

He flew a tour as a B-29 pilot in the Korean War in 1951, and was manager of the Officers' Club at MacDill and Barksdale Fields in 1952-55.

After retirement from the Air Force, he was General Manager of Morrison's Cafeterias in Florida 1955-85.

He once confided to the editor about his role in the Jimmy Stewart movie, "Strategic Air Command". It was filmed partially at MacDill Field when Cliff was running the

CRUSADER BOMBARDIERS CERTAIN TO WONDER AT IT: EFFECTIVE CLOSE AIR SUPPORT FROM A B-52 AT 39,000 FEET

Here are the particulars concerning the 8AF crew that was awarded the Eaker Award at the recent 8AFHS convention in Norfolk:

On Nov. 10, 2001, their B-52 heard a request for close air support from an American ground air controller in northern Afghanistan. He and accompanying coalition forces were under attack by the Taliban and were about to be overrun. The a/c was 300 miles from his position, but arrived in time to break up the Taliban attack. Using coordinates from the ground air controller, the B-52 delivered 3,232 cluster bombs on an enemy troop concentration in an area 800 feet by 400 feet. Reloading their avionics software, the B-52 then released 13,500 pounds of bombs on the ridgeline where the enemy emplacements and troop concentrations were. Reported results were 10 fighting positions destroyed, an anti-aircraft artillery site destroyed, command bunker left in flames, and more than 250 enemy casualties. The American ground air controller was able to retire in safety.

392nd CONSIDERING STAND-ALONE

There has been some thinking among us that the 392nd might consider scheduling a one-day stand-alone reunion on the day preceding the Second Air Division reunions.

This would be intended to be inclusive with the 2AD reunion; Crusaders would miss all the great opportunities of the full-scale reunion if they only attended the one-day stand-alone. By definition the one-day affair could not be very comprehensive; about all that could be furnished is a gathering place with refreshments during the day and a dinner that night. The costs would be for your room for the extra day, the dinner, and a small charge to pay for the hospitality room.

This thought has been triggered by the high cost of hospitality rooms at 2AD conventions, as opposed to reasonably priced ones at the 8AF Historical Society reunions. The 8AF reunions are managed by an independent contractor; the 2AD conventions are run by and for the 2AD.

Some Groups have given up going to the 2AD meetings, holding their own stand-alones and having only a few members present at 2AD reunions. The 392nd does not want to join these Groups; we intend to be a part of the Second Air Division Association as we always have.

If successful, a one-day stand-alone would require a definite commitment from, we think, some 15 to 20 Crusaders to guarantee attendance. This would be necessary to interest the host hotel to contract with us.

EYE-WITNESS OF 392ND'S EARLY COMBAT HISTORY

The 392nd's third mission on Oct. 4, 1943 was a diversion mission to the Frijian Islands. The mission was a planned feint by higher headquarters to de-concentrate the German fighter forces from the main bomber waves assigned targets over the continent. The 392nd's track was up over the North Sea approaches.

For the first time in combat the 392nd encountered enemy aircraft and heavy flak defenses. Approximately 30-50 single-engine fighters attacked, and the 392nd suffered its

CITATIONS ACCOMPANYING AWARDS PRESENTED AT NORFOLK 8AFHS MEET

The General Ira C. Eaker Award

On 10 November 2001 while assigned to the 20th Bomb Squadron, 2nd Operations Group, 2nd Bomb Wing, Barksdale Air Force Base, Louisana, aircrew of ALPS 51 distinguished themselves by displaying outstanding airmanship skills. The 5-person aircrew saved the lives of numerous American and coalition forces and effectively stopped a large Taliban ground offensive in the vicinity of Shirkan, Afghanistan, by flawlessly processing in-flight target assignments and delivering devastating direct hits on designated targets. Several hours after takeoff and upon entering Afghanistan airspace, ALPS 51 was informed of immediate request for close air support in northern Afghanistan as Taliban forces were overrunning an American ground forward air controller. Within 8 minutes after receiving target coordinates, the crew released all 16 Wind Corrected Munitions Dispensers in a single pass. The enemy was unable to maintain the offensive and was forced into a defensive position. Within minutes, ALPS 51 reloaded the avionics software and released all 27 Mk-82s on the ridgeline where the enemy emplacements were, resulting in numerous enemy casualties. The professional skill and outstanding efforts of this crew reflect great credit upon themselves and the United States Air Force.

The Pursuit of Excellence Award

Technical Sergeant Jay A. Perkins distinguished himself as Loading Standardization Crew Chief, 509th Operations Group, 509th Bomb Wing, Whiteman Air Force Base, Missouri, and is selected as the Eighth Air Force Pursuit of Excellence Aircraft and Munitions Award winner in recognition of his outstanding accomplishments and dedication to the flying mission of Eighth Air Force. Sergeant Perkins spearheaded a 14-month, \$700,000 weapons load trainer upgrade, aligning the trainer to current aircraft software, and increasing load crew efficiency. At the wing's premier weapons loading expert, he led every major effort in the wing's support of new precision weapons development and validation, to include Air-to-Ground-Missile 158 Joint Air to Surface Standoff Missile, Enhanced Guided Bomb Unit 28, and the 500-pound Guided Bomb Unit 38 Joint Direct Attack Munition. Sergeant Perkins led a wing weapons last chance team during the Headquarters Air Combat Command Nuclear Operational Readiness Inspection, flawlessly executing the "generation of tasked weapons and USSTRATCOM tasked sorties well within timing criteria" resulting in weapons loading and generation timing being rated Outstanding. Additionally, he spearheaded Joint Direct Attack Munition 82 munition design performance testing, saving the Air Force over 1.4 million dollars in contractor support. The singularly distinctive accomplishments of Sergeant Perkins reflect credit upon himself, Eighth Air Force, and the United States Air Force.

first casualties in combat. Three 579th crews were KIA: Morphew, Brian Smith, and Feurstacke. Flying with Feurstacke as Command Pilot was Maj Don Appert, CO of the 579th. Six other crewmen were injured.

Pictured below is Capt John Buschman, 578th pilot, relating the incident after he returned from the mission. His words, written on the back of the photo:

"I was #4 in the lead element. Messerschmitt rams #1, #2 and #3 go with him into the drink. Debris from #2 eliminates my starboard tail section. Navigator gives heading back to Wendling, rest of Group follows."



Four days later on Oct. 8 the Group went to Vegesack, a heavily defended target. Again enemy fighters were encountered. Two crews were lost: the 579th's Clifford crew, all KIA; and John Buschman's crew. John and 6 others parachuted out and became POW; Hoover, Hanrahan, and Bernard,

gunners, were KIA. The Buschman crew were the 392nd's first POW's.

An interesting side note from Lou Stephens, 578th pilot: "Our crew occupied the Buschman crew's quarters the night of Oct. 8. I never met John until we ended up in the same barracks at Stalag Luft III. He was surprised that I knew so much about him."

Sgt Alvin Enlow was in Flying Control at Wendling. He arrived in England with the 10th Station Complement Squadron, so his arrival in England preceded the 392nd by a few weeks. Originally assigned to the 44th at Shipdham, he was transferred to the 392nd on Sept. 12, 1943.

At Shipdham the liberty run went to Norwich. At the famous Samson dance hall, he met Myfanwy "Van" Williams, a WAAF from Cardiff, Wales. During the next two years their friendship deepened and they became engaged.

With the end of hostilities Al returned to the States, expecting that Van would eventually join him and they would marry.

But things did not really turn out that way. They drifted apart, she returned his ring, and Al went on to complete a college degree at the University of Akron and spent 36 years in administration in the Cuyahoga County Hospital system.

Both married, both were widowed. Then the lonely widower recalled his lost love and after a determined search, found Van. They corresponded, they met, and now they're together at Cardiff.





Ben Jones has undertaken the task of supplying the 392BGMA with the leather Crusader patches that started appearing on the Group's A-2 jackets in

Ben says: These patches are handpainted on genuine fine leather to meet the specifications of WWII. As the war progressed, various hand painted Group patches started appearing on A-2 jackets. As there was no standard size among the various Groups, Hq. USAAF authorized the use of a 5" circular leather patch on which the unit logo could be painted.


The Crusader is drawn on a USAAF-approved 5" circular leather patch. Each patch is unique with no two being identical, as with mass-produced copies. You can choose between a distressed look or a freshly painted look.

The logo is painted on the leather, then coated with a sealant that protects it. Like any leather, it is suggested that it not get wet.

The cost is \$20 plus shipping and handling.


