Quarters. The weather was bad, had been for a few days, and our Liberators were "stood down." The night was chilly and the old potboiler in the middle of the bay was puffing away.

Captain Bob Lane, our Lexington, Ky. executive officer, was talking about how the Squadron was making out in the war bond drive. "We had 95 per cent of our quota, and still one more pay day before the deadline, when they increased it by \$2,000. We'll make it, but ..."

Lieut. Jack Macauley from Brooklyn, Assistant Squadron Intelligence officer, cut in. "How are you doing it, Bob?" Lying in wait for the men after they are paid and shaming them into it?"

"No, we're just talking it up," the Exec said. "Everyone who comes into the orderly room for any reason at all is told why we are putting on the drive. Hal Hartman is batting about 80 per cent." Hartman, from Trenton, New Jersey, is a first lieutenant, a former navigator.

"I even sold two \$150 war bonds to two men who reported to me for reprimands," continued Captain Lane.

"That sounds just like you, Lane," said Leroy C. MacTavish, our communications captain, and the scion of a furniture house in Glen Springs, Colo., maliciously. "Haul the men in for a lecture, then while they are still dazed and trembling, sell them something." After throwing his barb, he reached for another helping of the cheese and crackers the Executive Officer was passing out of my locker.

Ignoring the thrust, Lane moved the food out of Communication's grasp and went on. "We sent Staff Sergeant Goldman out on the line for two hours and he sold \$900 worth of bonds. Even though the ground crews are working without stop to get the ships in condition for the next operation, they had time to listen to Goldman."

Norman Goldman, a Detroiter, was duty sergeant in the Orderly Room.

"Is it true that Sergeant Costes in operations sold \$2,000 worth of bonds in two days when you promised him a two day pass?" put in Capt. Leonard A. Wipfier

of San Francisco, acting Group Adjutant and a Squadron alumnus. Costes, from Hollywood, Calif., is the Operations Section Clerk.

"That's right," the Kentuckian answered. "He contacted all the flying personnel, from Major Player on down."

There was a pause as Jim Goar of Frankfort, Ind., a firm believer that the Hoosier State was "the garden spot of the world," passed around his canteen water. Jim has been bucked up Squadron Supply Officer to Officer. The Transportation water crackers and essential. Soda cheese, a treat from home, were thirst provoking.

Someone remarked on the irony of men overseas buying bonds, paying for the guns and aircraft they fight with. Yet nearly all the men were willing, and carrying as much as they could.

Lieut. Walter Whelan of the Bronx, another Assistant Intelligence Officer, pointed out an advantage gained from the bond drive. "Every bond bought by men overseas is saving," he said. "But it also cuts down some of the friction between the American and Allied armies."

We knew what he meant without explanation. The wide difference in pay between our men and those of the Allied forces had caused trouble.

But to get back to the problem. Like all Americans away from home, our troops wanted to return home loaded with souvenirs. Wartime British prices are extremely high, with a 100 per cent tax on new jewelry and similar gadgets. For "thru'penny bit" bracelets, Yanks were paying 25 to 50 shillings - five to ten dollars. The subject had been discussed hundreds of times.

Another silence occurred as, one by one, the four engines of a Lib on the nearby line could be heard tuning up then merging into the familiar roar. Sounded as though we might be busy tomorrow.

Good or bad weather, the ground maintenance crews were always at work, preparing their charges for combat. Many of them had records as high as 85 consecutive missions without a turnback for mechanical failure. The crews on the ground grieved over the loss of their (Contd., Page 4)

bombers as much as they did over a pup when younger.

Coaxing, coddling, constantly repairing and checking, they inspired the combat crews to overcome minor faults that occurred on a mission and continue on over the target. Many a combat crew has made the run over the target on three engines rather than return to face their ground crew chief.

Lane looked at the cheese packages. They were all empty. "Time to turn in," he said. One by one the scavengers rose and left my crumb-cluttered corner. I turned out the light and drew back the blackout curtains to open a couple of windows. Through the damp fog we'd become accustomed to came the thundering sound of more Libs, the symphony of the line. It certainly did sound as though we would have something on for tomorrow.

Profile -- by Jim Goar

Howard R. Ebersole was 1st Lt. Ebersole at Wendling, joining the Group in January of 1945, first with the 578th and then the 579th.

After the war, he left the heavies and joined the fighters via the Michigan Air National Guard. While in Korea, he flew 30 missions in F-51's and 70 in F-86's with the 18th Ftr. Bmbr. Grp. Other tours included development testing at Holloman in F-101B, F-102 and F-106; three years in Alaska flying F-102's. He retired in January 1969 as Lt. Col.

In civilian life, Howard has been closely associated with airplanes, being (among other things) project engineer for the B-1 Crew Escape Systems. He was also an engineer with Ford at Dearborn, Michigan.

He has three sons and three grandchildren. His address is P. O. Box 386, Plymouth, Michigan 48170.

Now that Howard is retired, he does flight instruction, mostly aerobatics, instruments and sailplanes.

M/Sgt. Ernest Herbert Barber was a crew chief in the 578th, joining the 392nd at Biggs Field on March 4, 1943. He received the Bronze Star for crewing B24H No. 42-7518 for 32 missions without a mechanical abort. He crewed seven combat planes with a total of 143 missions without a mechanical abort.

Barber retired in 1981 from the U.S. Postal Service in maintenance. (No aborts on those mail trucks either!) A widower, he has three sons and four grandsons.
