The 8AF Historical Society held their annual meeting Oct. 14-18 at Cherry Hill, NJ, near Philadelphia. Forty Crusaders were in attendance.

AIR ANNIVERSARY 57 B-24s and 62 B-25s made heaviest raid of WWII on New Guinea-

Elva; Bill McGuire and Bernadette; LT/COL HOWARD EBERSOLE: PILOT OF BOMBERS, FIGHTERS, GLIDERS, AND A MYRIAD OF AIRCRAFT IN BETWEEN

Howard Ebersole began his military career as a private in the Signal Corps in 1942, and ended it as Lt/Col, AF, in 1969. In that span, he fought in two wars, was awarded countless decorations and commendations, and in his twilight years has been twice honored by his native state of Michigan.

He has been enshrined in the Michigan Aviation Hall of Fame, and this September he was recognized by the Michigan Air National Guard when they placed his name on the F-86 which is on static display at their museum at their home field, Selfridge ANG Base.

He arrived at Wendling in January 1945, flying as first pilot beginning with the 578th and then in the 579th. He got in 16 missions before the war in Europe ended.

After WWII, he attended the University of Michigan, graduating with a BS in electrical engineering. While at the U of M., he was in the AF Reserve, later transferring to the Michigan Air Guard, and was called to active duty coinciding with his graduation from the university. It was in the Michigan ANG that he was transformed from bomber to fighter pilot.

After some duty at Luke AF Base, he went to Korea, where he flew 100 missions, 70 of them in the F-86 Sabrejet. He was awarded the Silver Star for providing aerial cover during the rescue of a downed wingman.

Post- Korea and until retirement, Ebe served the Air Force in many capacities, not the least of which was pioneering work on the "smart bomb", which amazed American television audiences during Desert Storm. Also during this period he earned a Master's Degree in electrical engineering.

His second career was as an engineer with Hughes Aircraft, Rockwell, and Ford. Along the way he served as a professor at Mississippi State University.

Also along the way he checked out on gliders, thus completing the full circle from 4-engine bomber to powerless flight.

One of his duty stations was Holloman AF Base at Alamogordo, a location and term that is familiar to all Crusaders. Loving the desert climate and its benign flying conditions, Ebe and Jeanne recently moved to Alamogordo and have made it their permanent home. They often fly in their glider, the Lorelei.

Editor's note: Selfridge Air Field, near Detroit, has been a military air base since WWI. Although it is now the home base for the Michigan Air National Guard, the venerable old base also hosts units from the Navy, Army, and Marines. I was there for Ebe's ceremony, and as I looked around the audience something made a very strong impression on me. Among the uniformed military personnel present were four officers, three with the rank of colonel or its equivalent and one brigadier general, each representing one of the four Services. This was on a Sunday afternoon, and these officers were present not because their official duties called them there, but because they wanted to pay their respects to a gallant warrior who represents the best traditions of their profession. And best of all for the 392nd, he's one of ours.

AAF AIRMEN NOT FORGOTTEN BY EUROPEAN ALLIES

Sometimes we feel that fellow Americans have forgotten the sacrifices we made during WWII. Not so with our European allies, whose memories may be sharper because they were often only a bayonet point away from the war.

The NEWS has reported many instances of memorials to fallen Americans, in England, Holland, and France. And now yet another one is reported by Doug Willies, tireless Friend of the 392nd who lives in Sheringham, on the East coast of Norfolk.

Willies reports that French villagers near Schoeneck have erected a monument to a 446th crew that crashed near there on Aug. 26, 1944.

Doug Willies has researched the crash of the 392nd's Colby Waugh crew near Sheringham on Jan. 4, 1944. He led a drive to erect a monument in the local church yard, and saw to it that relatives of the Waugh crew were invited to the dedication of the monument, hosting many of them himself. Then he wrote a book about the entire affair.

The 392nd has a connection with the monument in Schoeneck. The a/c that crashed was flown to England by the Waugh crew, but was taken from them and assigned to the 446th. The crew had named it "Ginger", after Colby Waugh's daughter.

When the NEWS reports Crusader happenings during WWII, we tend to turn all our attention to the

period 1943-45, when we were in England, engaging the Germans.

But before departing for overseas, all of us went through training, sometimes at an air field in a remote part of the US.

Above is a picture sent in by S/Sgt Henry Greene, nose gunner on the Ebersole crew in the 578th. Henry is second from the left.

The picture was taken at Eagle Pass, Texas, a town on the Mexican border west and a little south of San Antonio. There was a training base at Eagle Pass.

Henry says that they had just enough money between them to have bought the cigars in Mexico, and they had slept the night before in a cotton field. "When you are 19 years of age, everything is rosy", Henry remarked.

PROFILE

Sgt Wilbur S. Stanford was a control tower clerk, assigned to the 10th Station Complement Sqdn. He joined the 10SC in June 1943 at Shipdham, and was transferred to Wendling soon after that.

After the war, he took degrees in education and educational administration, but found after one semester that teaching was not for him. So he carved out a career with the VA as a vocational rehabilitation therapist,

retiring in 1980 from the VA hospital in Houston, TX.

He and wife Ruth live at 104 Millwood, Horseshoe Bay, TX 78657. They have two sons and three grandchildren.

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
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STRIKE PHOTOS FROM 1944 MISSIONS

Again, the NEWS had dipped into the impressive stack of photos furnished us by T/Sgt Paul Wright, the Group's Photo Interpreter. And, we have unabashedly copied the mission narratives from Col Bob Vickers' book, "The Liberators From Wendling." Our thanks to both these Crusaders.



KOTHEN, #155 AUG. 16, 1944

An industrial factory in this suburb near Koblenz was the assigned target. At 0300-0430 36 crews were briefed and all were off the ground commencing at 0650 hours. The primary was visual and the Group accomplished an excellent job of bombing, releasing 416 500# bombs of various types with 93% impacting with a 2000 foot radius of the MPI. No enemy fighters were engaged but flak was intense and accurate. All ships returned around 1415 hours with 17 damaged.



HANOVER, #157 AUG. 24, 1944

The Langenhagen airfield at Hanover was assigned as the Group's target on this date. At 0315-0430 hours 36 crews were briefed and the Group aircraft began take-off at 0658 hours. A force of 31 went over the target, releasing 400 500# bombs on the primary with good results. An estimated 70% of all bombs impacted with 2000 feet of the MPI. No fighters were encountered but flak was severe on the bomb run. Several crew personnel were wounded. Three men on the 578th's Lt W. A. Sturm's crew, himself and his co-pilot, Lt B. J. Jurczyn were struck in the eyes with flying glass and the navigator, Lt J. L. Rawlings, was wounded in the eyes with flak shrapnel. From the 579th, Sgt Dunn, a gunner on Lt F. Koza's crew was hit in the leg with

A total of 26 bombers received damage. Mission aircraft returned around 1400 hours.

TARGET IS OIL REFINERY SOUTH OF DENMARK

For the first time in some missions, a non-tactical target was once again assigned for strike, this one bringing the 8th's strategic targeting emphasis back to Germany's oil production.

The target was a large oil refinery complex near the town of Heide located south of Denmark on the Jutland Peninsula. The weather conditions both over England and the target area broke clear and favorable for visual bombing on this key target.

General briefings were conducted for 29 aircrews between 0445 and 0600 hours. At 0830 hours, all Group bombers commenced takeoff with assembly weather over England being most suitable for join-up.

A total of 27 Liberators went over the target releasing 502 300#weapons with excellent results. The excellent visual bombing weather enabled the Group to impact 92 % of all bombs within 2000 feet of the aiming point, and 71% of these within 1000 feet.

Two aircrews, Lieutenants Joyce's and Vickers' from the 578th had premature releases on the bomb run due to Radio Bomb Release malfunctions.

The bombing success of on this raid was congratulated by Generals Doolittle, Kepner, and Johnson.

No enemy aircraft were encountered and AA fire near the Frisian Islands and off Heligoland was meager and inaccurate. The fighter support was rated good on this mission.

All bombers returned safely, landing around 1445 hours.

The above is one of the best photos of our two chaplains that we have seen. On the left is Capt Don Clark, Protestant; and Father McDonough, Catholic. Capt. Clark died about 1966, and we have no knowledge about Father McDonough, except that we understand that he also is deceased.

The two were guests at one of the occasional photo lab parties. Seen in the center, feeding his face, is Sgt Manly J. Fox; and in the background is T/Sgt Paul Wright, being fastidious with his napkin.

EXTRA MAN ON BOMBER CREW WAS "LISTENER"

Many times on a mission there was an extra man on the loading list, over and above the standard 9- or 10-man crew.

He could understand the German language, and his job was to monitor German radio, seeking information on enemy air defenses.

One such crewman was T/Sgt Norman W. Steffen, and here is his story: (See also Steffen's Profile, this issue)

"I went to England in October 1943 with the 445th as a cryptographer in the communications section. I became aware of the need for persons with knowledge of the German language, and was sent to Maidstone, Kent for six weeks of training. (My knowledge of German came from mandatory German education in a Lutheran elementary school in Milwaukee, my home town. Milwaukee has a very Germanic culture.)

'I was assigned to the 578th when I arrived at Wendling about July, 1944. My first mission was August 4, 1944 and my 30th was March 23, 1945. We would fly with whatever crew we were assigned to by Operations, so I flew with a number of crews.

'Our job was to record conversations as an aid to identify locations of enemy fighter groups and the tactics being used by the Germans. This was particularly true in 1945 when the RAF was bombing German bases at night and they were moving their fighter groups around.

The busiest time for recording was around the target area when the fighters were up. We each developed our own kind of shorthand. I recall one of their pilots who I picked up several times who called himself "schildkreutter", which means "turtle" in English.

'I survived two crash landings, one on Oct. 15, 1944 on a mission to Cologne. Our plane took a lot of flak and our hydraulics were out so we landed at an emergeny field and the nose wheel collapsed on landing. The other was in France, near Nancy, and we spent a week with the ground troops and some time in Paris before we got back to England. The pilot might have been Lt. Vickers on that mission. I also recall flying with the Rose crew, and flying in R-Bar, "J.C.'s Pool Hall".

'Other "listeners" in the 578th were Frank Bleichard, Otto "Jim" Krohn, Maurice Belskey, and Asher Bibbins. In the 579th were Max Korn, and Herb Asseln."

PROFILE

S/Sgt (later Lt) William Ross was a gunner on the Tokarsky crew in the 578th. He arrived at Wendling Oct. 23, 1944.

After the war, he took A. B. and J. D. degrees at the University of Michigan. He was in the ROTC there and was commissioned Lt in 1948.

He practiced law from 1951 to 1986 at Detroit and Mt. Clemens, MI. He retired in 1986 and moved to Savannah, GA.

His spouse is Bobbie, and they have three sons, a daughter, and six grandchildren. They live at 3 Fox Meadow Circle, Savannah, GA 31411.

NEW INFORMATION ABOUT 392ND'S EARLY CASUALTIES

In the August 1998 edition of the News, Cpl. Joe Lewin, 579th AM, reported the loss of T/Sgts Walter F. Murphy and Hyman Swartz on Aug. 30, 1943, before our first mission was flown.

Now the *News* learns that Murphy and Swartz were not the only casualties. Lost also in the crash were 2/Lt Eugene V. Maloney, 578, and 2/Lt William M. McKnight, squadron unknown

Also killed in the crash were five other men from the 93rd Bomb Group.

The Casualty Report says: "the a/c took off from Burtonwood Air Depot on a return personnel ferry flight to Wendling, shortly after it had been brought back from a brief test flight. During the test it had reacted nor-

mally; the weather on take-off was good. About one mile from the field the pilot began a right turn as if he would land again. The turn was noticed because a left hand pattern was the normal procedure at that time. The B-24 began losing altitude until it struck Pottery Cob at Northfield Farm, Clock Face, Bold with the right wing tip, killing all occupants."

The a/c's serial number was 42-7468, and according to our authoritative Wedgeworth a/c list, it had not yet been assigned to a squadron.

Thanks for this research is due Mr. J. A. Hey, a Dutch researcher living in Holland. He is a friend of Phyllis DuBois, former 2AD Memorial Librarian, and both are ardent students of 8AF history.
